Our Boys Are Coming Home!

When the news of Japan's unconditional surrender came on Tuesday night Chelsea residents joined wholeheartedly in the enthusiastic celebration that heralded the end of World War II. At 7:02, as the announcement was heard that Japan had accepted the surrender terms, the fire siren was sounded and church bells rang, followed almost simultaneously by the sounding of horns of autos that were then on the street. Very quickly the number of autos increased so that within a short time traffic was congested at certain points, and every auto horn was going at full blast. Occasional shots could be heard, and young folks were parading joyously about the streets. This celebration continued late into the night, but was for the most part orderly and little difficulty was experienced by police officers in controlling the thronging crowds.

Factories with night shifts closed immediately upon receipt of the news, and remained closed until Thursday. Business places that were open also closed and all business was at a standstill all day Wednesday. The post office was closed all day Wednesday and Thursday, with no mail deliveries on either day.

A special Holy Hour service was held at St. Mary's church on Wednesday night, and Father Lee Laige stated that a similar service will be held at 8 o'clock p.m. on the day that President Truman officially declares V-J Day.

Protestant churches united for a special service of prayer and thanksgiving at St. Paul's church on Wednesday evening.

All in all, the ending of the world's most devastating and ghastly war brought with it a mixture of emotions. The loved ones of many will never return, and others will return with physical deformities or mental ailments. And for others boundless joy is caused by the thought that OUR BOYS WILL SOON BE COMING HOME!







Lansing—Field training of dogs used in daytime hunting can begin August 15 in downstate counties where seasons on rabbit, pheasant, ruffed grouse, prairie chicken, and sharp-tailed grouse open October 15, continuing through November 5.
Such training of dogs already is under way above the Straits where similar seasons open October 1. There is no open season on pheasant in the upper peninsula.

Owners of night-hunting dogs used on raccoon, opossum, and skunk again get a break this year through legislative action in allowing the training of such dogs between sunset and sunrise during the period from September 1 to October 5.
Such privilege has been extended on occasion in the past, to be withdrawn when opposition arose.
