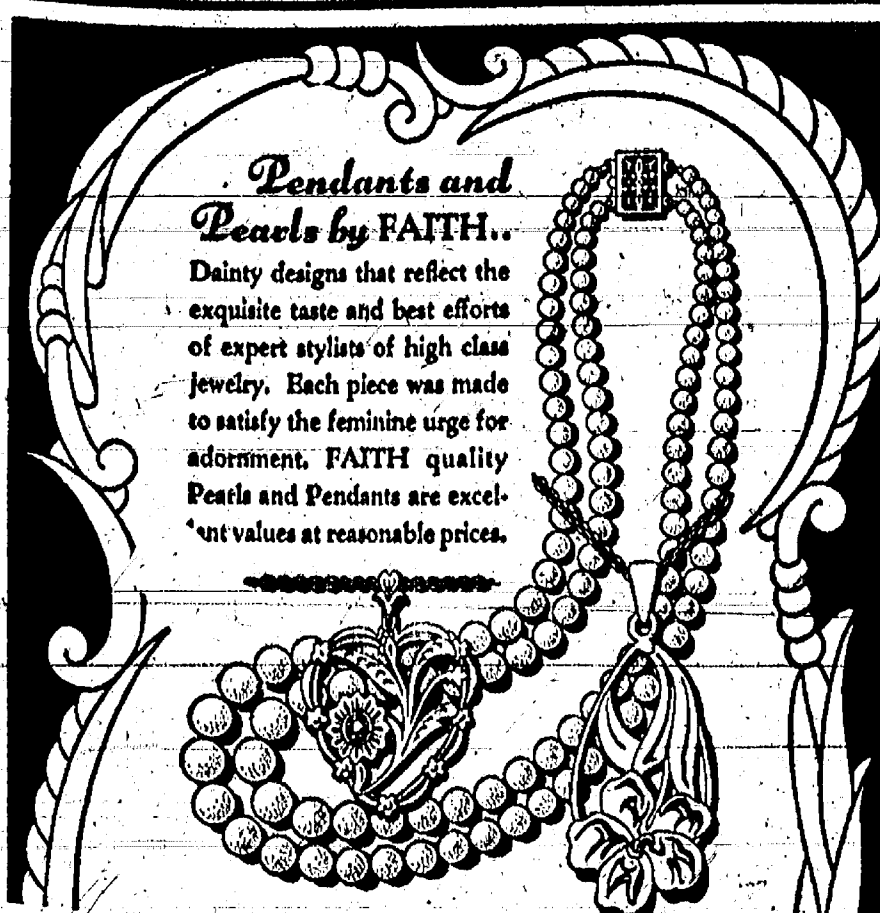

Staffan Starts Work On Three New Houses

G. L. Staffan has started the construction of three new houses in the Jas. M. Congdon Subdivision, located in the southwest section of Chelsea.

One of the houses is being built on Taylor street, and two on a new street to be known as "Maewood," which will be opened south from Pierce street parallel with Taylor.

According to Staffan, the new homes are being constructed under FHA specifications. They are to contain five rooms, and are of cement block construction, plastered and painted on the outside, with the inside stripped, insulated and plastered. Forced air gas heat, with air conditioning, will be used.

It is hoped to have one of the homes ready for occupancy in about 30 days, with the others ready a few weeks later. According to FHA regulations, the homes must be offered for GI purchase for a period of thirty days after completion, and if not purchased by a GI during that time they will be offered for sale to the general public.

T. B. Quigley is the cement block contractor on these new houses, and Walter Gage and Clarence Ulrich are doing the carpenter work.

Mr. Staffan is also planning the construction of two larger homes in the McKune Estates Subdivision north of town under the same plan, with work to start in June.

With the construction of these new homes, and others which have been started or will be under construction in the near future, Chelsea's acute housing shortage promises to be somewhat alleviated during the next few months. However, government restrictions will not allow for nearly as much home construction as had been planned here for this year.

Farmers' Meeting

A special meeting will be held next Monday evening, April 8, at 8 o'clock in the Agricultural room of the Chelsea high school for the purpose of discussing the use of lime and fertilizer in soil fertility and crop rotations, according to H. S. Oiler, County Agricultural Agent, who states that farmers in this area are much interested in using lime to the best advantage.

Ed. Longnecker of Michigan State College—Soils Department will be present to discuss the different forms of lime and fertilizer and their proper use. He will also discuss the effect of using too much lime or where it is not needed. The results of recent work at the State Experimental Station Plant food needs for field crops and pastures will also be discussed.

Farm Cleanup Week Is Set for April 8 to 14

Lansing—Plans for a nation-wide "farm cleanup week" from April 8 to 14, to help step up 1946 livestock production and farm profits, have been announced by livestock health authorities.

Chief objective of the effort in this state will be a thorough cleanup of livestock quarters, barnyards, and lots, to eradicate parasites, germs, and disease hazards which could be a threat to livestock health. Cleanup suggestions, offered by the American Foundation for Animal Health, include:

"Clean and disinfect livestock quarters, particularly where young animals and poultry are to be born and housed."

"Remove old straw stacks, by spreading straw on fields. Old stacks harbor worms, parasites, and disease germs."

"Clean up barnyards and livestock lots. They are often heavily infested with parasites."

"Drain low spots in barn lots, where water stands, fence off, and old stacks which cannot be drained. Wet places are germ-breeding."

"Haul out all manure; manure piles are sources of parasite infestation."

"Pick up nails, glass, and other sharp objects which could be swallowed by livestock with fatal consequences."

"Move young animals to fresh, clean ground as early as possible. As added health precautions, be sure pigs are vaccinated against erysipelas, and calves, horses, and breeding stock checked for brucellosis, and watch for signs of disease so prompt corrective measures may be taken."

\$2500 Essay Contest Is Announced By Legion

Open to any man, woman or child (except paid employees of the Legion) a \$2,500 essay contest for all essay contests with a top prize of \$1,000 cash has been announced by the American Legion. Closing date of the contest is April 30, 1946.

In addition to the \$1,000 first prize, the second place winner will get \$500 and third, \$250. Five \$50 awards make up the \$2,500 total.

Essays must explain how the Legion's program for maximum employment and veterans' employment can best be put into effect or improved. Copies of these programs may be secured from any Legion post or from the state American Legion Headquarters, 602 Barlum Tower, Detroit 26, Michigan.

Essays must be held to 3,000 words, typed double space, on one side of white paper and submitted in quadruplicate. Each essay must show the writer's full name and address, and be mailed to The American Legion, Employment Division, 1608 K Street, Washington 6, D. C. no later than midnight, April 30.

Council of Vets' Affairs Will Aid Beneficiaries

A definite service is planned by the Ann Arbor Council of Veterans Affairs to assure wives, parents or guardians of men who died while in service or who have passed away since their discharge, that they are receiving all the benefits to which they are entitled.

Beneficiaries are entitled to insurance, pensions for themselves and the children, gratuity pay and the like. These benefits are available not only from the Federal Government, but from the State Government as well.

To carry out this service the following information is necessary: a complete list of the men who died in service, the name or names of their wives or fathers and mothers, and the addresses of the beneficiaries or dependents. This information should be mailed to the Ann Arbor Council of Veterans Affairs, Information and Counseling Center, 233 East Ann St., Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Upon completion of the list the center will contact each person to make certain they have taken advantage of all the rights and benefits available to them and also to see that all papers are in order.

Enlistments Are Open In Navy V-5 Program

Enlistments were opened April 1 in the fall class of the Navy's V-5 Naval Aviation program, according to Naval Officer in Charge, 947 Book Building, Detroit 26.

Seniors enlisting in the program will choose their own college and enter upon their own initiative after being accepted by the Navy. Training will include four college semesters, 15 months flight training, and flight duty with the fleet.

High school seniors 17 through 19½ who will graduate in time to enter college in the fall are eligible. Applicants will be called to Detroit for government expense to take mental and physical examinations.

School principals and faculty advisors have full information concerning the V-5 program and have a supply of the questionnaires to be used in applying for examination.



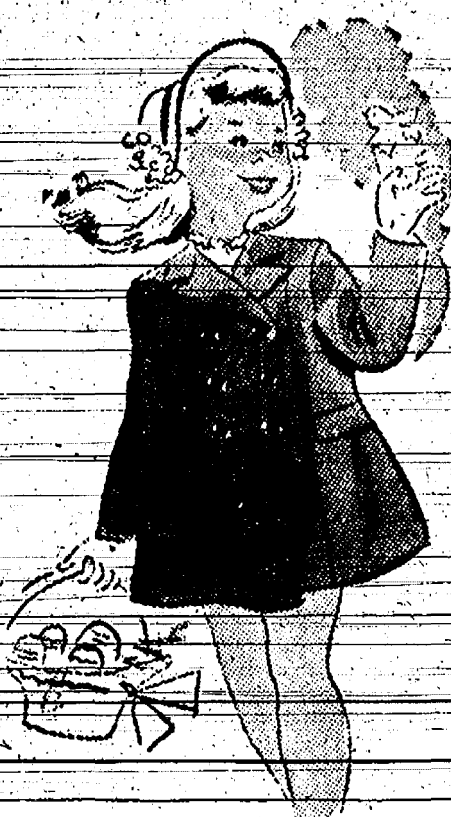

DEATHS

H. Wirt Newkirk, former resident of Ann Arbor, who had been prominently in county and state affairs, died Sunday, March 31, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Nellie Newkirk Zimmerman, in St. Petersburg, Fla. He was 91 years old.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester Newkirk, he was born in Dexter on Aug. 1, 1854 and on his mother's side was a descendant of President Millard Fillmore.

Graduating from Ann Arbor high school and the University of Michigan law school, Mr. Newkirk began his law career in 1880 when he became circuit court commissioner of Bay county, later serving as prosecuting attorney for Lake county and in 1892 he was elected to the legislature from the same county. From 1894 to 1898, he was cashier of the Dexter Savings Bank, and from 1898 to 1900 served as probate judge of Washtenaw county.

A resident of Ann Arbor for more than 60 years, Mr. Newkirk served as city treasurer, as mayor of the city, and for three terms as representative to the state legislature.

He was one of the oldest members of the Knights Templar in Michigan, was past exalted ruler of the Ann Arbor Elks, and a Woodman.

In 1880, in Dexter, Mr. Newkirk was married to Eleanor J. Birkett, who preceded him in death in 1943. Besides the daughter, Mrs. Zimmerman, he is survived by a son, Birkett Newkirk, of Dexter, and several grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 Sunday afternoon at the Gorman funeral home in Dexter, with Rev. Carl Strange officiating. Masonic obsequies will be conducted at Forest Lawn cemetery.

George C. Koenigster

George C. Koenigster, 70 years old, died Monday afternoon at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Reuben Lesser, 2435 Manchester Road, Sylvan township, after a long illness.

He was born May 31, 1875, in Lima township, the youngest of four children born to Christian and Christina Haist Koenigster.

He married Fredericka Weber in Lima township on Feb. 10, 1898, and they lived in Lima until 1927, when they moved to Chelsea. Mrs. Koenigster died June 19, 1936, and Mr. Koenigster had since made his home with his daughters.

Prayer service will be held at his late residence at 1:30 this afternoon, followed by funeral services at Zion Lutheran church at 2 o'clock. Rev. M. W. Brueckner will officiate, and burial will be in Zion cemetery.

He was one of seven children, and the only one born in the log house on the farm in Sharon township, one-half mile west of the Everett farm on the Manchester road, which was taken up from the Government in 1833 by his grandfather, John Everett.

When young, he went to Stockbridge, and was engaged in the hardware business. He married Flora Thompson on Aug. 17, 1887. He was a charter member of the Stockbridge Baptist church.

They left Stockbridge many years ago, living in Oklahoma for awhile, also Pennsylvania, and for several years have resided in Norwalk, Ohio. He is survived by his wife and daughter, Mabel Louise, who is a teacher in the Cleveland, Ohio school system; also one brother, Fred, of Seattle, Wash., and two sisters, Mrs. Irene E. 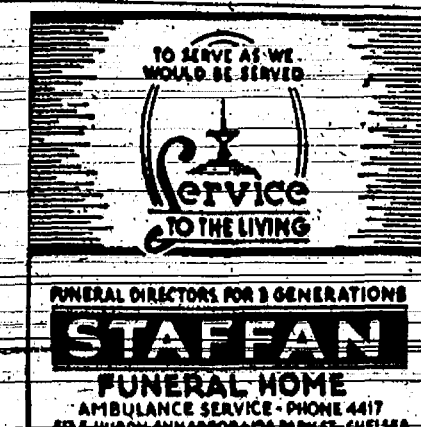

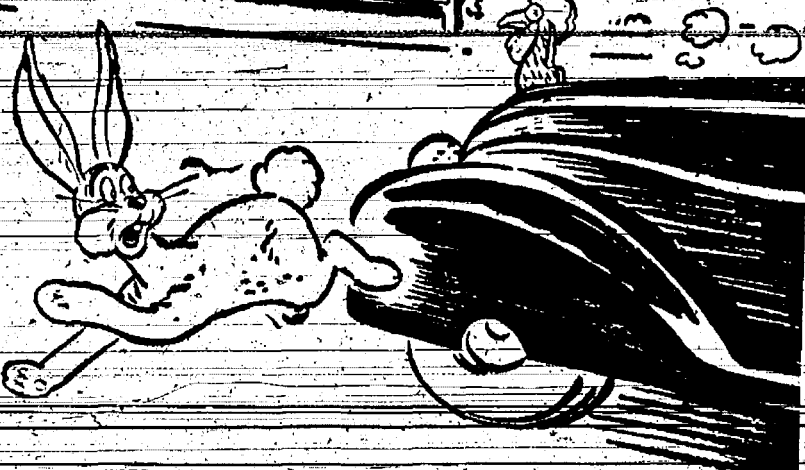

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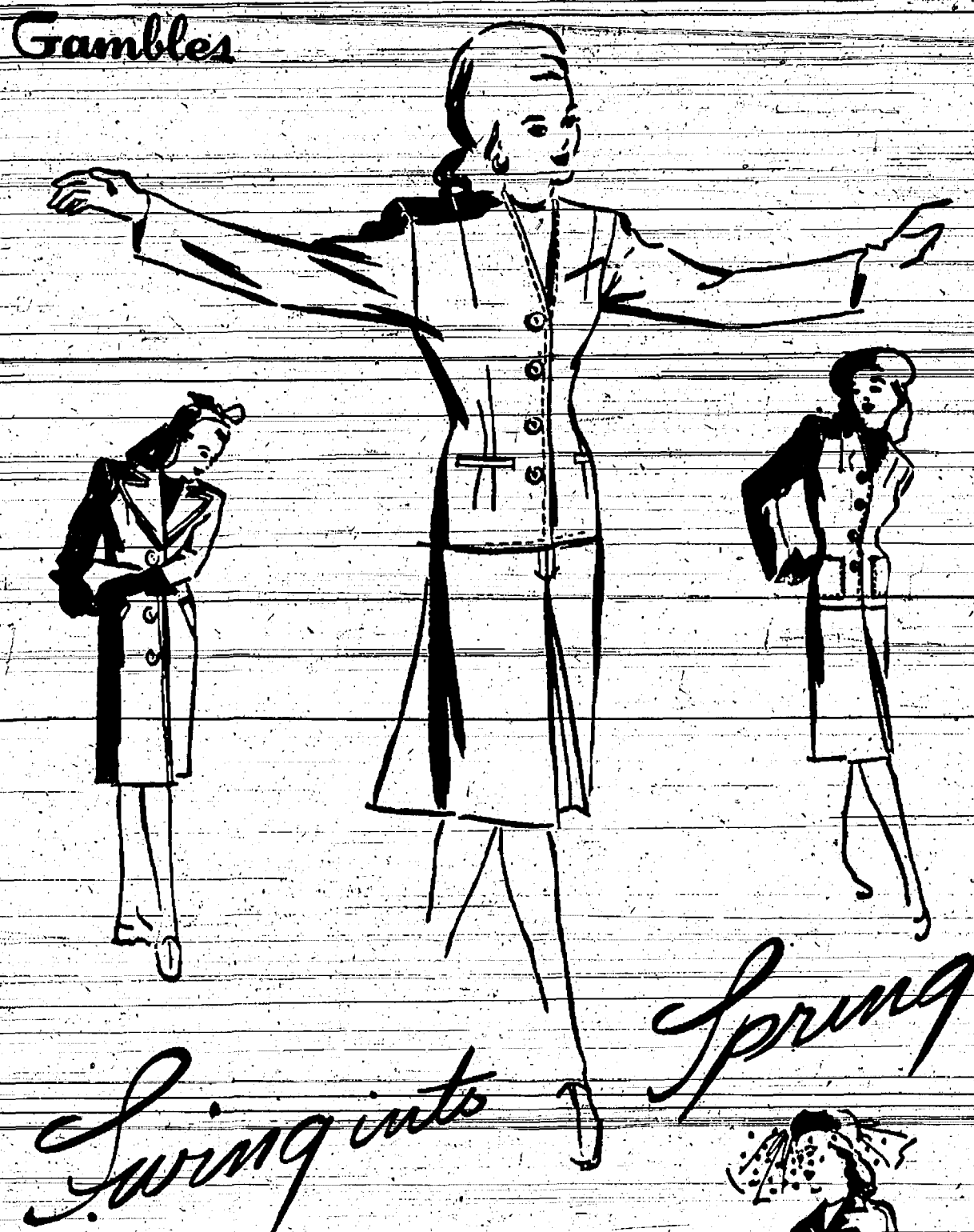
