avor, indicate a favorable yield for Michigan apples, cherries and peaches.

The newest effort to reorganize Michigan government—state and local—is being made by a legislative committee headed by Senator James T. Milliken, Traverse City. A paid staff of fact-finders has been recruited by Loren B. Miller, director of the Bureau of Governmental Research at Detroit. Although the 1949 legislative committee has only \$5,000 in its budget, \$20,000 have been contributed by the Bureau and private foundations. Previous efforts of professional reformers have misfired. Senator Milliken is hopeful that the new movement patterned after the successful "Hoover Commission," will find the answers.

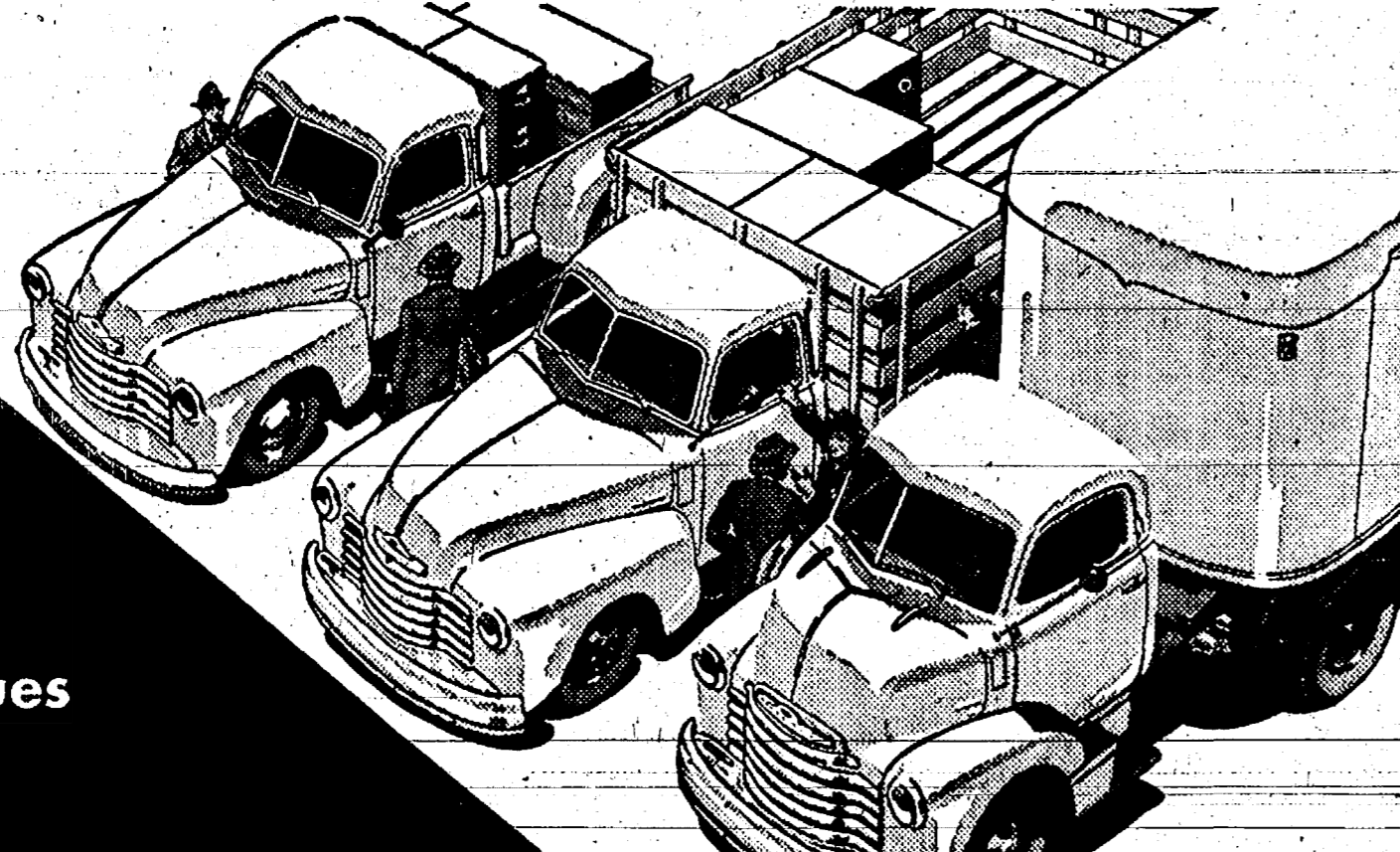

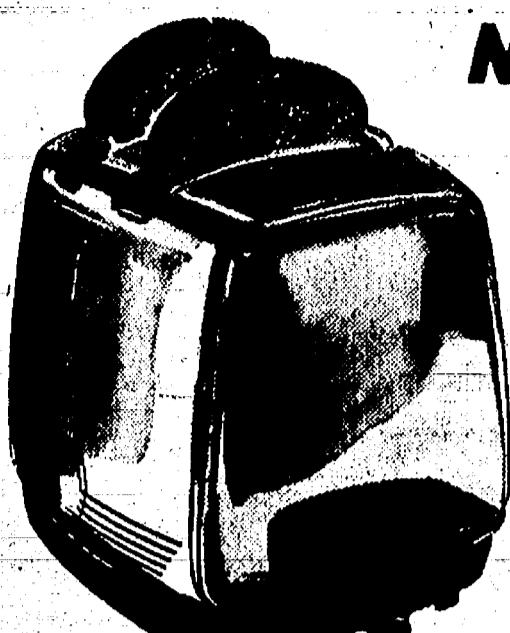

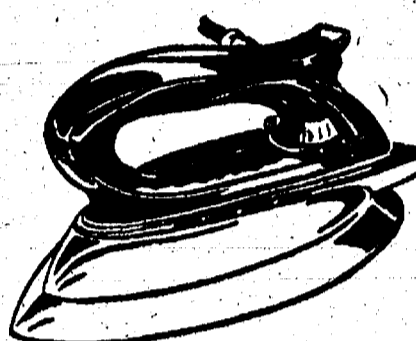

### RULES AND MANNERS

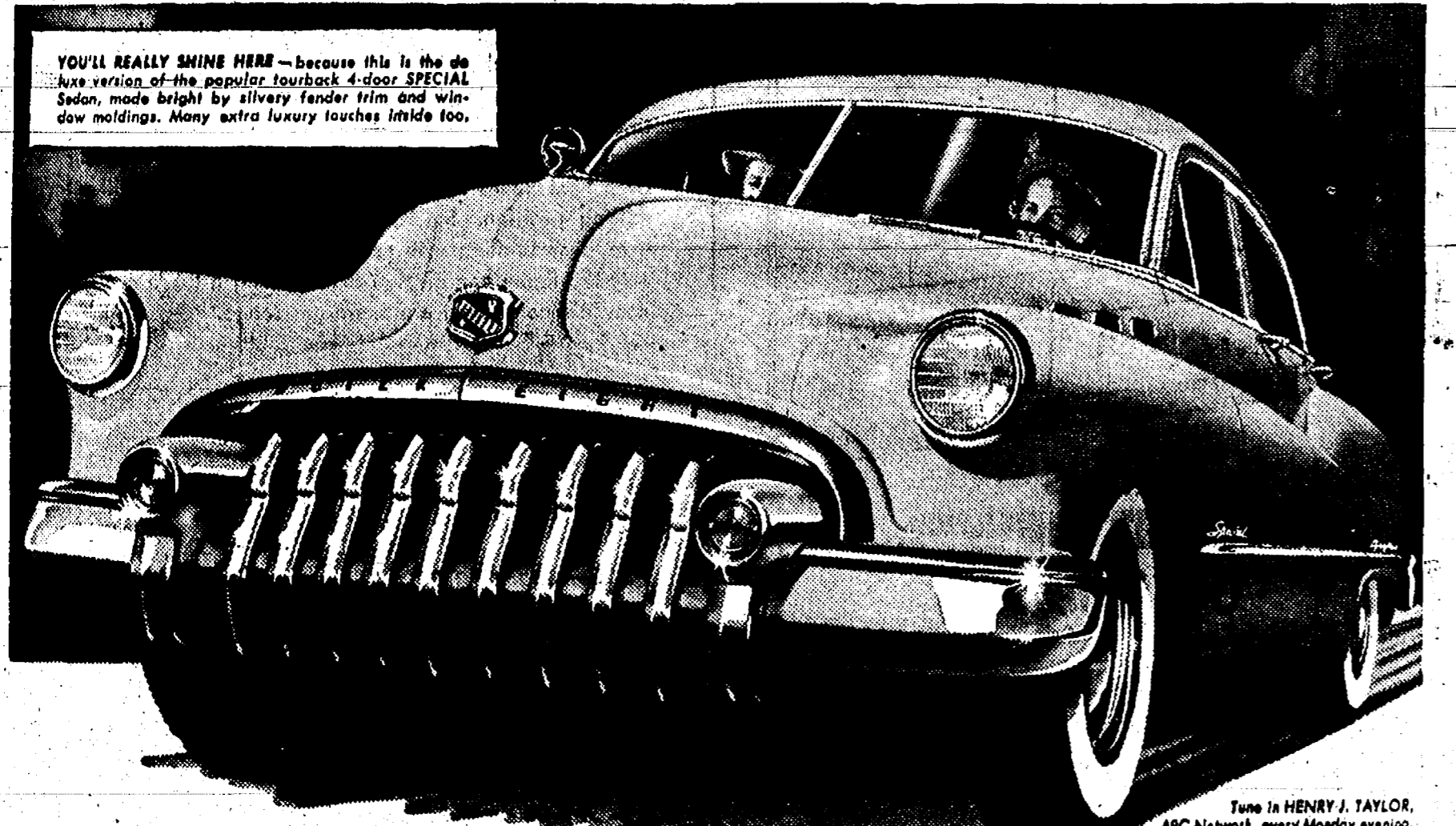

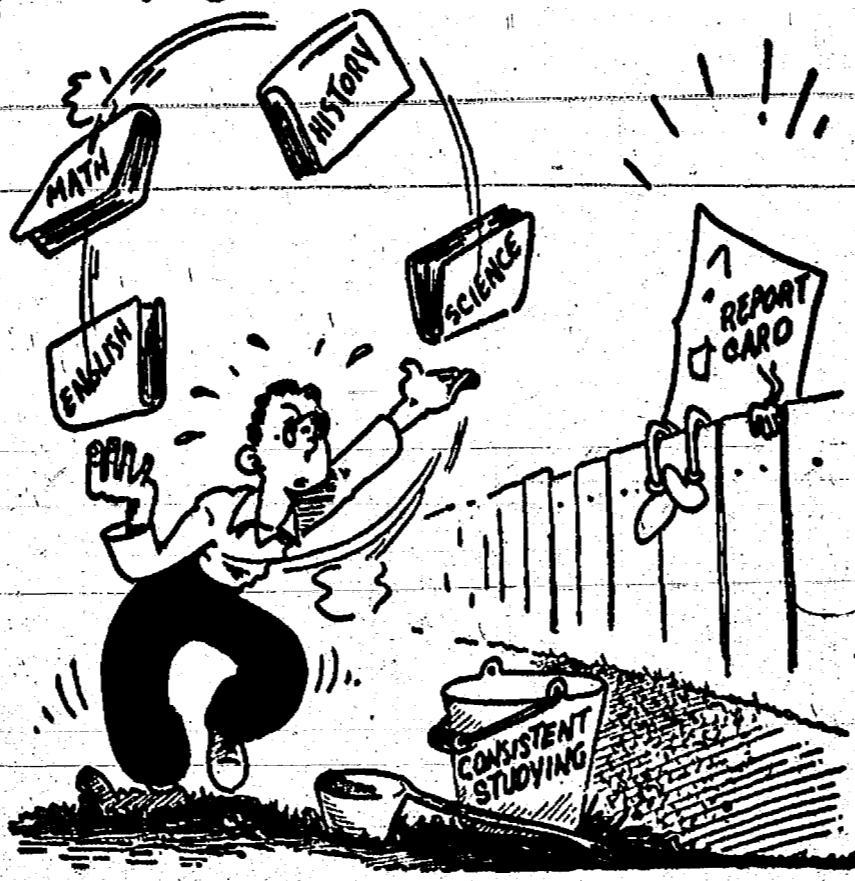
Movies . . .

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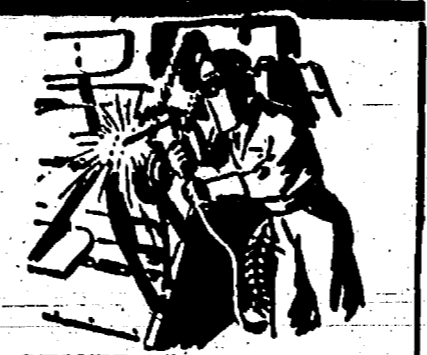

The W.S.C.S. luncheon meeting held Wednesday, May 3, at the Methodist church was a well-attended and much-enjoyed gathering. The featured speaker, Mrs. Jean Van Rooyen, of the South African Red Cross Mobile Unit, proved to be as interesting a speaker as had been anticipated by the group in announcing her appearance here. She gave a vivid description of the life and customs of natives in South Africa and told many humorous anecdotes of her own experiences in teaching child care, home economics and health improvement subjects. She said the German Reformed Church and the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches are doing very fine work in improving conditions among the people of South Africa which number 15 million Negroes. Approximately three million Europeans also reside there, she said. She described the South African natives as very hospitable people, always willing to take in friends and relatives until sometimes as many as twenty-five people lived together in the same hut. She said when a girl married her dowry needed to be only two grass mats and the young couple would move right in with the rest of the large family. She continued by saying that the high incidence of tuberculosis among the natives was directly traceable to this quality of hospitality with its resultant overcrowding and the custom of all eating out of the same cooking pot.

**Dr. Ernest Ligon Will Lecture at Methodist Church**

Dr. Ernest M. Ligon, professor of psychology at Union College, Schenectady, N.Y., and originator and director of the Union College character research project now being used in forty-five churches throughout the country, is to be at the Chelsea Methodist church next Monday, May 15. He will give a lecture, open to the public, in the church auditorium beginning at 7:15 p.m.

The Ligon system of religious education was begun in 1935 at Union College in cooperation with the Westminster Presbyterian church of Albany, N.Y. Nine major denominations are now participating in the character research project. The local Methodist church introduced the program here last September. Also participating are Y.M.C.A. organizations in three cities and a private school in Indianapolis.
