"Good times" are due to continue in 1948. A 5 to 8 per cent increase in retail sales is forecast.

Such is the consensus of government economists and private experts who make a practice of looking into the crystal ball.

As a curb against a further rise in the cost of living, which already is 38.5 per cent higher than what it was in 1939, the President's Council of Economic Advisors and the Federal Reserve Board are proposing that Uncle Sam should tighten bank credits.

Hence you may see some dips in the Full Employment Boom. Government planners, however, haven't been right in their predictions about hard times and unemployment after V-J day? Well, we've had inflation ever since!

An encouraging sign in 1948 is the prospect of labor peace and more production. The Taft-Hartley act of Congress and the Bonine-Tripp labor mediation act of the Michigan legislature are being given credit for a 75 per cent reduction in strikes in the Detroit area alone.

The state act provides that a majority of employees of any plant, not just the officers of the union, must authorize a strike. The state authorizes a special election after mediation has failed. Mediation begins when the union files a notice of intent to strike.

More inflation in 1948 is likely to bring increased pressure on the Michigan legislature for new taxes. How to finance public services of government will dominate the special session, which is to start in mid-March, 1948, at Lansing.

County governments spent 25 per cent more money in 1946 than they did in 1945. Leroy C. Smith, legislative chairman of the Michigan County Road association, warns that Michigan's highway system faces a complete breakdown unless counties get more money. He would raise more funds by adding two cents to the gasoline tax.

The court may not direct or control legislative action, reminded the State Supreme court as it knocked out the legislature's single school district plan for state educational needs. The ruling would divert \$6,836,000 more to public schools from the sales tax fund, 76 per cent of which is returned to home governments including the state.

If state legislators would decide to ignore the sales tax constitutional mandate, as they have done the constitutional provision for reapportionment, apparently they could do so. However, the case is different. Rural areas fear legislative domination by urban areas. Hence reapportionment has been ignored by rural legislators who now control rural areas. They want more money for home governments including the schools. It is not likely that legislators would dare to ignore the sales tax diversion amendment for this reason.

Governor Kim Sigler, who amazed capital observers by his new techniques of getting action from the state legislature, is due to recuperate from his recent operation before swinging into the 1948 campaign.

Request Game Kill Report Cards Early

Lansing—Deer hunters and small game hunters who have put their guns away for the season, are reminded by the conservation department that it is now too soon to send in those game kill report cards.

A game kill report card is issued to each hunter and trapper as part of the hunting or trapping license. It must be separated from the license along a perforation, filled out and mailed with a one-cent stamp. It must be mailed sometime before Feb. 15, but conservation department men urge early mailing, so an early start may be made analyzing the reports through card punching and sorting machines.

When broken down by counties, the game production figures are of considerable local interest, and the broad trends in the production of pheasants, rabbits, squirrels, deer and so forth are of considerable significance in drawing up the next season's date and bag limits.

Rat Control Will Help in Grain Conservation
Nearly all farms harbor some rats. Last year rats destroyed or damaged 200 million bushels of grain. The Michigan State college extension service urges farmers to start rat control programs and follow them the whole year through.
A hungry rat is easily poisoned or trapped. Make food difficult for rats to find; store food and feeds properly and keep scraps and garbage in ratproof containers. Pile up rubbish, stacks of lumber or other material are favorite hiding places. Elimination of these hiding places will help to keep your farm from becoming a "rat hotel."
Keep Potholders Near
There should be a good supply of dry potholders near the range for handling hot utensils and peaking into the oven. Remember, too, that the cover of a utensil should be lifted away from you for protection against steam.





Poultrymen Can Help in Grain Conservation

For the poultryman who is asking himself, "What can I do to conserve feed?" J. M. Moore extension poultryman at Michigan State college, has a few answers. The specialist points out that careful culling will help to reduce feed needs. The first 100 eggs a hen lays take 20 pounds of feed; the second 100 only 20 pounds more.

Mash feeders are listed as the greatest leak in feed waste. Feeders should not be filled more than two-thirds full to prevent the feed from being billed out. Rat control, too, is an important step to stop useless waste of feed.

Laying house mortality in Michigan, Moore states is about 17 per cent. Buying healthy chicks, good sanitation, and disease control can help to cut this figure.



Dairy Practices To Be Feature of MSC Farmers' Week

Thoughtful dairymen never stop wanting new information that will help them in their business. A. C. Baltzer, extension dairyman at Michigan State college, says that visitors to MSC Farmers' Week will find a big assortment of dairy practices to stimulate their thinking.

The handling and management of cows, and labor-saving procedures will be featured, since no other farm enterprise demands so many hours of labor daily and yearly as does the operation of a dairy herd.

Feeding and pasturing dairy cows will be one of the topics discussed. Farmers will be advised of ways of achieving a better balance of rations and of growing roughages that will help the herd to maintain good health and producing ability.

The value of a successful breeding program and the importance of maintaining a healthy herd of cows will receive much attention. Baltzer points out that cow losses due to disease and reproductive difficulties are costly. Income is increased by having cows live longer.

Raising calves successfully and achieving greater growth will also be stressed, together with approved methods for producing high quality milk and cream.
