**Army Recruiting Office To Be Opened In Chelsea**  
Capt. Kenneth L. Sibley, Commanding Officer of the U. S. Army Recruiting Station, Army Building, Ann Arbor, announces that Sgt. Norwood Eodway will be at the Chelsea post office every Wednesday to answer questions and accept enlistments and re-enlistments in the Regular Army.  
Men honorably discharged from the army who meet the physical requirements may re-enlist within three months after date of discharge, regain their former grades, and be eligible for the enlistment bonus of \$100.00 for every full year of service since their last enlistment, as well as their military pay. However, enlistment must be made within 20 days after discharge in order to be eligible for the enlistment furlough which may be as long as 90 days, depending on the length of previous service.  
In addition, men enlisting or re-enlisting for three years will be given their choice of serving in any one of the following Theaters: European, Pacific, China, Caribbean Defense Command, Mediterranean or the Alaskan Defense Command. Also, they may select their arm or service. Enlistments or re-enlistments for 18 months or two years are also open.

All male citizens between 17 and 35 who are physically and otherwise qualified may enlist in the regular army and realize their ambition to travel, secure an education and obtain life-time security. This is the first time in history that the army has opened enlistment to 17-year-olds who have the consent of their parents or guardian.  
Former commissioned officers again have 90 days to enlist in the first grade.

Philip Tompkins, son of Richard Tompkins of Madison street, and Paul Rudd, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Rudd of North Main street, were seriously injured in an automobile accident early Sunday morning on new US-12 just west of the Grass Lake road.  
The accident occurred in the middle lane of the highway when the boys' car, which was traveling eastward, collided with one occupied by five ladies on their way back to Jackson from a Saturday's shopping trip in Detroit.  
According to reports from people on the road, traveling was very dangerous at that hour, and visibility poor because of sleet and snow.  
Both Philip and Paul suffered broken right legs, and Paul has two bad lacerations above his left eye. According to Jackson physicians, Philip may be suffering from internal injuries. X-rays have been taken, the results of which were not determined Monday.  
Mrs. Dora Scheele and Mrs. Frances Willard of Jackson, occupants of the westbound car, died about twenty minutes after the accident and a third lady, Mrs. Alma Hellinger, was reported to be worse Tuesday noon. The other two are hospitalized, with their condition said to be "fairly good."

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

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

OLD JUDGE: "Well, as a result of their medical research, they found out that approximately 95% of the people who drink drink sensibly, 5% do so unwisely, at times. Included in that 5% is the small percentage known as alcoholics." HENRY: "But why are they called sick people?" OLD JUDGE: "Because it has been discovered that, in many cases, excessive drinking is a symptom of some physical or emotional maladjustment... not the cause of it." HENRY: "Now I understand it, Judge. I am glad to hear of the modern approach to this problem and that so much is really being done to help these folks."
