### Crocker Stands Out in First Hurling Job for High School

## VFW Observed 'Americanization Day' Wednesday

Highlighting the VFW Americanization program throughout the years has been assistance to aliens seeking American citizenship. This has included night classes in English for them, instruction in American customs and laws and functions of our government, as well as advice to those newcomers regarding their own welfare.

The VFW Americanism program also includes combating subversive activities, designed to surrender our free peoples—our free government and nation—to a totalitarian rule through misleading propaganda and encouragement of disloyalty.

Other major prospects embodied in the Americanization program are an unlimited field of education, promotion of community welfare, attainment and maintenance of "Peace for America and the world" and participation in local, state and national public affairs.

## U. S.-Canada Friendship Is Recognized

Leaders of the United States and Canada today cited the relationship that prevails between the two countries as an outstanding example of international good will.

President Truman and Prime Minister St. Laurent of Canada, in statements issued in connection with United States-Canada Good Will Week, declared that friendship north and south of the border constitutes the basis for world peace.

President Truman said "the spirit of friendship and cooperation which has characterized the relationship represents a unique achievement in the annals of nations."

"The peoples and governments of the United States and Canada," he continued, "provide the world with a striking demonstration of the ability of democratic freedom-loving nations to live, to work, and to progress together towards lasting peace and prosperity."

Prime Minister St. Laurent, referring to "these troubled days," said the "cordial relations between our two countries are a pattern of international conduct which peace-loving men would like to see emulated everywhere."

Canada's chief executive also described the friendship as a "bulwark against aggressive forces which threaten democracy throughout the world."

Sponsored by Kiwanis International, United States-Canada Good Will Week began Sunday, April 24. More than 2,900 clubs and 200,000 Kiwanians are expected to participate in the annual observance.

## Auto Safety Drive Now in Fourth Week

### Police Report Some Vehicles Defective in Local Checking

Partial returns from 30 cities and counties for the first two weeks of the State-wide Brakes and Light Check program sponsored by the Michigan State Safety commission show that 34,015 motorists were stopped for traffic violations, 1,316 had unsafe brakes, and 2,847 had unsafe lights, it was announced today.

Local officers also stated that in the village of Chelsea, thus far 25 motorists have been stopped and five brakes and ten lights have been found to be in an unsafe condition.

The growing need for maintaining the safety of our roads and highways is dramatically illustrated by recent figures released by the State Highway department showing that traffic increased 9 per cent during the four months' period of November, December, January, and February. This increased travel offered more opportunities for accidents and resulted in a 27 per cent increase in traffic deaths during this same period, according to figures tabulated by the Michigan State Police.

Chelsea police said that if each motorist would realize that each month in Michigan there are more than one and one-half billion vehicle miles of travel, he would realize that safe driving is important.

Now farmers get their shopping

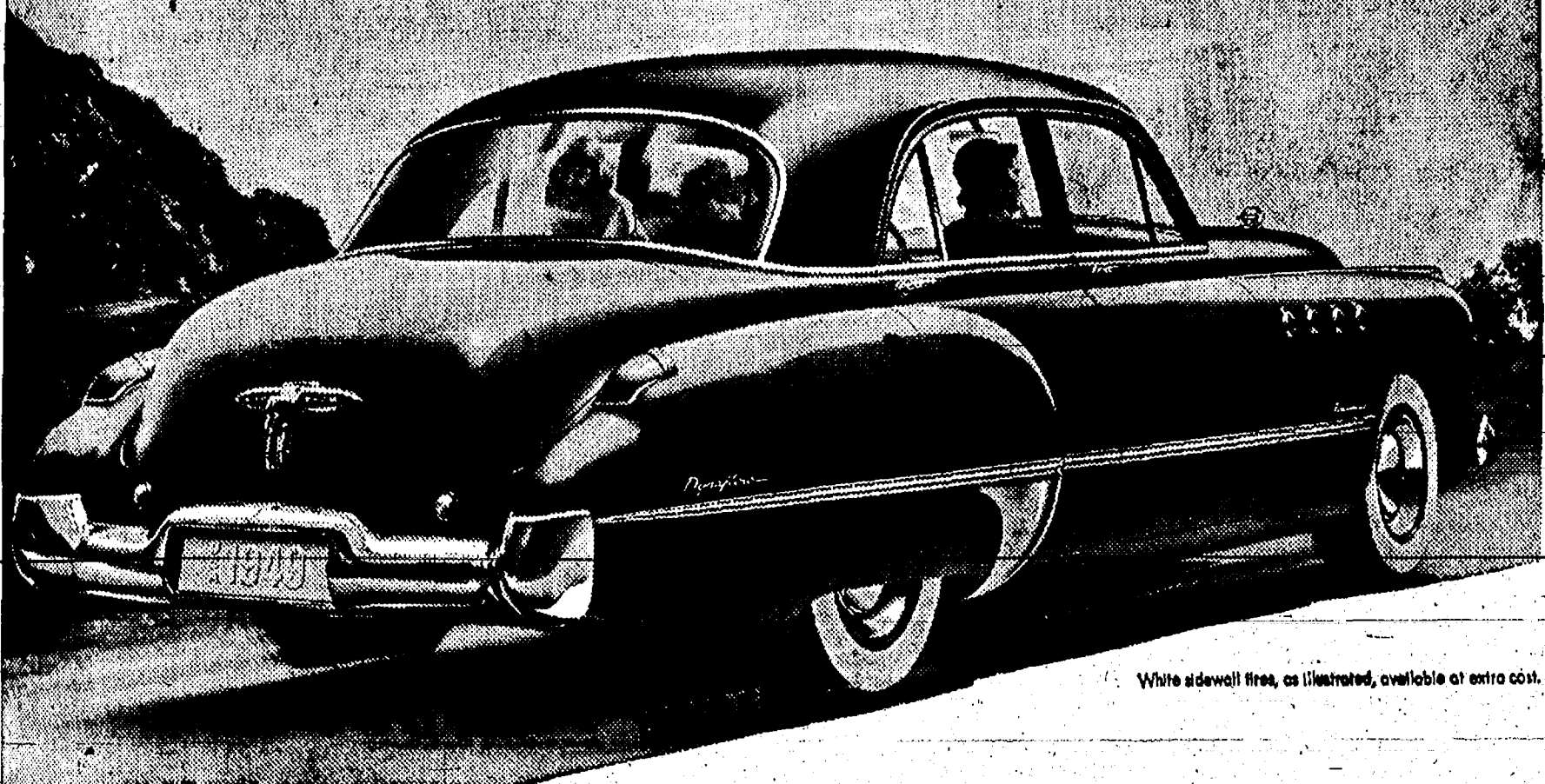
done comfortably, and the merchants have a better place to park than they had before. Just took a little friendly co-operation to make everybody happy.
