"Get-Together" Well Attended At St. Paul's

St. Paul's annual church night and hall on Thursday evening, February 14, 1946, with an attendance that was very gratifying. Extra tables were necessary to accommodate everyone.

Promptly at 6:30, a fine supper was served by the ladies of the church, assisted by the young people in the dining room, where the tables were beautifully decorated in the traditional Valentine manner, with large red hearts and red candles in crystal holders. The Doxology was sung, and Rev. Grabowski offered prayer. After the meal had been enjoyed, the evening's entertainment continued with a varied program much enjoyed by everyone present.

Led by Paul Niehaus with Mrs. Niehaus at the piano, group singing of several numbers with appropriate "action" included, gave the program a good start.

A male quartet of popular St. Paul singers, Paul Barbour, Alfred Mayer, Howard Flintoft and Paul Niehaus, accompanied by Mrs. Niehaus, rendered the songs, "Jesus, Only Jesus," and "The Bells of St. Mary's." Later, as the misfit quartet, comically dressed, they sang "I'll Tell You My Dreams."

Then, to give everyone an opportunity to see them all, Rev. Grabowski asked every returned veteran present, whether members of St. Paul's or not, to come up to the platform, where he told them how glad everyone was to have them back. He introduced each one, who in turn spoke a few words. There was one lady in the group, Mrs. Elwin Barth.

Mrs. Norman Schmidt of the Auxiliary of St. Paul's and Mrs. Carl Mayer of the Aid Society, being the committee that all during the war was responsible for keeping in touch with all servicemen and women of the church by sending gifts, cards, etc., were also asked to come forward. Methodists Will Hold Special Service Sunday

Once each year the laymen of the Methodist church take over the Sunday services in each parish, occupying the pulpit and carrying on the worship service. This year Laymen's Sunday will be celebrated on February 24 in the Chelsea Methodist church when the service will be conducted by Philip J. Olin on the theme of "What the Church Means to the Layman."

Mrs. Charles Cameron will talk on the subject in relation to the home, Albert Johnson from the community point of view, and Dr. Joseph V. Fisher will discuss the topic as it concerns the world.

A special offering is being taken to make possible the rebuilding of the Methodist church in Hammerfest, Norway, which was deliberately and ruthlessly burned to the ground by the Germans when they retreated from the town. The laymen of Michigan have taken as their special task the job of raising \$15,000 to send with Bishop Raymond J. Wade, who is also Bishop of Norway, when he visits Hammerfest in March. This gift will be an evidence of goodwill and brotherhood and faith from Michigan Methodists to the people of the world's most northerly city.

The address of the evening was given by Col. Dwight Beach, who held the undivided attention of all by his fascinating account and description of his observations on the Pacific islands and Japan.

At the close, President Beach called on Henry C. Schneider to outline some of the plans for renovations and changes which the church hopes to make in the near future.

With Our Men In Service

Kenneth Slocum, RM-2C, received his honorable discharge from the navy at Great Lakes, Ill. separation center on February 7.

RM-2C Slocum enlisted in the navy on Dec. 4, 1942 and upon completion of his "boot training," taken at Great Lakes he was sent to the Keystone Radio School, located at Bedford Springs, Pa., where he received instruction as a radio operator. His first assignment was aboard the USS Humboldt, upon which he served from July 14, 1943 until Dec. 20 of the same year.

Other assignments included the SS Bataan, from Dec. 1943 to Jan. 1945; a transfer to the Vice Admiral Mitchell Commander Task Force-58, serving aboard the USS Bunker Hill, USS Enterprise, and the USS Randolph. Another transfer was made to the USS Coasters Harbor, where he continued to serve until his discharge.

During his years in service Kenneth visited Newfoundland, Iceland, Bristol, Eng., Casablanca, Bermuda, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Trinidad, Panama Canal, Pearl Harbor, Marshall Is., Saipan, Guam, Iwa Jima, Ulithi, Okinawa and Sasabo, Japan.

He is entitled to wear the American Theatre of Operations ribbon, European-African ribbon with four battle stars, Fleet Admiral Commendation, Good Conduct medal and Victory medal.

Kenneth is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carmar Slocum of Cavanaugh Lake.

Sgt. Charles Quigley enlisted in the Marine Air Corps at Detroit on Dec. 12, 1942 and received his honorable discharge at Great Lakes, Ill. on February 17.

His basic training was taken at San Diego, Calif., followed by advanced training as a tail gunner in camps located on North Island, at El Centro, El Toro and Miramar, Calif.

After leaving the States he was sent to New Caledonia and New Hebrides islands and participated in the battle of Guam. Following this battle Sgt. Quigley was granted a furlough to the States at the expiration of which he was sent to China, where he remained until the end of the war. Decorations he is entitled to wear are the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with one star, Victory ribbon, Good Conduct ribbon, American Theatre of War ribbon, a Presidential Citation, and a Radio Gunner's Silver Wings with three stars.

Sgt. Quigley is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Theo. Quigley of Sylvan. He attended Sylvan Center school and at the time of his enlistment was employed by the Central Fibre Products Co.

Pfc. Carl L. Heselschwerdt, son of Mr. and Mrs. John M. Heselschwerdt of Sylvan township, received his honorable discharge from Fort Sheridan, Illinois on February 14, 1946.

Pfc. Heselschwerdt was inducted into the army on February 27, 1943 and received his basic training at Fort Jackson, South Carolina as a member of a Medical Detachment. In October 1943 he was transferred to the Air Corps and sent to Airplane Mechanics school at Keesler Field, Mississippi, and Willow Run. Later he was stationed at Westover Field, Mass., Lincoln, Neb., Alamogordo, N. M., Tucson, Ariz., Topeka, Kan., Greensboro, N. C. and Robins Field, Ga.

He is authorized to wear the following decorations: the Good Conduct, American Theatre, and Victory Ribbons.

He graduated from Chelsea high school with the class of 1942 and was attending the U. of M. at the time of induction.

T-4 Sgt. Robert S. Embury received his honorable discharge at Camp Atterbury, Ind. on Feb. 18 and returned to his home here the following day.

Sgt. Embury entered the service on Sept. 22, 1943. After his basic training at Camp Wheeler, Ga., he left from Fort Meade, Md. and landed at Casablanca, N. Africa, going from there to Naples, Italy, where he has been in charge of Signal Administrative duties.

Bob is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Franklin Knies and the late Milburn S. Embury. He is entitled to wear the European-African Middle Eastern Theatre ribbon, one bronze star for the Rome-Arno campaign, Good Conduct medal and the Victory medal.

PILGRIM FELLOWSHIP MEETING

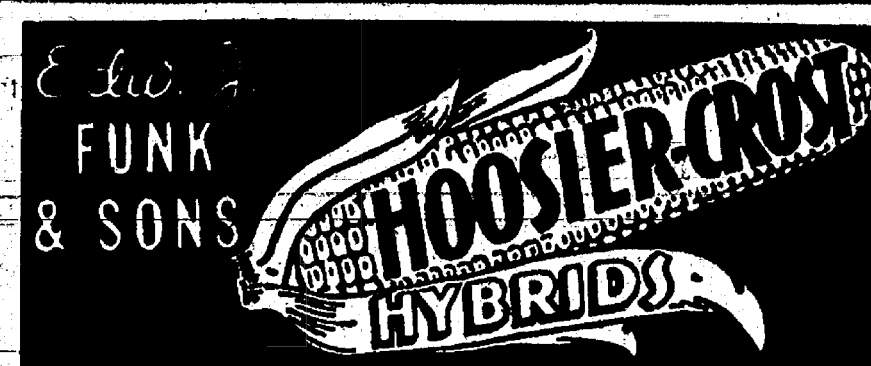

presented him or her with a carnation. The next number on the program was a stunt called, "The Auto Ride," with Mrs. Ole Hilsinger as the driver, Mrs. Clarence Nicola as the mother and back seat driver, and Mrs. Alvin Vail as a very convincing "baby." They were assisted by Amanda Koch, Eunice and Evelyn Lehman, Ruth Paul, Helen Vail and Loretta Lindauer, as the engine and wheels of the "auto." Reverend Grabowski was taken for a "ride" in this auto, for which he had not been prepared in advance, but enjoyed (?) nevertheless.

"A Pail and Mop Brigade" under the direction of Olga Widemayer and Matilda Hinderer, with Gladys Breitenwischer, Margaret Dietle, Cora Feldkamp, Margaret Warren, Elsie Paul, Elsie Satterthwaite, Alma Eiselo, Esther Lucht, Ruth Wenk and Mildred Hopper as the "brigade," and Mildred Lindauer at the piano, did a good job of scrubbing up, and then, all in song, decided to give up their mops and pails and go on the stage instead.

At the close of this part of the program Rev. Grabowski announced that they were now ready for the little surprise of the evening. To show the appreciation of the entire church group for the many years Miss Lillie Wackenhut taught so faithfully in the Sunday school until her retirement at the close of 1945, Rev. Grabowski had arranged to honor her at this annual affair, when all of the congregation would have the opportunity to be present.

Miss Wackenhut was asked to come to the platform and read her own "reminiscences" which she had been asked to write and present, to assure her presence at the get-together, as the rest of the program was to be a complete surprise to her.

When she had finished reading she was seated on the platform in her own special chair that she had used at the old desk (mentioned later) in the Sunday school room. The chair had been appropriately decorated beforehand.

Mrs. John Oesterle then read the following history of Miss Wackenhut's work in the Sunday school.

Miss Lillie Wackenhut resigned as superintendent and teacher of the Cradle Roll and Beginners' Department at St. Paul's Sunday school at the close of 1945, with the splendid record of forty-three consecutive years of Sunday school teaching to her credit.

She began teaching in 1902 when she took charge of what was then called the girls' primary class. There were eleven girls in that first class she taught, Ida Mast (Mrs. P. Kinsey), Louise Laemmle, Bertha Visel (Mrs. Gottlieb Sager), Clara Winters, Rosie Seitz, Emma Koch, Lizzie Blach, Hermina Laubengayer, Eva Widemayer (Mrs. Stoffer of North Lake), Ida Schiller and Mary Lambert (Mrs. Oscar Schneider). Several years later the names of Amanda Koch and Olga

Hoffman (Mrs. J. Strieter) appear on the list of class members. In 1907 Miss Wackenhut organized the Cradle Roll Department, listing the names and birthdays of all the babies and children who were too young to attend Sunday school classes. Beginning with thirty-three names, the very first of which was Bertha Messner (now Mrs. G. Douglass), the list grew by the end of the year to sixty-two names. Included in this list are the following names: Marie and Thelma Sager, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Sager; Florence and Norman Schmidt, Clarence Nicolai, Gertrude Eppler, Mildred Hieber (now Mrs. G. Hopper), Alvin and Irene Vail (now Mrs. H. Lehman), Cora Lesser (Mrs. Wm. Beach) and Norma Schiller.

In 1909 Miss Wackenhut organized the Beginners' Department, with the class sessions taking place in the little schoolhouse at the rear the church, where the department continued to conduct all its activities until the building was torn down in the spring of 1940 to make room for the new hall. While the hall was being built, the classes met in the basement at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Schalle on Orchard street. Since the completion of the hall they have been meeting in the new basement room which now is equipped with low tables and other conveniences.

Miss Wackenhut had no special equipment when she began her work with the beginners. It was years before she even acquired a sand table or a piano. For her desk, she used the same old black walnut one that has been used by every preacher at St. Paul's in confirmation instruction classes. The old organ (the first one purchased for the church in 1889) was used during the many years before a piano was purchased, with Miss Olga Hoffman (Mrs. J. Strieter) serving as organist. (Incidentally, with the exception of a few short intervals, Mrs. Strieter was organist and assistant to Miss Wackenhut from the time the department was organized until her retirement, about three years ago, because of ill-health.)
