Michigan MIRROR

Two developments have taken place in Lansing which puts Governor G. Mennen Williams in the familiar role of a state executive who seeks more power.

It was the theme of Governor Kim Sigler that the people held the governor responsible for results and that the governor should hold power in proportion to his responsibility.

Reinstatement of Brig. Gen. Louis A. Kunzig as executive director of the liquor control commission has been ordered by the state civil service commission.

While Governor Williams maintains he is not involved in the Kunzig row, it is unlikely that he would have been fired if Williams had not proposed action by his appointees who had control.

The second development affects the new state department of administration, director of which is appointed by the governor.

John Perkins returned to the University of Michigan after including the legislature to go along with Sigler's recommendation for limited centralized controls over the state departments.

The Williams-controlled department recently informed Charles M. Ziegler, state highway commissioner, that the highway department must turn over to the state the right to regulate the use of trucks.

Ziegler, who was re-elected last April, promptly charged Williams as seeking "to grasp new, additional power regardless of the effect on the state's economy."

Behind the charges of "politics" between the Republicans and the Democrats is the prospect that the real answers to these controversies must come from the state supreme court.

Council Will Act on Request at Meeting Next Monday Night

Chelsea fire department recently requested inspection of public buildings here by the State Fire Marshal. Following the inspection by a representative of the department, required changes were outlined for both public and parochial schools and the following letter was received by M. W. McClure, village president, in regard to changes which must be made in the Municipal building.

Re: Inspection of the Village Municipal Building, Chelsea, Michigan

Dear Sir: Representative of this department recently made an inspection of the above captioned premises. From the report submitted to this office and by the authority given under Act 207 of the Public Acts of 1941, as amended, we are asking you to comply with the following items within the next thirty (30) days:

1. Provide a secondary means of egress from the third floor at the North or South end of the building by constructing a fire escape meeting State specifications. Door to same to be at floor level and made to swing in the direction of egress.

2. The elevator shaft enclosure of this building is substantially in construction and it is recommended that it be eliminated or re-constructed of fire-resistant construction, with a fire door leading to the shaft.

3. Provide exit lights and emergency lighting for all exits. These lights to be on a separate circuit and fused ahead of the main fire and independent of any other service in the building.

4. Install panic hardware on all outside exit doors from the third floor.

5. Provide CO-2 fire extinguisher for the kitchen on the third floor.

6. Provide a 2 1/2 gal. approved type fire extinguisher for the assembly room on the third floor.

I trust we may have your assistance and cooperation in the compliance of the above orders. An officer of this department will make a re-inspection of these premises within the next thirty days.

Tomorrow night at 8 o'clock, under the lights at the local athletic field, the 1949 edition of the Chelsea Bulldogs will take the field against their arch-rivals, the Dexter Dreadnaughts.

This year's starting line-up has five seniors, five juniors, and one sophomore, all of whom have won at least one letter in football.

The starting line-up tomorrow night will have a backfield composed of George Heydlauf at quarterback, Stan Knickerbocker at left half, Capt. Bob Vogel at right half, and Bob Bobbe at fullback.

Behind this veteran quartet are two newcomers, John Batsakes, a freshman flanker, and L. C. Harris, who are pushing the regulars to keep their positions.

At the end of the starting line will be Ted Slane, a junior, at left end, and Ed Miller, a senior, at right end.

Public Meeting Called To Inform Electors of School Expansion Plan

Will Vote on Bond Issue October 12

George C. Gill, chairman of the Board of County Road Commissioners, in a statement to The Standard on Tuesday, said that the matter of closing the roads in the John Hanna project south and west of Chelsea is still open.

A decision to hold such a meeting was reached Tuesday evening at a gathering of the Planning committee named last year by the Board of Education to study the school situation here and make recommendations for proposed additional facilities.

The hearing Aug. 26 was held to give people who might be affected through the project an opportunity to be heard. The hearing date was set by the Board of Road Commissioners following receipt of a petition signed by John Hanna and a number of Sylvan township residents requesting the closing of Decker's, Wainwright, Ditchard and Burrie roads and part of the Heim road.

Mrs. Walter Mohrlock, who has served as chairman of the "March of Dimes" drive for infantile paralysis funds in Chelsea for several years, has been named to act as chairman of the current drive for extra funds. The extra drive is being made necessary, campaign officials say, because of the large amounts of money spent for care of polio patients this year.

Contributions at this time will help fund the foundation over the period of emergency caused by the high incidence of polio at the present time.

Mrs. Mohrlock said Tuesday that she is ready to accept any and all donations from individuals and organizations. No special drive is contemplated but it is hoped the community will respond to the call for emergency donations as soon and as generously as possible.

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County Seeks Uniform Fill Disposal Plan

Sanitary Means of Caring for Garbage, Rubbish Is Goal

A movement to join all localities in Washtenaw county together in providing all systems of garbage and rubbish disposal was set in motion Thursday night by a representative group meeting in Ann Arbor as the county-wide sanitary fill committee.

Four cities and eleven townships were represented on the committee convened for the first time in the County Planning Commission offices. The committee is made up of representatives appointed from county local governments at the request of the County Planning Commission and Health Department.

Refuse Buried
A sanitary fill is that system of disposal of both garbage and rubbish in which dumpings are covered each day with a two-foot thickness of top soil.

Urnal procedure is to dig trenches to receive the refuse, filled to a depth of within two feet of the surface, over which the topsoil is laid. However, George Hurrell, County Planning director, said there are many swampy areas in the county which could actually be quickly and effectively reclaimed by raising the elevation through a surface adaptation of the sanitary fill system.

N. G. Damoose, Ypsilanti City Manager, long an advocate of the sanitary fill, describes the system "meaning just what it says." "It is necessary to leave fresh garbage uncovered, even overnight," he noted.

Advantages Listed
Advocates of the plan also stress that by receiving rubbish as well as garbage, it would eliminate the need for unsightly public dumpings, and the building places for officials say also that it has recently come to light that garbage is being brought into Washtenaw county from adjacent counties for dumping.

The county-wide committee, on Tuesday night, authorized chairman Dr. Otto K. Engelke, County health director, to appoint an executive committee from its number with responsibility to sell the sanitary fill idea to the proper governmental groups.

Sub-committees to work out various details of the plan will also be appointed, with instructions to report back to the county-wide group in no more than 30 days.

The meeting was held in the Agriculture room at the school. A close and more enlightened relationship between students and the PTA is to be the main objective of the year. To promote this relationship each grade will have three room representatives instead of one, as has been the custom in the past.

Monday, Sept. 26, is the date set for the first regular High School PTA meeting. A pot-luck supper will precede the program which will include an explanatory talk on proposed new school facilities, a close and more enlightened relationship between students and the PTA is to be the main objective of the year.

Indicates Crops Not Shows Crops About Half of Last Year

Emil Regner returned Friday after spending two weeks at Langdon, N. Dak. He said all indications there were that harvest yields in the area would average less than half of what they were last year. The section has suffered severe drought conditions.

In northeastern North Dakota, it is reported, estimates of yields of the various crops per acre are given as follows: barley, 15 bu.; oats, 21 bu.; wheat and durum, 11 bu.; flax 7 bu.

Barley harvests in the northwestern part of Cavalier county were said to be returning better yields. Reports of a few fields yielding 40 bushels per acre.

Mr. Regner said that a friend of his who did custom combining from Oklahoma back to his home in North Dakota, found crop yields to be just about half what they were last year. In some cases, he said, crops were so poor that farmers plowed them under.

More than 75 Commodity Credit Corp. loans on the 1949 crop had been filed by Cavalier county farmers by the first of September, according to reports brought back by Mr. Regner. Langdon, where he visited, is in Cavalier county.

U. of M. Professor Says Newspaper Ads Are Best Bet

Newspaper advertising is probably the most useful type of advertising for the small manufacturer, with local radio, direct mail and posters serving local markets also—a University of Michigan specialist in marketing, believes.

J. Howard Westing, associate professor of marketing, discusses means of consumer advertising for the small manufacturer in an article published in the Michigan Business Review. The Review is a bi-monthly publication of the University's Bureau of Business Research.

"The outstanding advantage of the newspaper for the small manufacturer is that its coverage can be made to approximate closely the market for the product," Professor Westing explains. "One may argue that radio is equally local in its advertising effect, but the fact remains that most dealers think of the newspaper as the local supporting medium. This dealer attitude is particularly important to a small manufacturer because his brands can sell well against the competition of well-known brands only if the dealer gives them active local support."

Radio has made tremendous progress as an advertising medium, but it is most successful for products which are bought frequently, at fairly low price, and without a great amount of advance planning on the part of the buyer, Professor Westing points out.

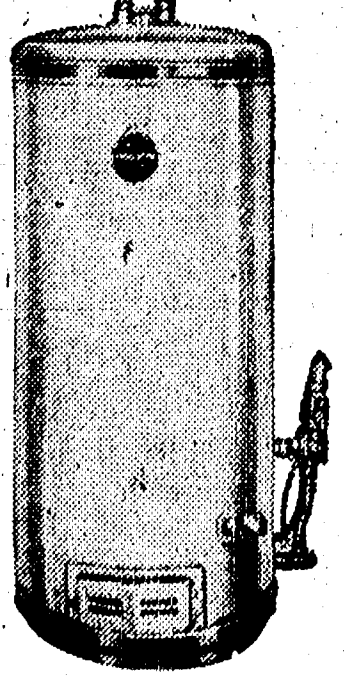

Trout Season Closes
Sunday Except for
Specified Waters

For the angler who still wants to fish for trout after Sept. 11, the conservation department points out there are certain lakes and streams in nearly half the counties of the state where only rain-bows may be taken by hook and line through Nov. 30. Specific waters in which rainbow may be taken in twenty-three northern lower peninsula, eight upper peninsula and eight southern Michigan counties are listed in the fish-law digest. The fisherman who has lost his digest pamphlet can secure another from his fishing license agent.

Waters close to heavier populated areas in southern part of the state still open to rainbow fishing are Orchard Lake, Oakland county; Lobdell lake, Genesee county; Half Moon, Big and Little Portage lakes, Washtenaw county; Muskegon and White Lakes and rivers, Muskegon county; Gull lake, Kalamazoo county; Swain's lake, Jackson county; Birch and Hemlock lakes, Cass county; and that part of Gull Lake, Barry county. Number per day and in possession continues at 15 (10 from designated trout-takers) but not more than 10 pounds and one fish.

Some Dairy Owners
Are Dehorning Herd
for Animals' Safety

Several Michigan breeders of purebred dairy cattle have subscribed to a program of dehorning their animals. Nearly 75 Guernsey breeders in the "Thumb area" of Michigan have already adopted a plan to dehorn all heifer calves, according to Dr. Earl Weaver, of the Michigan State college dairy department.

Farmers who have lost valuable animals or seen cows' production capacity lowered through damage to an udder by horns from another animal have reached the conclusion that production is more important than looks and tradition, Weaver remarked.

John Brecheisen, Dryden, president of the Thumb District Guernsey Breeders' association, says: "The simple fact that horns should add or subtract the true value of an animal is strictly a condition of the mind. The primitive cow was in great need of her horns for protection. I hardly believe that this factor is adequate to encourage horned cattle today."

Dr. Weaver says some other breeders, even of Ayrshires, are eliminating horns from animals in their herd.

The MSC dairy head recommends that dehorning should be practiced with young calves to avoid a more severe operation which is necessary with adult animals.

Last Duplication of Telephone Service in Michigan Ends

Jonesville—The last instance of duplicate telephone service passed from the Michigan scene at midnight, Saturday, Aug. 27, for the first time in more than half a century.

At that time, properties of the Jonesville Cooperative Telephone company were consolidated with those of the Michigan Bell Telephone company in this community. Jonesville has been the only exchange in the state where two telephone systems have been in operation.

The dual telephone nuisance sprang up all over the country upon the expiration of Alexander Graham Bell's patents in 1893. The 525 telephone users here shed no tears at the passing of an era marked by inconvenience and double expense for some users here since 1921. The two systems were not connected except for long distance service. As a result, a number of users, particularly business customers, have had to subscribe to two telephone services.

Realizing the confusion and added expense of dual service, Michigan Bell started negotiations for the consolidation in 1945, offering either to sell its local properties to the Jonesville company or to buy those of the latter. The Public Service Commission gave its approval of the sale only recently. The consolidation leaves 154 telephone companies in Michigan, including Michigan Bell.

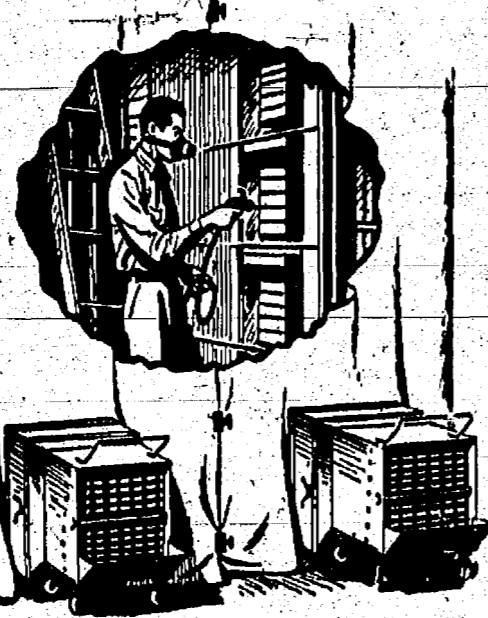

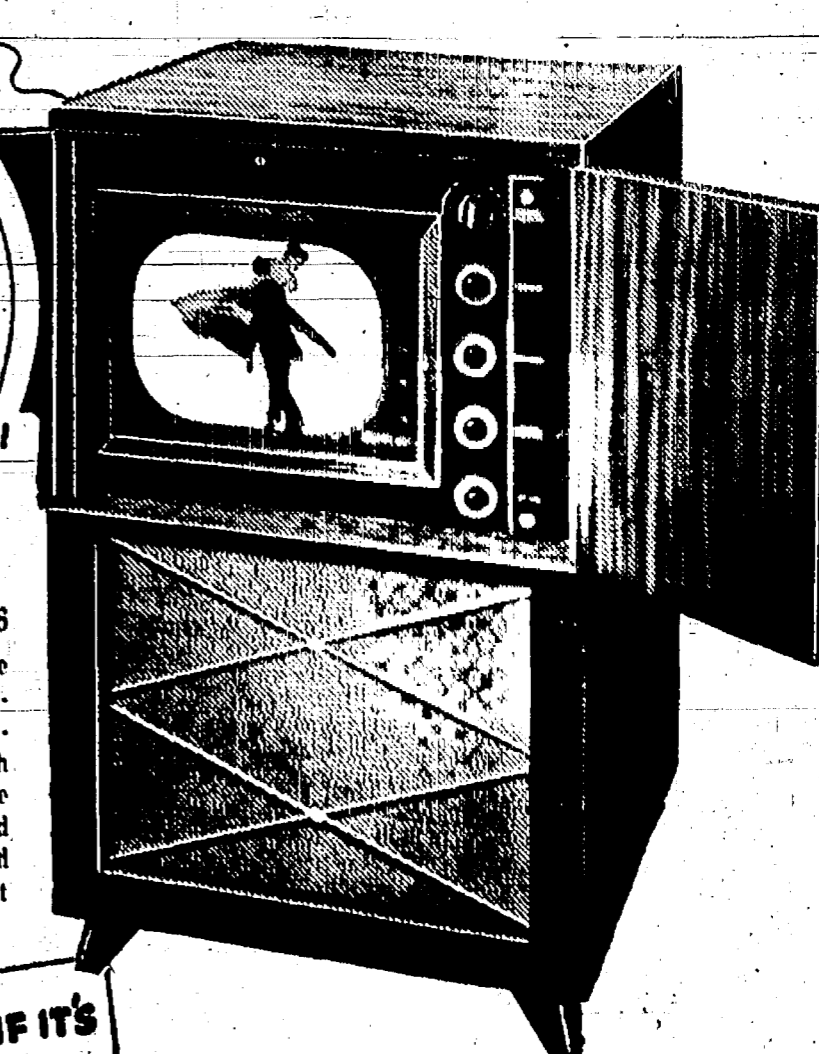

Now, lots of normally considerate folks have their "blind spots."

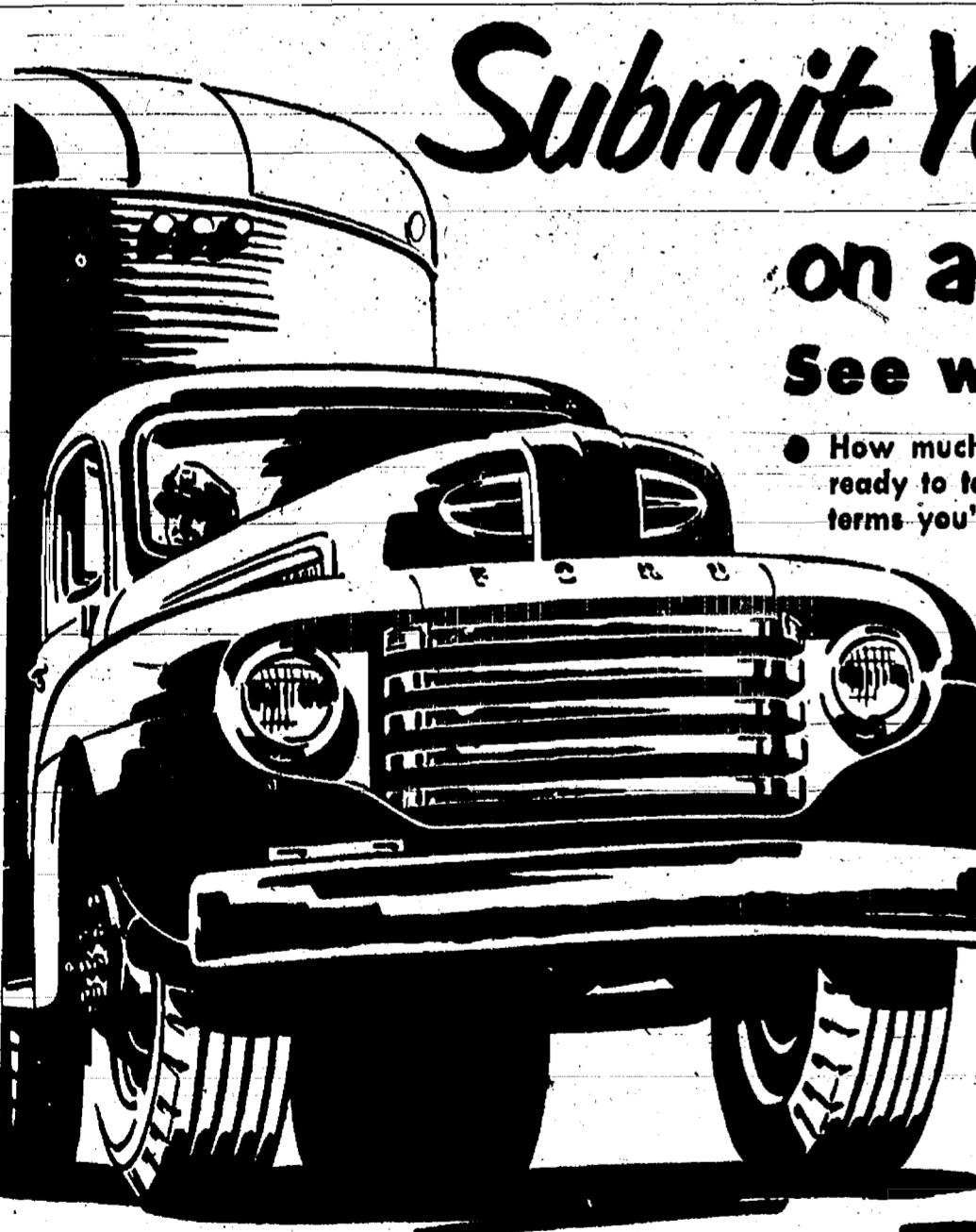
It could be anything from day-dreaming while driving a car to humming-out-loud-at-the-movies.

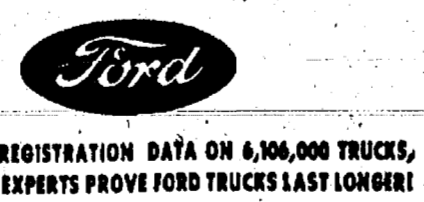
