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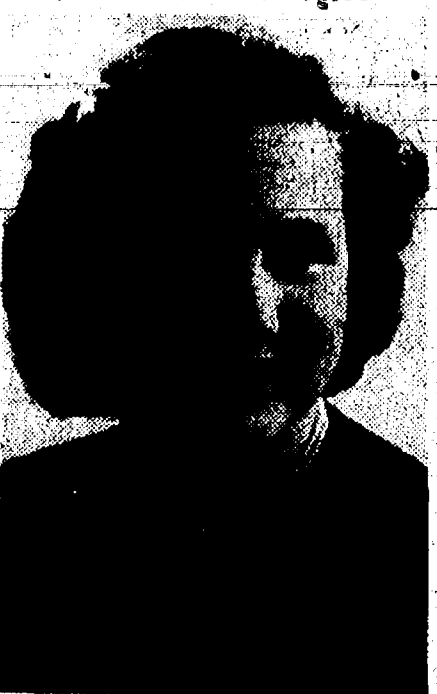

Believed To Have Been Oldest Active Pharmacist in State

With the passing of Henry H. Fenn, who died Saturday evening in St. Joseph's Mercy hospital, Ann Arbor, Chelsea has lost its oldest businessman, not only in age but in the number of years he has been continuously connected with the business life of the community. Employed as a full-fledged pharmacist since he was 17 years old,

he has been a registered pharmacist since the Pharmacy Act was passed in 1885. As related in the February 2 issue of The Standard in a story of the activities of his lifetime, written after he celebrated his 84th birthday, Mr. Fenn went to work at the age of 14 for the Glazier and DePuy drug and grocery store located in what is now the Chelsea Drug Store. In 1881 and 1882 he worked in the Stockbridge DePuy drug store; from 1882 to 1885 in the W. W. Kenyon store in Howell; then returned to Chelsea to the R. S. Armstrong store in what is now John's ice cream and confectionery store. At the time he moved to the present location in 1900, he was in business with Lewis P. Vogel but since 1900 has operated the store independently. He is believed to have been the oldest registered pharmacist in age and years of practice in the state. He was in his store for several hours on Thursday. He became ill on Friday and was taken to the hospital where he died the next day.

Miss Lida Guthrie, also a registered pharmacist, has been employed in the store since 1908.

Previous to his partnership with Mr. Vogel in 1898, Mr. Fenn had been associated for various intervals with John J. Dodds and Company, a Detroit wholesale drug company; Lee and Klingman, Dexter druggists; Jacob Hummel as partner in the drug and grocery business; and Dr. R. S. Armstrong in the R. S. Armstrong Company. He also was engaged for a time as traveling salesman for the Foote and Jenks firm of Jackson and for the Frederick Stearns company of Detroit.

At the time of his death he was a privileged member of the Chelsea Kiwanis club of which he was also a charter member.

Mr. Fenn was a grandson of Chelsea pioneers, Tully C. Fenn and Betsey Ann Mott. Mr. Fenn, who came here in 1883 from Shortham, Vt. His parents were Courtney and Anna McDonough Fenn. Of the four sons and one daughter born to his parents, Frank Fenn, of Chelsea, is the only survivor. Mr. Fenn was born in Chelsea on Jan. 28, 1866.

Mr. Fenn is also survived by his wife, the former Margaret Stefan, to whom he was married on November 10, 1890; a son, Clure H., who is an Ann Arbor pharmacist; a daughter, Mrs. Frederick Trousse, of Buffalo, N.Y.; and one grandson, Howard Fenn, a student at Notre Dame.

The Rosary was recited at the residence at 8 p.m. Tuesday. Funeral services were held at St. Mary's church at 10 a.m. Wednesday, with Father Lee Laige officiating. Burial took place in Mt. Olivet cemetery.

All business places in Chelsea closed during the funeral hour.
