A typical Russian's life was depicted by Mr. John Shireaf at an assembly given Tuesday last week. Mr. Shireaf described the schools, churches and average homes of Russia in his talk. He said that in general the same subjects are offered in their schools as in America; however, he implied that facts taught to Russian children are often distorted.

Continuing his lecture, Mr. Shireaf mentioned that today Russia has fifteen thousand open churches whereas at one time about seventy-five thousand churches were open to the public. He said that people are allowed to worship as they please, but that often because of their religious activity they are punished indirectly.

According to Mr. Shireaf, the average Russian is quite poor and often does not have even the bare necessities of life.

Mr. Shireaf also talked about Communism and the degrading

moral effects it has upon the people of Russia.

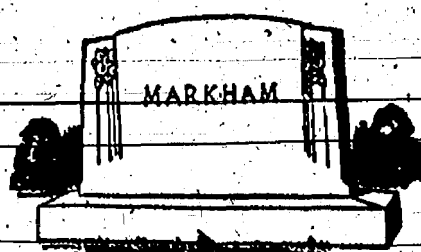

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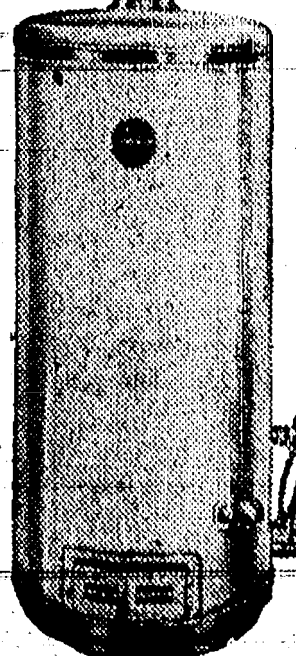

About 1,000 books per year are being added to the University of Michigan Library—all on tiny spools of microfilm.

The University's General Library, occupying an over-crowded building, welcomes the opportunity to secure documents and books on microfilm because the spools of film do not pose much of a storage problem. Dr. Warner G. Rice, Library director, explains. All dissertations or research studies written by University students working for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy are now being microfilmed for the library.

Bulk of the University's collection of microfilm, however, is devoted to foreign scientific journals and to manuscripts preserved in British libraries and museums. Both of these collections started as war-time projects, with the University of Michigan at the center in this nation for receipt of films from guests.

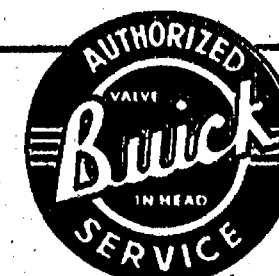
