Michigan Not Getting All of Federal Aid for State Highways

Michigan is not getting all of the federal aid for state highways it is entitled to receive. Because Michigan now pays to the federal government about four times more in taxes than it gets back, it is the judgment of Charles Ziegler, state highway commissioner, that Michigan is missing a good bet.

There are about \$11 million of federal funds available since 1948 on which contracts have not been let because we have no state funds to match these federal funds," said Commissioner Ziegler.

"We won't lose this money, but the people of the state will lose one year's use of badly needed highway facilities which these funds would permit. We also have an additional 12 million of new federal funds becoming available in July. No contracts can be let against this new money during 1949 because we have no matching funds."

"Without additional state funds we will be unable to avail ourselves of all federal aid allocated to Michigan as rapidly as need dictates. If federal aid funds are not matched by state funds within a period, they revert for re-allocation to other states which are financially able to match funds."

"The problem of state highways has a familiar ring to it. It is an echo of the problem which exists today in every activity of government—local, state and federal. Costs have gone up tremendously during the postwar inflation period. A dollar of revenue buys only 50 cents in former value. Something must give way. Services must be curtailed or taxes must be increased. You can't have better highways without paying more for them."

When Commissioner Ziegler points to the dollar deficiency in explaining why the state highway department is lagging in its progress program, he believes he does so with a good conscience. Ziegler is proud of his record of economy—"getting the most value from the funds at our disposal."

Ziegler maintains that he had weeded out "non-producing employees" to the extent of 476. The annual saving is estimated at \$11 million. This economy is in addition to 650 state employees who were dropped when the state department contracted with county road commissions to maintain state trunk-line routes. Ziegler considers the 476 total as the "net" reduction.

A second economy is claimed by Ziegler by elimination of duplication caused by two organizations—state and county—doing the "same work" in counties. Ziegler says the annual savings at another \$1 million.

Another dollar-stretching policy has been to salvage old trunkline roads by resurfacing them with one-quarter inch of asphalt concrete at a cost of about \$20,000 per mile. About 1,000 miles of old pavements have been so treated.

Another economy is claimed by Ziegler in the lowest cost of building state roads in Michigan—"15 per cent cheaper than the national average and well below our neighboring states of Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Pennsylvania."

"Four important factors enter into these comparatively low prices," said Ziegler. "First, contractors in Michigan do not buy jobs, but receive contracts based on the low qualified bids. Second, Michigan contractors are exceptionally well-equipped to perform qualified personnel. Third, the gamble of lost time from labor disturbances is out of the picture due to the fine relationship existing between the department and the road construction unions."

"Fourth, we pay contractors promptly every two weeks as work progresses, less 10 per cent reserve, which enables them to meet payrolls promptly and to discount material purchases."

Resuscitator Taken to Half Moon Lake

Drowning Victim Saved from Death by Detroit Girl

Fire Chief Thomas Young and Police Officer Waldemar Grossman took Chelsea's new resuscitator on its first call to a drowning emergency on Friday evening, although the resuscitator was not needed, after all. Artificial respiration administered to the victim, a ten-year-old Detroit boy, had revived him by the time the Chelsea officers arrived on the scene at Half Moon Lake, minutes after receiving the call at 8:30 p.m.

The boy, Jerry Weaver, and his father, Edward, of Detroit, who jumped into the water after his son, although he could not swim, were both rescued by an 18-year-old Detroit girl who is staying at the lake with her parents. She is Delores Schmidt, of 12840 Ham-bur avenue, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Schmidt.

The near-drowning occurred when the boy waded out to meet his father and sister, Patricia, in their boat about 60 feet from shore at Hansen's Resort on the south side of the lake, and disappeared from sight when he struck a 40-foot rock-off.

Miss Schmidt noticed the father and son struggling in the water from a dock 200 feet away and went to their assistance. She and the father released the boy's death grip on the latter and she towed him to shallow water where on-lookers took him from her. She then returned for Mr. Weaver and his wife, who were waiting on the shore. The son was unconscious when taken from the water but the father, although ill from swallowing so much water, remained conscious.

Miss Schmidt was commended for her bravery and quick thinking and action by spectators and by the officers called to the scene.

Rev. Panzer succeeds Rev. E. O. Davis, pastor at Salem Grove church for the past three years, who was transferred to the United church at Addison.



Vote To Sell Rural School Dist. Property

Elections held June 27 in six of the former primary school districts in this area now a part of the Chelsea Agricultural School district, to decide whether permission was to be granted to the Board of Education to sell school buildings as well as sites where owned, resulted in passage of the proposals in all of the affected districts. Results of the election were made known at Tuesday evening's meeting of the Chelsea Agricultural School District Board of Education.

Former districts and names of the schools involved are District No. 11, Lyndon, Lyndon Center school; District No. 12, Fr., Lyndon school; Waterloo, McIntosh school; District No. 14, Fr., Lyndon and Sylvan, Howe school; District No. 5, Fr., Sylvan and Sharon, Merkel school; District No. 8, Sharon, Irwin school, and District No. 6, Dexter, Stapish school.

Former board members of the former primary districts acted as trustees. The elections were necessary because of a state law which requires that no property in any former districts may be sold within a five-year period following reorganization without the consent of 60 per cent of the former primary district electors present and voting at an election on such a proposal.

The Board of Education will now advertise for sealed bids on the buildings and on the sites owned by the district. In some cases sites will revert to former owners when the land is no longer used for a school site, in accordance with agreements made when the land was given for the purpose.

Permission to sell the former primary district property was sought by the Board of Education as an economy measure. All of the schools in question have been abandoned for some time, but as long as they remained the property of the reorganized district, insurance and maintenance costs were an expense which the board members deemed unnecessary when it was extremely unlikely that the buildings would ever again be used as schools.

Blame Intense Heat for Heart Attack

Harry French of Dexter, father of Mrs. Thomas Harris of Chelsea, and son-in-law of Fred Wood, died very suddenly about 3:30 Sunday afternoon while seated on the lawn at his home. Mr. French and his wife were frequent Chelsea visitors.

Members of his family attributed his death to the intense heat which brought on a heart attack. He had suffered several previous heart attacks.

Mr. French was born in Vassar on July 14, 1889 and was married on June 27, 1914, at Standish, to Miss Helen Wood. They lived in the northern part of the state and in Detroit before moving to Dexter in 1922.

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Effective July 2—
NEW LONG DISTANCE TELEPHONE RATES
 for calls within Michigan

INCREASED RATES for long distance telephone calls between Michigan points, effective July 2, 1949, have been authorized by the Michigan Public Service Commission.

The Public Service Commission's order provides only for that part of the application which requested an increase in long distance rates (including rates for teletypewriter exchange service messages) within the state. 




