Record Onion Crop Can Be Used In Tempting Menus

Onions are one of the most adaptable and most plentiful foods on the market right now. So let's make use of the flavor, good quality and low cost of this record crop by including them in your cooking.

Evelyn Craig, foods and nutrition specialist at Michigan State college, says that her favorite recipe for onion soup makes a perfect opening for dinner or luncheon. To make this soup, cook two cups of onion in butter until lightly browned.

Onions make a very attractive combination served with carrots—either raw in salads or cooked. They combine well with tomatoes, too. And for seasonings they are indispensable in meats, soups, salads—just about everything but dessert.

In baked stuffed form, onions are an excellent way to use up leftover meat. Remove the centers from large boiled onions, stuff with a mixture of bread crumbs, seasonings, the chopped onion centers and diced meat. Top with bread crumbs and minced parsley before browning in the oven.






