According to Maddock, success in this field depends upon a highly specialized method of training, plus maximum exposure to normal contacts, normal living conditions, and maintenance of a high standard of physical health.

Mrs. Florence Fisher, a former Chelsea resident, died very suddenly Sunday night at her home in Plymouth. Chelsea friends were advised on Monday that Mrs. Fisher was remembered here as the wife of Alex Fisher, who was in the shoe business in Chelsea at the time of his death. While living in Chelsea she was very active in the work of the Methodist church and Sunday school and was an active member of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Mrs. Fisher was married several years later to Blake Fisher of Plymouth, who survives. Also surviving are her mother, Mrs. Maude Newell, a son Robert, and two daughters, Mrs. Wayne E. Welton, of Caro, and Sharon, and Mrs. Fred James Lindsey and Mrs. Fred Barry.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at the Church of the Nazarene in Plymouth, and interment took place at Yale.

Only Survivor of Original Waterloo Band Is Honored

Eighty-nine-year-old Ben Lantis of this road, near Waterloo, was honored as the only surviving member of the first Waterloo band at a party at the Gleaner Hall in Waterloo, Wednesday evening.

In 1904, 15 young men, under the leadership of Aaron J. Smer of Stockbridge, organized the Waterloo Cornet band, according to the history read by Mrs. Barber. In August 1908, they entered the two-day Michigan State Band tournament at Lansing, winning seventh place in competition with 22 bands from much larger communities. Their winning band selection was "Rose of Sharon," composed by their leader, Mr. Snyder. Their prize money amounted to \$60. Their score, in the contest, was 100. The band, which had been higher except for the fact that the members were not in full uniform.

Their first uniforms, of green wool, were discarded in 1909 for new ones of blue wool broadcloth with matching caps.

The band was discontinued during World War I, although a number of the members got together to play for a few special occasions. Eleven of the members who formed the 1904 band are no longer living.

The present Waterloo band was organized in 1947. Music for Waterloo's party was furnished by this band, a few of the older members present joining the group to play some of the old favorite tunes in honor of Mr. Lantis.

Flowers used as decorations at the party were furnished by Mrs. Victor Mookel, Waterloo, and Mrs. Truman Lehman, of Frankisco.

No Further Cases of Polio Reported from Chelsea Area

The Washtenaw County Health department office reported yesterday that no further cases of polio had been reported from Chelsea. The only child case recorded, they said, was that of Duane Genter which was reported last week.

Duane's affliction was diagnosed as a mild case and he was not hospitalized, although he was taken to the hospital for tests and examinations one day last week. He is to return to the hospital for periodic check-ups. He is reported to be slowly improving at his home here.

The total number of reported cases of polio in the county, the Health department spokesman said yesterday, is now 20, according to department records.

Michigan Veterans To Have Special Day at Mich. State Fair

Michigan's veterans are making plans for a gala day at the Centennial Michigan State fair, Sept. 2 to 11.

All major veterans' groups in the state will participate in the program, which is under the general direction of the Allied Veterans, Inc. The Council represents 21 major veterans' groups, with about 900,000 members in Michigan.

Edwin Herz, of Detroit, has been appointed chairman of the Veterans' Day program which will start at 3:30 p.m. on Sept. 10 with an assembly and parade to the Veterans' Monument for memorial services.

Throughout the week, various veterans' units will take an active part in the parades which will be a nightly feature of the fair. Two units, the Port Huron Drum and Bugle corps and the Vassar float, a veterans' memorial float, will be in the opening day parade on Wednesday.

This parade is expected to be a major attraction of the fair, with Gov. Williams, who will cut the ribbon marking the opening of the fair, participating. Also scheduled to be in the parade is Bob Hope, who will be the featured star in entertainment at the Coliseum for the first three days of the fair.

The hearing will take place at the Red school on Manchester road at Priehard road. It is being held, Road Commission spokesmen state, to give interested persons in the area an opportunity to voice their opinions on the matter which involves the closing of Deckert, Prichard, Curtis and Warthley roads and part of Helm road. All of these roads run through the more than 3,000 acres of land purchased during the past two years by John Hanna, Detroit realtor. Hanna has consistently refused to state the purpose for which the land is to be used, assuring questioners that the land is to be used for a good purpose which will not prove detrimental to the community.

It has been stated by Kenneth L. Hallenbeck, superintendent-manager of the County Road Commission, that if no reasonable objections are offered by persons who might be affected, the roads may be closed through appropriate legal action.

No disclosures as to the probable use of the land are expected to be made at tomorrow's meeting. In addition, 15 rural school students of the adjoining area have remarked that such disclosures would affect their views on the matter of closing the roads.

The Chelsea Kiwanis club passed a resolution at Monday night's meeting placing the club on record as being opposed to closing of the roads until such time as actual need for such action in the process of development of the project should become a necessity, to eliminate any long period of inconvenience before actual development of the area might begin.







The next Pack committee meeting is to be held at the Andrew Leland home on Sept. 2.


