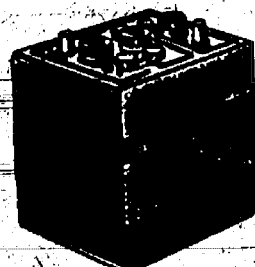

Reserve Officer Assn. Making Plans for Security Observance
 On Jan. 10, Maj. Charles Mosher, Res., president of the Washtenaw county-Reserve Officers association, appointed Maj. Jack Dulgeroff, Res., to direct the National Security Week program for this association during the period of Feb. 12 to Feb. 22.

As in every year since 1920, the Reserve Officers association is taking the lead in observing National Security Week for the period mentioned above. In our county and state there are thousands of reserve officers, all of whom have an active interest in national security.

The ROA still believes that National Security Week is its most important patriotic activity because the nation traditionally and constitutionally relies upon her civilians to furnish manpower and leadership in time of national emergency. Members of the association believe that citizens need to be reminded, at least once a year, of their duties insofar as national security is concerned, and that it is their responsibility to furnish an annual report, so to speak, which every citizen can understand.

Arrangements have been made for a program by everyone in the community, including merchants, civic leaders, church leaders, and various clubs and societies, according to Maj. Dulgeroff.

The association is expecting in-dormitories by state and national congressmen, as well as from many leading organizations.

Washtenaw county (rural)—good for an additional 5,000 units.

"We are currently faced with the paradox of decreasing construction while population and demand for housing continue to grow," said Governor Williams. "Basically, this is caused by the fact that housing costs are far beyond the reach of those with the greatest needs, namely, the wage earner of moderate income with a wife and several small children."

Will the Republican majority in the state legislature go along with Governor Williams on this key measure, calling for more government participation in our economic life? On this issue, perhaps more than any other, Republican leaders will divide sharply.

Governor Thomas E. Dewey, for example, is sponsoring a big public housing program in New York state, while also advocating disability insurance for industrial workers. The conservative wing of the party condemns such tactics as "aping the New Deal" and believes the party should champion the cause of conservatism by holding the line for free enterprise. As we have often pointed out, the record always speaks for itself.

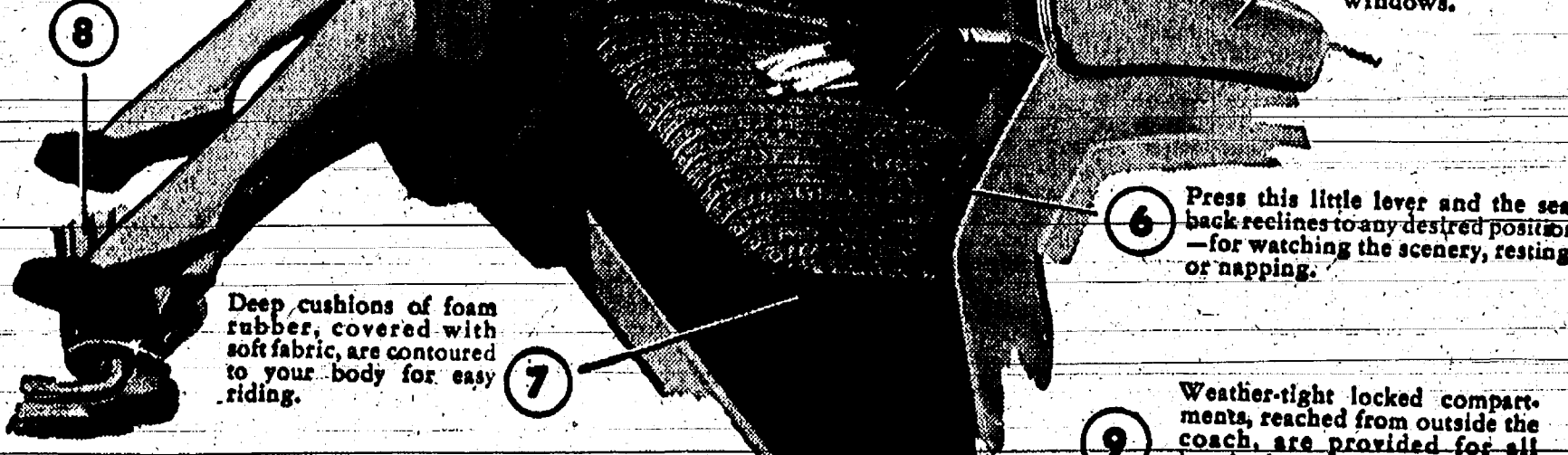

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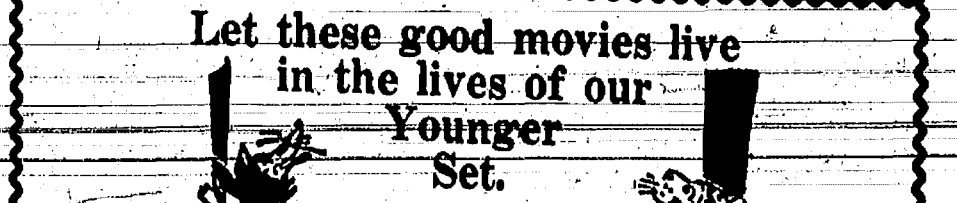

News Item in Wiesbaden, Germany, Paper Lauds Work of Mrs. T. Walworth

Mr. and Mrs. Kent Walworth recently received the following translation of an article which appeared in the German newspaper "Wiesbadener Kurier" on Dec. 16, 1948.

"The armchair almost swallows the frail, little lady, who in the two years she has lived here, has been the good spirit of the Hattenheim people. In a little modern house there below on the main road bypassing Hattenheim, since the end of 1946, lives Thomas K. Walworth with his wife. She is already familiar with the German language.

Actually, she wants nothing at all to do with publicity. She would like to do good in silence. However, the ice was soon broken, and she told of the many visitors who come to her daily.

Formerly a teacher and a member of the Humphrey Child Study club of Port Wayne, Ind., and in contact with the Chelsea Study club in the State of Michigan, she used these connections willingly to benefit the poor in her temporary home. To the question, 'Exactly why do you help the German people when there are surely many poor people in America?' she answered as if it were not the most natural thing in the world, 'I live here in Hattenheim, and when seeing many people who have nothing at all.

"The letters of request that she wrote had results. Her friends and relatives looked for serviceable things, and since that time, over 50 packages have already been sent with dresses, hats, coats, shoes, groceries, and other things needed in family life. In the beginning, sometimes her gifts were exchanged for money, but Mayor Bakelund and an official of the police now seek out the real needy.

"In her house, there is always activity, and so weekly, Mrs. Walworth assembles a dozen little Hattenheimers around the big table in her dining room. She makes the English study hour real tasty for them; then after class there are good things to eat. Sel-don is found a teacher to whom the children listen so willingly.

(Mrs. Walworth also helps regularly in the Sunday school in the Eagle club in Wiesbaden.) She supplied St. Nicholas with chocolate for the kindergarten too.

"Christmas this year will be made happy for the five children of a farmer who was formerly from the Russian zone, and whose name was given to the little Club Scouts of the Wiesbaden troop.

The scouts will lay many good things under the Christmas tree."

Some of the boxes mentioned in the story were those that were packed and sent after the Chelsea Study club's rummage sale.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas K. Walworth have been in Germany the past two years since Mr. Walworth was sent there as a special agent in the counter-intelligence office of the U. S. Army at Wiesbaden. The Walworths live in Hattenheim just outside of Wiesbaden. They have three children: Elizabeth, seven years old, who attends the army-maintained school there; Patricia, four years old, and Margaret, born in the Wiesbaden Army hospital, who is now 16 months old.

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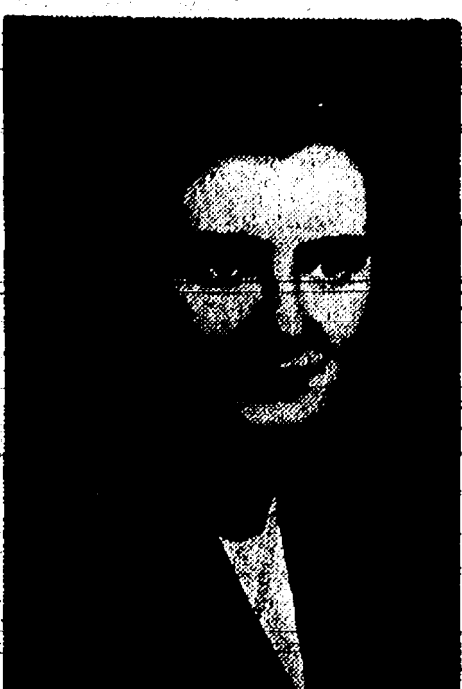

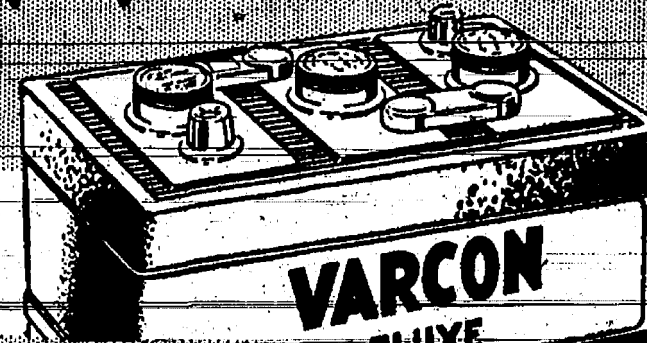
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
