Origin of Huge Copper Boulder Found on Ontonagon River Is Still Mystery

Mystery and government intervention are concerned in the history of a three-ton copper boulder on the Ontonagon river which was the first commercial quantity of that metal taken from Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

The mystery deals with the boulder's origin. The government halted a commercial scheme utilizing the copper and caused it to end up in a corner of the Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D. C.

According to information in the Michigan Historical Collections at the University of Michigan, Indians long knew of the massive chunk of native copper. The huge boulder was along the west bank of the west branch of the Ontonagon river, about 30 miles upstream from Lake Superior. Indians worshipped it as a god.

First white man to see the wondrous boulder was Alexander Henry, a British trader, who found it about 1750 or so. From then on followed a stream of men interested in the copper and its possibilities.

Most successful of these was Louis Eldred, Detroit hardware merchant, who wanted to bring it to Detroit for exhibition at a fee of 25 cents a person. In 1841, he purchased the copper from Indians for \$150. However, he could not move it until two years later. But then he found it in possession of some Wisconsin miners. He had to buy the mass again, only this time it cost \$1,865.

Days of backbreaking struggle followed as Eldred and his party of 20 labored to move the rock by land and river to Lake Superior. Then disaster struck Eldred's dream.

The Secretary of War ordered the copper seized and brought to Washington. He authorized payment of "up to \$700" for expenses incurred in moving it to its present location. This sum would in no way cover Eldred's expenses, so he was permitted to move the boulder to Detroit where it arrived Oct. 11, 1843.

Less than a month later, the rock was taken to Washington. There it was dumped in the yard of the Quartermasters' bureau of the War Department and left for



December 7, 1941 Everything Was Normal Until...

Sunday, December 7, 1941, had its peaceful moment too. Up until 2:20 p. m. EST, the day was restful, somnolent, completely uneventful. It was strictly prewar. On the West coast Americans were getting ready for Sunday dinner. On the East coast they were getting over it. In Chicago the Bears took the field against the Cardinals in a pro football game. Flowers bloomed in New York after some unseasonably warm weather. Eggs were selling at 32 cents a dozen and pork chops at 34 cents a pound. From coast to coast people were talking about when we would get into the war, and everybody had an opinion but nobody knew for sure. At the same time, in mushrooming army camps across the nation, the boys who had been caught in the draft were speculating on the possibility of Christmas furloughs. Washington was full of servicemen on leave. Franklin Roosevelt was relaxing momentarily in the White House. On Broadway, 'Life With Father' was only 13 months old. Those who settled down to while away that winter Sunday afternoon reading the newspaper saw that President Roosevelt had made a personal peace appeal to Emperor Hirohito in the face of new reports of Jap troop movements in Indo-China... The Russians were chasing routed German forces west of Rostov and taking the initiative before Moscow. Sen. Harry S. Truman, chairman of the defense investigating committee, urged the President to appoint a 'defense works czar' to eliminate waste. Russian Ambassador Maxim Litvinoff had arrived in the U. S. and thanked Americans for helping the Soviets in their great trial. Tucked away obscurely inside many newspapers was a brief news story beginning, 'The University of California's 4,000-ton cyclotron, or atom-crusher, is gradually taking shape and will be complete by the autumn of 1943.' In the Pacific an admiral named William F. Halsey was returning with a small task force to Hawaii when his ship's radio began crackling with swift, excited messages. And 6,000 miles away, in Washington, telephones began to ring in the offices of the press services. The White House switchboard operator was on the line. Press Secretary Stephen Early had an 'important' statement. Then Early began to speak: 'I have a statement from the President. The Japanese... It was then exactly 2:22 p. m. EST, December 7, 1941.


