Bulldogs Remove Sting from Saline Hornets Last Friday in Hard-Fought League Game

Final Score Is 20-6 in Spite of Stubborn Defense Displayed

Although the Bulldogs ran into more of a fight than was expected last Friday afternoon at Saline, they still emerged with a very satisfying win, 20 to 6, over a surprisingly spunky Hornet eleven. Saline was unimpressed by the favored Bulldogs and after allowing Chelsea to score in the first five minutes of play they became very tough on defense and time after time stopped the local boy's attack cold, and but for the clock running out at the half-time they would have undoubtedly scored, as they had a first down and goal to go, on the Chelsea 5.

Just as in the last two games Chelsea roared down the field to pay dirt after taking the opening kickoff, Slane, Vogel and Carlson all had a hand in the drive that started on their own 22 and needed but 11 plays to cover the 78 yards. Slane was the workhorse as he plunged and ran 65 of the 78 yards. Vogel scored on a reverse from the 10 and after Baldwin's kick split the uprights, Chelsea led, 7 to 0.

From then until Saline started their drive just before the half, both teams had trouble once they penetrated the others 30-yard line. With four minutes of the second quarter left, Slane kicked from his own 29 to the Saline 38 where it was taken by Gilligan and ran back to the 50.

Sparked by a little pint-sized Randall, Saline quarterback, and Gilligan, the Hornets rugged fullback, they ground out yardage over center and tackle, only to run out of time as they hit the Chelsea 6-yard line.

Saline again kicked off to Chelsea to start the second half and Miller unlimbered his passing attack as they started to move. His fourth toss, however, was wide of the goal and Randall picked it out of the air on the Hornets' 40 and ran quickly to return the favor though as on the second play Tom Korman, the fired one which Miller gathered in on his own 28 and ran it back to the Chelsea 39.

From that point the Bulldogs again began to pass and running sparking the attack downfield. With a first down on the 5, Slane plunged twice to carry it to the one and from there Miller slashed off tackle to score. Again Baldwin's kick was good and Chelsea led 14 to 0.

The Hornets' came back with a bang, as this time they took the kickoff and weren't to be denied. Gilligan again was the spearhead as Saline moved 60 yards in 11 plays to pay dirt with Jaeger, Hornet left half, plunging the last 2 yards through center to score. The point after was wide to the right, and with three minutes of the fourth quarter gone Chelsea led 14 to 6.

Slane and Miller combined to rack up Chelsea's last score in the waning minutes of the ball game. An exchange of punts gave the Bulldogs the ball on their own 38. On the first play from scrimmage Slane slashed off left tackle and almost got away, but was tripped up on the Saline 41. Three plays moved it to the 24 and from here Slane again powered over left tackle and went all the way to score standing up. This time Carlson couldn't find the handle on the snap-back for the point after and by the time he did get it in position for Baldwin to kick the Saline line snowed them under.

The game ended with Randall throwing two incomplete forward passes in an attempt for a consolation score.

Chelsea again faced a very fine fullback last Friday. Gilligan was outstanding in defeat with a very young and inexperienced team. The Huron League seems to have an over abundant supply of good fullbacks this year: Milan's Benjamin, U. High's West, Saline's Gilligan, and last, but far from least, Chelsea's own Slane. It would be a hard job to pick the best from these four boys.

Tomorrow night at 8:00 under the lights at the local athletic field Chelsea entertains Dundee in another game that the Bulldogs should win if they continue to play heads-up football. This is their last home appearance of the season, so let's all be there for this one.

New Factory Being Erected at Site of Old Cement Plant

Rice, owner and manager of the Detroit Abrasive company which has been operating in Detroit for a number of years, recently purchased from the Blass Elevator company on the Chelsea-Dexter road, seven and one-half acres of land at Four Mile Lake which is part of the old cement plant property on which the Blass Elevator buildings also are located.

Laying of the foundation for a concrete block building, 40 x 100 feet in size, was begun on Monday and plans of the company call for completion of the building this fall, with operation of the plant to begin as soon as the building is ready.

According to present plans, the company will eventually move its entire equipment from Detroit to the Chelsea plant.

Principal operation at the plant will be the reclaiming of abrasives.

Before that tackle box is put away for the season, the conservation department has one last request of fishermen who caught fish this summer: if tagged fish were taken, send in the tags.

Some 10,000 trout, pike and bass of catchable sizes have been swimming about in the state's lakes and streams this year, adorned with fin, tail or jaw tags, but tag returns have been small. Fisheries men have heard of some anglers who got tagged fish but kept the tags for souvenirs, and put off reporting them.

Fisheries men assure tag holders the tags will be returned if the fisherman wants them, together with measurements of the fish at the time of tagging and the place of release. And it ought to make

Michigan Ranks High in Rural Electricity

Only eight states in the United States rank higher than Michigan in electrification of farmsteads, a federal survey reaching Michigan State college revealed this week.

Only eight per cent of Michigan's farms are not electrified. Connecticut, with only 1.5 per cent electrified, leads the nation. North Dakota, with 84.5 per cent shows the least improvement.

Only 14,029 Michigan farms are not equipped with electricity. Many new lines being installed by private and public utilities along with REA agencies will cut the number below 10,000 within the next year.

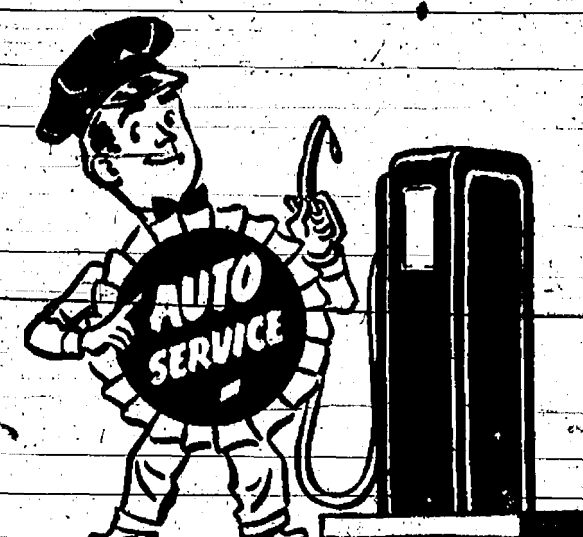

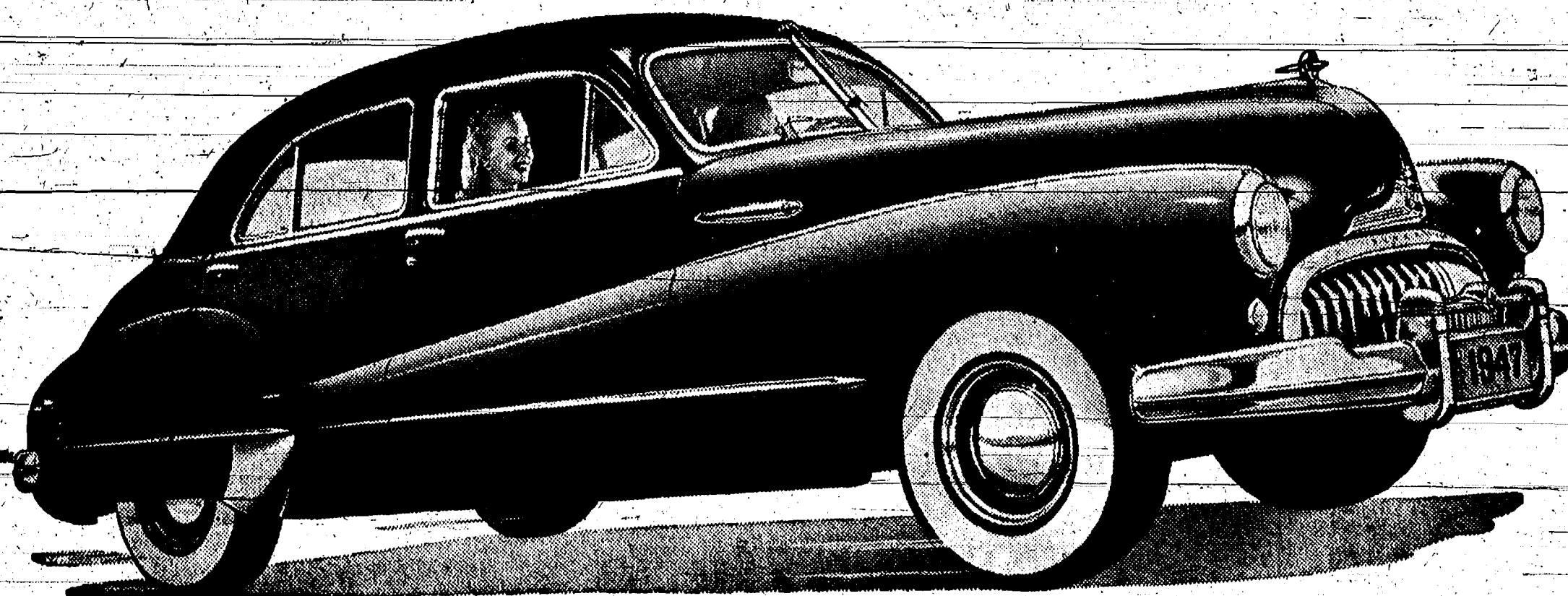

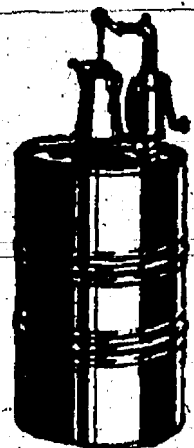
