

3. Melt shortening in a saucepan; add flour, salt and pepper and blend well.

4. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly,

5. Stir and cook until mixture is thick,

6. Remove from flame, add cheese and stir until cheese is melted. 7. Pour cheese sauce over halibut.

8. Bake uncovered, in an oven that has not been preheated at 350 degrees F. about 20 minutes.
