## Chelsea Public Schools Will Open September 4

Chelsea public schools will open on Tuesday, September 4, with teachers' meetings in the morning and the enrollment of pupils in the afternoon. Enrollment of high school pupils new to the system will take place on August 29 and 30.

Considerable maintenance work and painting within the building has been outlined for the summer months. The rooms which have been painted or will be painted before the opening of school are: third grade, fourth grade, fifth grade, grade library, kindergarten, boys' and girls' rest rooms, halls in the grade basement, sixth grade, the superintendent's office and the principal's office.

In addition, the floors in the rest rooms and dressing rooms are to be painted and all wood floors cleaned, sealed and waxed. The window sashes in the homemaking and laboratory building have been painted, in addition to a number of sashes, doors and the playground equipment. The painted glass in the rest rooms and dressing rooms is to be replaced with glazed glass to admit more outside light to the rooms.

The hot water tank for showers is to be replaced and a wash basin added in the boys' rest room in the grade building. Other minor plumbing repairs and changes are also being planned.

The teaching staff is now complete and will be announced in next week's edition of The Standard.

Mr. and Mrs. Merle Barr recently received the following letter from their son, Lt. Merle Barr, who is stationed in Germany:

Germany, July 29, 1945.  
Dear Lucile and all,  
I've just been looking through my collection of pictures and reading all the old letters that have piled up. I've got quite a bunch of pictures—of the ones you have sent from time to time and every once in a while I get them all out and spend a little time at home.

It's a lazy Sunday afternoon and for a change it's not sunny. The sun is usually out every day but today when I could make good use of it, it's cloudy. I didn't get up until about ten o'clock and haven't done much of anything all day except lay around the house. Guess I might as well say I'm not in the Army anymore, the way I live. I'm in Oberammergau, near the Austrian border, all by myself except for a Corporal and my secretary working for me. I have the best house in the city, drive around in a new two-tone convertible and govern six towns about the size of Chelsea. I have a cook and a housekeeper to wait on me, plenty of food, a nice office in the center of town and all in all life is pretty hard to take.

Just shortly after you posted the red pin we were relieved by the Russians and our detachment was disbanded. We were pretty lucky though and managed to get four of our original officers together with three of the old men in the new Det. We are all in this general area but are working separately. Snedeker and Howard are in Mittenwald and Doll is in Oberau. You may have heard of some of these towns. Oberammergau is the home of the world-famous Passion Play, depicting the life of Christ. One of the other towns I rule is Eilat—the Monks in the Monastery there are famous for the liquor they produce. Garmish Partenkirchen, which is about fifteen miles away is the winter sport center of Germany and is famous for its ski jumps. The Olympics were held there one year. This country is the most beautiful I have ever seen. I have a lot of color pictures to show you when I get home so you will get a general idea. I know you would like it here. Everything is snow capped mountains and pine trees. They say the snow gets nine to fifteen feet deep in the winter and the only way you can travel is by ski. I'm anxious to see that but if there happens to be a plane headed for America with an empty seat I don't think I'll wait for the snow.

### Farmers' Day Will Be On September 4

Farmers' Day, an annual event designed to give Michigan farmers opportunity to view progress of agricultural experiments being conducted at Michigan State college, will be held on the college campus Tuesday, September 4, in conjunction with the State 4-H Show.

E. L. Anthony, dean of agriculture, in discussing Farmers' Day plans said that all interested persons, whether farmers or city people, are invited.

Several new and interesting features are being planned. Due to attract many on-lookers will be a special demonstration of the use of DDT for controlling flies in dairy and hog barns. Ray Huston, head of the entomology department of the college, will be in charge.

Mow drying of hay will be an exhibit repeated this year. It attracted widespread interest at last year's Farmers' Day, and additional information is available for this year's showing by the farm crops and agricultural engineering departments.

Plans are shaping up for a new and novel demonstration in which use of the civilian jeep and a weapon carrier will be viewed by visitors. This and the demonstration of other new machines, such as the recently devised sugar beet harvester, will be handled by the agricultural engineering department.

As in past years, farmers will be privileged to visit the college farm and experimental crop plots. College specialists will be on hand from 10 to 12 a.m. and 1 to 4 p.m. to answer questions and discuss projects.

Ralph Tenny, college short course director, is in charge of Farmers' Day arrangements.

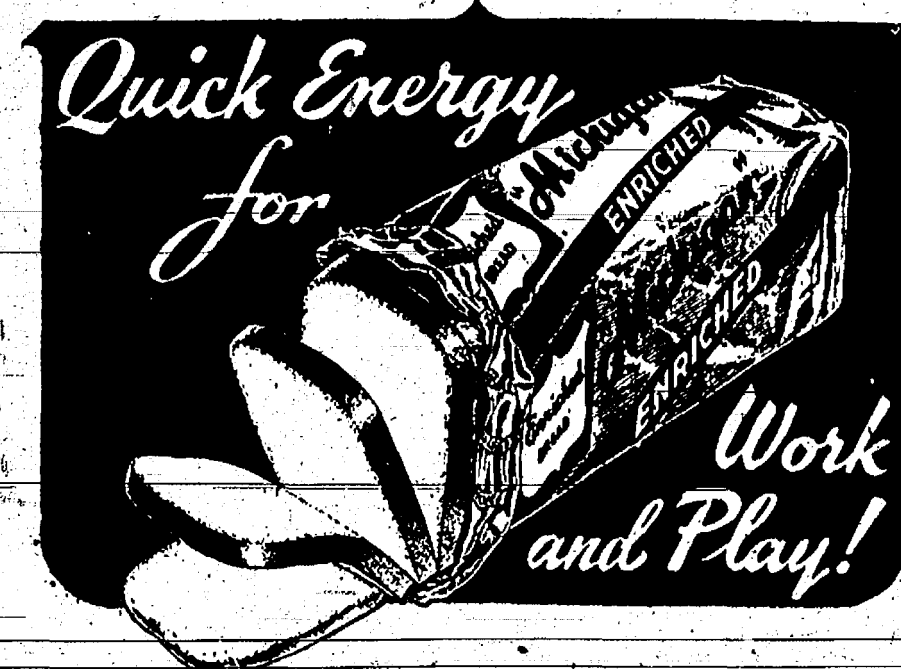

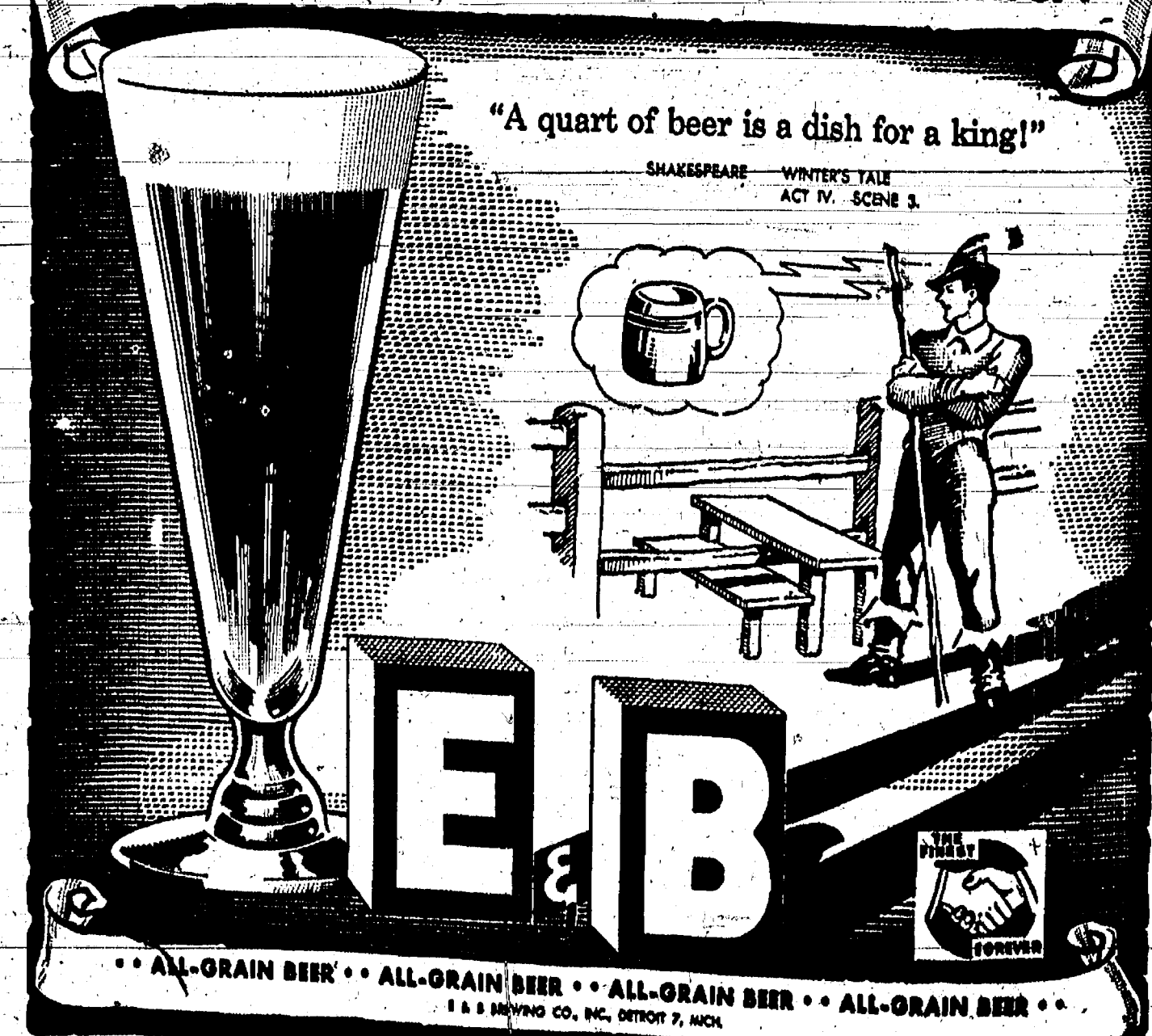

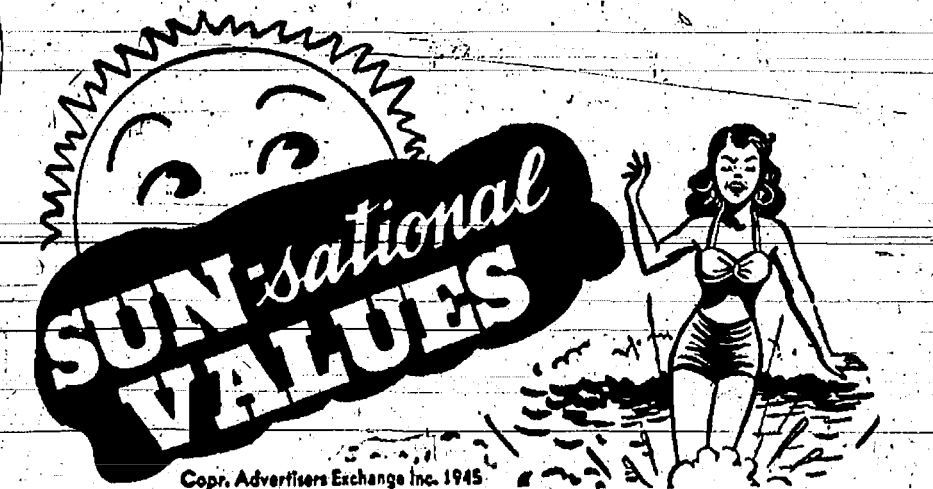

## Picture Portrays Program

The Office of Veterans' Affairs has produced a sound motion picture entitled "Michigan Welcomes the Veteran."

The picture was made in two versions; one for showing through regular theatre circuits and the other for use in showing before clubs and other groups. Counseling Centers will be advised soon, the dates the picture will appear in the theatres.

The version which shows in the theatres will run for ten minutes, while the version for use in community groups will run for twenty-two minutes. Prints of this version will be available soon for showing before community groups.

## Starts With Action

The picture starts with action scenes in the Pacific. It shows Michigan soldiers transported to Percy Jones Hospital, Battle Creek. Several scenes explain the rehabilitation processes there.

The picture then moves to the Separation Centers at Fort Sheridan, Illinois and the Navy Pier near Chicago. Scenes depict actual discharge and payment of mustering-out pay. The action then shifts to Lansing and depicts the establishment of the Office of Veterans' Affairs and the Michigan Veterans' Advisory Committee.

## Local Centers Shown

Jumping quickly about the state, many of the 152 veterans' counseling centers are shown. In several of them, actual interviews between the counselor and the veteran are portrayed. From the counseling centers the action turns to various channels of referral such as education. In this part of the picture are shown veteran students engaged in vocational and academic courses in several Michigan educational institutions.

Service officers of veteran organizations file claims for rights and benefits for veterans; veterans are shown learning forestry; how to operate a poultry farm; how to judge cattle; and in many other interesting situations.

The picture moves to the Michigan Veterans' Vocational School and shows a panoramic view of the school in its enchanting setting on the shores of Pine Lake in Barry County. It shows the veteran students pursuing courses in radio repair, watch and clock repair, drafting, office practice and also enjoying the outdoor sports which are a part of the rehabilitation program at the school. Scenes are also shown at the Michigan Veterans Facility at Grand Rapids and at some of the veterans' clinics established about the state.

## Community's Participation

The theme of the picture is based on the community's participation and responsibility in the program set up by the Office of Veterans' Affairs to assist our returning veterans in re-establishing themselves in civil life. Those who enjoy the picture will find many short scenes interspersed which will touch their hearts, such as a veteran with artificial arms tying a necktie and then beaming his satisfaction of his accomplishment to the audience.

No individuals are starred in the picture. All scenes were actually taken at the place indicated. The actors in the picture are real veterans and they are not acting. It is a picture that every citizen will have a chance to see and should see at the first available opportunity.

Tell everyone hello. See you soon, Merle.
