According to Roger L. Morrison, University of Michigan professor of highway engineering and transport, December is always highest in traffic fatalities because of a combination of drink, darkness, winter weather, and holiday festivities. Saturdays and Sundays are the worst days as there are more persons on the streets "available for killing," he indicates.

Last December 3,330 persons were killed in United States traf-dic mishaps, but Prof. Morrison says the number probably will be greater this year because traffic accidents have increased about 8

Alcohol plays a major part in 50 per cent of pedestrian and vehicle occupant traffic deaths during the Christmas month, he states. Police reports generally say only one in five persons killed have indulged.
