R. N. Frisinger, Lowell Spike Hosts for Annual Affair

The Black and White cattle show will be held Thursday, July 28, at Green Acres farm, 465 Fraser road, with R. N. Frisinger and Lowell Spike as hosts.

This annual event of the Washtenaw and Wayne counties Holstein Breeders' Association was very successful last year when it was held at the same location. The show is open to the public.

Plans for the day include a picnic basket lunch with each family bringing its own picnic basket for the lunch to be eaten at 12 o'clock noon. Lemonade and ice cream will be furnished.

Judging will begin at 1 p.m., with W. W. Snyder of the Dairy Department of Michigan State College acting as judge.

The Chelsea Chamber of Commerce will work in cooperation with association members and will assume the responsibility of tables and chairs for all those attending. Shelter will be available in case of rain.

Cattle should be brought to the grounds no later than 10 a.m. on the day of the show. Registration papers are required. Health regulations are the same as last year and are as follows:

1. Animals from Bangs accredited herds are not required to have a blood test in order to show.

2. Calves vaccinated between the ages of four and eight months are exempted from blood test requirements for showing, for a period of one year after vaccination.

3. (a) vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian; (b) report of vaccination is on record with the Michigan Department of Agriculture; and (c) a copy of official vaccination record accompanies exhibited animal.

Breeders expecting to exhibit in the show should take immediate steps to have their animals blood tested. If this is not done, the animals will be the same as last year. 4-H and FFA boys are urged to exhibit.

Police Will Crack Down on Speedsters

A stopping car can kill as quickly as a speeding car.

This was pointed out today by Chelsea police in a discussion of the village's July campaign against excessive speed.

To the family of the person killed, it is no consolation that the driver was traveling at 60 miles an hour a motorist driving with good brakes needs about 180 feet—from 10 to 14 car-lengths—to stop. In that 185 feet he is practically helpless. He sits there, perhaps trying to dodge or swerve, but other than that, powerless.

Spurred by the knowledge that one out of every three traffic deaths involves excessive speed, the Village of Chelsea has joined with the State Safety Commission in its campaign for greater driver responsibility.

"The purpose of this program on speed control, police said, is to convince all drivers of the truth of the July slogan, 'Speeders Lose!'"

"Exceeding safe and reasonable speeds," they said, "is like driving with a chip on your shoulder, begging both inertia and kinetic energy—two forces you can't possibly lick—to knock it off."

"The next time you're tempted to drive at an excessive speed remember that you are staking the few minutes you might save against your life, because 'Speeders Lose'—they lose their lives."

Program for Cancer Detection Will Be Put Into Effect Throughout County

At a recent meeting of representatives from the Washtenaw county Medical Society, Ann Arbor and Washtenaw county divisions of the Field Army of the American Cancer Society, Washtenaw county Farm Bureau, Women's committee, Washtenaw county Grange, Health committee, the county Health department and the Washtenaw county Cancer committee, program for cancer detection in Washtenaw county was discussed and unanimously accepted.

The program represents the outcome of careful study of existing methods of cancer detection (C.D.) and will offer to Washtenaw county residents a cancer detection service of first rank.

Basically, the plan consists of making every doctor's office a cancer detection (C.D.) unit. Men and women desiring a cancer detection examination (C.D. examination) may consult their own physician.

Since most cancers affecting man can be seen or felt, periodic examination has long been recognized as the most important single step in cancer control. Some malignant growths located in accessible organs are difficult to diagnose but fortunately, supplementary diagnostic procedures such as x-ray, when indicated, aid materially in their discovery.

This program will represent a community effort since it is supported and approved by the various organizations already mentioned.

The plan was initially developed in Hillsdale county where it has worked out so satisfactorily that it is now replacing the somewhat more cumbersome cancer detection center plan.

Many counties in Michigan are adopting a similar type of program since it has become well recognized that this program represents the best plan available at this time.

The Michigan State Cancer Control committee, which has carefully studied and evaluated all plans of cancer detection, is encouraging the development of the Hillsdale plan, similar to that to be used in Washtenaw county for all counties throughout Michigan.

While problems may arise in the development of this program in Washtenaw county, it is not likely that these will be insurmountable. It is imperative that individuals desiring a C. D. examination request this type of examination when making an appointment with their physician. By so doing they indicate to the physician the type of examination desired. The success of the program will depend in large measure upon the mutual cooperation of both lay people and physicians.

Members of Washtenaw county Medical Society has approved this program and are prepared to carry out the examinations.

Men and women are urged to make use of this service and to report regularly at regular intervals. For people over 40, examination every six months is desirable.

Officials Will Study Refuse Disposal Plan

The Washtenaw County Planning Commission and the County Health Department have called a meeting of local officials throughout the county at 8:00 o'clock Thursday evening, July 21, to discuss the question of establishing garbage and refuse disposal.

The meeting will be held in the University Public Health Auditorium in Ann Arbor.

Sixty-five letters have been mailed to mayors, village presidents, chairmen of zoning boards and planning commissions, and supervisors urging them to attend this meeting which was announced by George D. Hurrell, Director of the County Planning Commission, and Dr. Otto K. Engle, Director of the County Health Department.

Every city, village, and township in the county is faced with the ever-growing garbage and refuse disposal problem. Present methods of disposal are unsightly, breed rats, create offensive odors, destroy land values, and create a menace to good health. The sanitary fill method of garbage and refuse disposal will be described through colored movies and talks.

Cost of operating these fills will be discussed and the views of local officials sought on possible sites needed to serve the various communities of the county.

R. A. McLaughlin Named President of Education Board

Russell McLaughlin and Earl Beaman were re-elected as members of the Board of Education of the Chelsea Agricultural School district for three-year terms Monday evening. The election took place at the annual school meeting held in the High School gymnasium. About 60 men and women attended the meeting.

Each candidate received 42 votes. In the balloting for McLaughlin, 53 votes were cast, while 49 votes were the total cast in the balloting which elected Beaman. The votes not credited to the two elected officers bore various names crediting those named with from one to five or six votes each.

Russell McLaughlin, president of the board, presided at the meeting except during the election of officers when he asked Henry Schneider to act as temporary chairman.

Mr. McLaughlin called on Supt. Albert Johnson for a report on the affairs of the Chelsea Agricultural school. A printed report to the electors had been distributed among those present, and Mr. Johnson gave a brief summary of this and then mentioned tentative plans of the school board for increased school facilities for Chelsea. The latter include activities in progress to obtain a possible site for a new school building.

Options have been obtained on a plot of ground in the southwest part of the village, in the area adjacent to Pierce and Maywood streets, where a proposed elementary school might be erected. Mr. Johnson said it was hoped that tentative plans might be completed soon so that a bond issue could be voted on in the near future. Present plans call for a bond issue of \$550,000 on a ten-year plan.

With tax valuation of the district somewhere in the neighborhood of \$6,000,000, a bond issue of \$550,000 would mean a tax levy of 11 mills for the first three years, and 7 or 8 mills for several years, and then possibly less than that amount for the remainder of the ten-year period, depending on the amount of possible delinquent taxes during the period, Mr. Johnson said.

The proposed bond issue was tentatively planned for the \$350,000 to provide for a new elementary school building to cost about \$300,000 and to provide funds for repairs to the present school building.

It was brought out at the meeting Monday that settling of the northeast corner of the High school building, which has been noticed for a number of years, must be examined and either repaired or declared safe by competent engineers before the state fire marshal will approve the school building as safe. This must be done before school opens in the fall. Because the extent of the work necessary to remedy the condition is not known, a sufficient amount to cover the possible cost was tentatively decided upon by the school board.

Henry Schneider, who had examined the settled portion of the building at the request of the school board, explained at Monday's meeting that it was his opinion that the settling of the wall was no greater now than it had been for the past 30 years. He gave his listeners the impression that he believed it will be feasible to reinforce the settled portion to satisfy the state fire marshal's requirements.

Mrs. Florence Mayer, treasurer of the school board, read her report as printed in last week's issue of the Standard.

Other business included the setting of the salaries of school board members, which are to be the same as last year, namely, \$300 per year for the secretary; \$200 per year for the treasurer, and \$5 for each meeting attended for each of the trustees.

The Board of Education met immediately after the adjournment of the annual meeting and named Russell McLaughlin as president, the position he held last year. Also named to continue in their previous offices were Harold Widmayer, secretary and Mrs. Florence Mayer, treasurer. William Kolb and Earl Beaman, the two remaining members of the board, are trustees.

The Board also voted at this meeting to submit the school bond issue at an election to be held on September 14.
