Pfc. Paul G. Dumble, a glider infantryman, was killed in action in Holland on October 9, as announced in last week's Standard. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Dumble of Lima township.

Memorial services were held at 10:30 Sunday morning at the Salem Lutheran church, of which he was a member, with Rev. Arthur Walker officiating.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Werner have received the official citation awarded with the Bronze Star Medal to their son, Pfc. Paul D. Werner. The citation follows:

Paul D. Werner, 36577425, Private, Medical Detachment, 349th Infantry, For heroic achievement in action on 13 July 1944 in the vicinity of Montopio, Italy. When his company was pinned down in sustained enemy artillery fire which killed one and wounded seven soldiers, Private Werner moved among the casualties without regard for the danger to which he was exposed as he treated the wounds of the injured, carrying several to fox holes. Never faltering as eight more were wounded in the deadly fire, this heroic aid man continued to expose himself as he moved from soldier to soldier administering first aid. When his medical supplies were exhausted, and as mortar shells landed in the area, Private Werner ran to the battalion aid station and secured additional supplies. As the incessant barrage continued, this aid man returned and resumed his task, for three hours exposing himself in the impact area and although repeatedly blown to the ground as artillery shells crashed close by, he continued to bandage the wounds of his fallen comrades. The heroic actions of Private Werner in deadly enemy fire and his selfless concern for the welfare of his wounded comrades won the high regard of all who witnessed his deeds. His outstanding courage exemplifies the highest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Chelsea, Michigan.

34 Years Ago

Thursday, November 10, 1910

Rev. W. P. Considine, pastor of the Church of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, was given charge of the parish on Nov. 15, 1885 and on Tuesday, Nov. 15, 1910 the silver jubilee, or the 25th anniversary of his pastorate, will be celebrated in the church in an appropriate manner by the members of the congregation and his friends. On Nov. 15, 1885, Rev. Father Considine was assigned to this parish. At that time Pinckney was attached to the parish and for 10 years he supplied the pulpits in both places. Since Rev. Considine took charge here he has seen the society grow from a small one to one of the largest congregations in this county.
