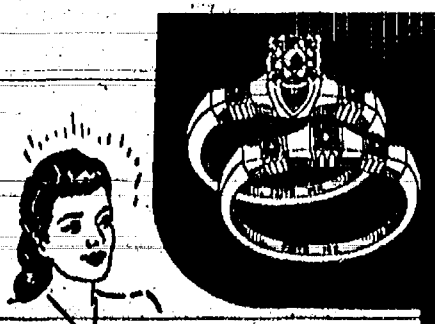

## Announce New Policy On Chloride Application

Shortage of funds has forced the Washtenaw County Road Commission to change its past policy of applying calcium chloride for dust laying on a matching basis, Superintendent Manager Kenneth Hallenbeck has announced.

Recent years the property owner paid the road commission for the material used in the first application, usually during the month of April or May, and the county crews applied the material at county expense. The second application, together with the material, was spread entirely at county expense.

Property owners wishing the road past their homes treated with the dust layer may purchase the chloride at the rate of \$2.00 per hundred lineal feet of road, two drills wide, Hallenbeck said. "We will continue as we have in the past to use our crew and truck to spread the material."

Hallenbeck further explained the Commission would have preferred to continue its old policy, as the admission of dust actually represents to us the disappearance of costly road surfaces.

"Better service on chloride jobs will be secured," Hallenbeck said, "if residents in an area or community will band together to collect the necessary amount from the several neighbors and send or bring this to the road of office in Ann Arbor or to the highway yard on West Middle street, Chelsea, with a detailed list of where the chloride is to be applied."

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## Gas Co. Discontinues New Heating Contracts

Because of a reduction in the output of gas from Michigan fields, the shortage of pipeline capacity from the Texas fields, and the ever-increasing number of gas heating units being installed, local dealers in gas furnaces have been advised by Chas. K. Henderson, manager of the Michigan Consolidated Gas Co., Ann Arbor, that only those orders for heating purposes taken previous to April 15 can be accepted.

Other restrictions have been placed on other gas uses such as water heaters and stoves, and present domestic industrial users are in nowise affected.

This curtailment is necessary to avoid over commitment for heating purposes of the present flow from Texas. Permits for additional pipeline, to be operated by a new company, the Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Co., depend on the outcome of hearings now being held before the Federal Public Commission, Detroit. If the request is granted it is thought possible that the line might be completed by January, 1946.

In several Michigan areas this curtailment has been in effect since last August.

## Chelsea MOMS Vote To Discontinue Club

Chelsea MOMS met recently at the home of the president, Mrs. John Fischer, East street, with ten members present. At this meeting it was voted to pay all bills, and give the rest of the money, which amounted to \$75.00, to the Greenhouse fund. Reluctantly, the members voted to disband.

Organized during the war, the MOMS were what their name implied, "Mothers of Men in Service," and their work was directly associated with their boys and girls in service. They sent cards, letters, boxes, and served at the USO in Ann Arbor, and they also did a great deal of Red Cross work for Percy Jones.

Since the surrender of Japan most of the boys have returned home so there is no work to do which is directly related to them. The Red Cross work done by this organization is now a duplicate of the work done by the American Legion Auxiliary and the V.F.W. Auxiliary. Most members of the MOMS are members of one of the Auxiliaries, so they will still be doing work for disabled veterans.

The MOMS extend their appreciation to St. Paul's church for the use of their hall as a meeting place.

## With Our Men In Service

Sgt. Fred Harris, Jr. received his honorable discharge at Camp Atterbury, Ind. on April 4.

He was inducted into the army on May 1944, received his basic training at Fort McClellan, Ala., leaving for overseas in October 1944.

Sgt. Harris served with the 379th Infantry Regiment, 98th Division for three months, seeing action in France and Germany. Following this he was hospitalized in France and England for four months, later being transferred to the Office of Military Government in Berlin, where he was stationed until his return to the States.

Fred is entitled to wear the ETO ribbon with two bronze stars, Good Conduct medal, Combat Infantryman badge, and Victory medal.

Previous to his induction he was employed by the Federal Screw Works.

## Ensign J. E. "Bud" Rabley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Rabley, received his honorable discharge at Great Lakes, Mich. on April 3 and returned to his home here the following week.

"Bud" enlisted in the Navy on February 13, 1942 and received his boot training at Great Lakes. He then attended Aviation Machinists' Mate School in Chicago, later being assigned to patrol bombers on the east coast as flight engineer. He attended Officers' Training School at Duke University in 1944, and was commissioned an Ensign at Clinton, Okla. in August 1945, following which he served as an instructor at Miami, Fla.

He is entitled to wear the ETO ribbon, Good Conduct ribbon, and American Theatre ribbon.

Before entering the service Bud was employed at the Ann Arbor Bank.

## T-5 Luther M. Kusterer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Waldo H. Kusterer, received his honorable discharge at Camp Atterbury, Ind. on April 14, and returned to his home here the following day.

Luther was inducted into the army on January 15, 1944, and received his basic training at Fort Benning, Ga., and Fort Bragg, N. C., leaving for overseas duty on October 6, 1944. He saw action in France and Germany with the 100th Infantry Division.

He is entitled to wear the Combat Infantryman badge, ETO ribbon with bronze battle stars, Victory ribbon, and Presidential Unit Citation.

## Willard A. Carlson, Jr., S-1C, G.M. son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Carlson, enlisted in the Navy on Oct. 1, 1943, and received his honorable discharge from Great Lakes Naval Separation Center on April 20, 1946.

He served aboard the U.S.S. P.C.E. doing convoy and anti-submarine patrol duty in the Atlantic from Trinidad to Recife, Brazil, also serving in the Pacific, the Philippines and the Dutch East Indies.

Medals he is entitled to wear are the Victory medal, Philippine Liberation ribbon, Asiatic Pacific Area campaign medal and American Area campaign medal.

## Recruiting Caravan In Ann Arbor On Friday

A large, colorful eight-vehicle recruiting caravan from Scott Field, Ill. will be on exhibit in Ann Arbor beginning at 11:00 a.m. on Friday, April 26. The 200-block of East Ann street will be blocked off by the police department, who will also escort the caravan into town.

This is the most modern and up-to-date mobile display of Army Air Force equipment on the road today and presents to the people a material picture of the tremendous technical training possibilities behind a future in the armed forces.

Five of the large vehicles are converted semi-trailer-tractor units and house a complete display, including a B-29 engine (cut-away view), electrically controlled and in operation, multiple gun turrets taken from some of the largest U. S. bombers, a varied amount of captured Japanese and German equipment, a complete and operating photographic laboratory including the column and instrument panel of an army P-38 reconnaissance fighter, set up with aerial-photographic cameras and many other items too numerous to mention. The technical equipment in these displays should be of particular interest to physics and science students in high school and college.

The recruiting office in the Armory will be open all day and recruiting personnel will be at the exhibit to assist young men in signing up for the army, as well as to answer questions.

We take this step most reluctantly and only do so because the record-breaking demand for space heating has now exhausted the amount of gas available to us, both from the present pipe line which brings natural gas to us from Texas, and such gas as we can make in our own emergency manufacturing plant.

Our contract with the Pipe Line Company is for two million cubic feet of natural gas per day and we have no assurance of being able to exceed that commitment this coming winter. The capacity of our emergency plant is almost two million cubic feet per day.

However, since the removal of war restrictions on house-heating gas, our house-heating customers have increased from 700 to 2,000 or almost 20 per cent of our total customers. Because of this and other increased uses of gas, our peak day consumption is expected to be increased to four million cubic feet this coming winter.

Practically every new house being built wants house-heating gas and applications from existing homes have reached record-breaking figures.

Faced with this unprecedented demand, we will be called upon to use our manufacturing plant to its capacity and we expect to be able to meet that demand.

We can do no more.

THERE IS NO SOURCE FROM WHICH ANY GREATER DEMAND CAN BE SUPPLIED AT THIS TIME.

For some time we have been fully aware of the need for more gas both in this area and in all other districts of Michigan served by us.

We have been making plans, which, when consummated, will assure an adequate supply of gas. However, it will be some months before additional supplies are available.

We deeply regret the necessity of limiting the use of gas for space heating in any way at this time. You may be sure that the present limitation will be removed just as soon as possible.

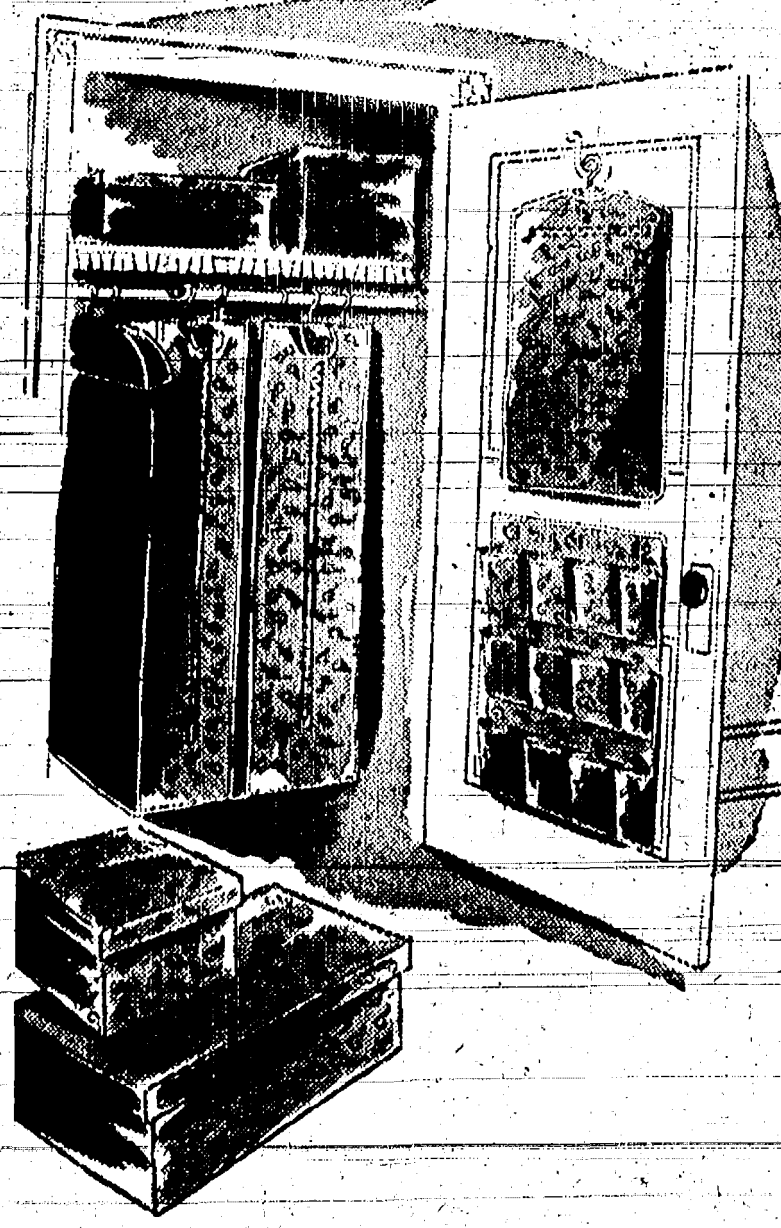

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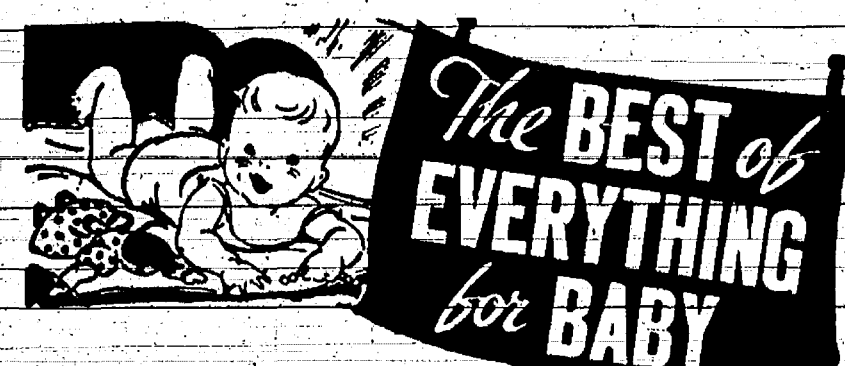

## Favorable Conditions Face Trout Fishermen

Lansing—Barring the one hazard of heavy late-April rains, fishermen should find stream and sideroad conditions to their liking when trout season opens April 27. Supervisors of the conservation department's 11 fisheries districts report uniformly favorable conditions.

The mild winter provided a good carryover of wild trout, and early opening of sideroads following fine March weather permitted larger than usual preseason plantings of legal-size fish, especially in the upper peninsula. If there are no heavy rains, streams are expected to be near normal levels and clear. Snow is dis-

appearing from woods and swamps. The advanced season will have the effect in some streams, however, of allowing big rainbows to complete their spawning and return to the Great Lakes before trout fishing begins.

Fly-fishing is expected to be better than usual on opening day on most lower peninsula streams. Trout have been observed feeding on flies already in Sturgeon river, Cheboygan county and Bear creek, Manistee county. Large stone fly hatches have been seen on streams of Crawford, Roscommon, Ogemaw, Oscoda and Montmorency counties.

Rains could quickly roil most streams, to favor bait fishermen. Little affected by surface drainage, however, are the small spring-fed streams of southern Michigan which support trout year-round.

Many anglers will give their first attention to trout lakes, which are less affected than streams by adverse spring weather. The lakes furnish their best trout fishing in the spring while the trout are near the surface or in short waterways in southern Michigan will open the season on specially managed trout ponds, though they are limited there to two eight-inch trout taken on artificial flies.

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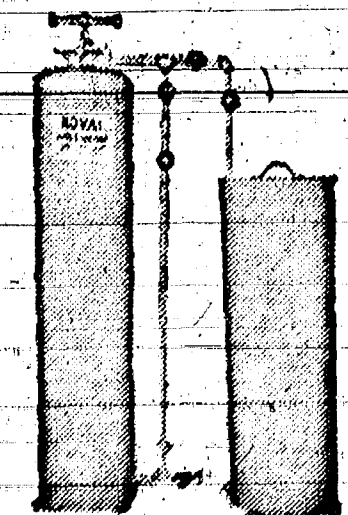
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
