## DEATHS

Evert L. Benton

Funeral services for Evert L. Benton, 50, of East Lansing, a former Chelsea resident, who died Tuesday, April 22, in a Lansing hospital after the third of a series of operations he underwent during the past year, were held at the Gorsline-Runciman funeral home in Lansing at 10 o'clock Friday, April 25. Rev. H. G. Gage, of the People's church, East Lansing, where Mr. Benton was formerly Sunday school superintendent, officiated at the services and burial was in Woodlawn cemetery, Jackson.

Mr. Benton, at the time of his death, was Michigan State college animal husbandry extension specialist, and was well known among Michigan livestock men. He was secretary of the state committee named to study the control of Bang's disease in dairy and beef cattle and filled that office also in the Michigan Cattle Feeders' Association and the Michigan Lamb Feeders' Association.

He had been on the college staff since 1938. Graduating from the college in 1930, he taught vocational agriculture at Hudson for a time, and also served as county agent in Tuscola county before he became a member of the college staff.

He was born at Dexter, March 9, 1897, the son of Willis H. and Mattie Waldron Benton. He graduated from Chelsea high school, was married in June, 1920, to Miss Marion McArthur of Jackson, and resided in Chelsea for a number of years before he entered college to go on with his education.

Survivors are the widow, Marion, of 340 Division street, East Lansing; a daughter, Mrs. Leonard Gardner, of Fremont; one grandson, and a sister, Mrs. Burr Carroll, of San Diego, Calif.

Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Bradbury and sons, Keith and James, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Jay and Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Winans, all of this vicinity, attended the funeral services.

At that minute he raced up the stairs and began to tell the teachers of his loss of money. Then they asked him a silly question, "Was your locker locked?"

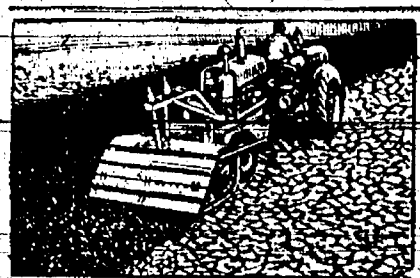
"Of course my locker was locked," he said. "I always keep it locked."

APTITUDE TESTS

In the eyes of many of the Chelsea high school students, the Aptitude Tests given were not so difficult as they were lengthy. The tests showed the different abilities of each student. Many of the tests were very long; when the clerical test came, a great number of participants were fooled by the short time, six minutes, given for this test.

But we didn't get to go. The missus was tired after working in the yard, and we just didn't want to leave her.

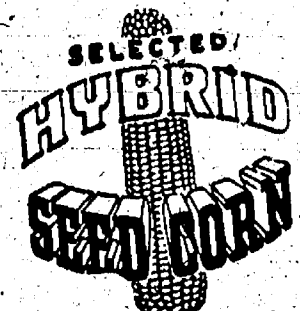
Then how did we know the fish was so good? Because the folks didn't forget us. They sent Skippy Henderson over with two steam-
