## New Pupils in High School Report Early

Returning Students Asked To Enroll Thursday, Sept. 7

Albert C. Johnson, Chelsea schools superintendent, announces that high school pupils who are enrolling in Chelsea High school for the first time and have not previously enrolled, are asked to report to Room 12 in the high school building, Wednesday, Aug. 30, or Thursday, Aug. 31, between the hours of 8:30-11:30 a.m. or 1-3 p.m. Textbooks will be sold during the same hours for grades 7 through 12 and pupils will have an opportunity to sign up for lockers. Pupils are to furnish their own locks.

The attention of chemistry students is being called to the fact that there is a change in chemistry textbooks effective this year. The next textbook adopted is entitled "Modern Chemistry" by Dull, Brooks and Metcalf and is published by Henry Holt & Co.

Pupils previously enrolled in high school and all other grades including kindergarten, will enroll in their home rooms on the morning of Thursday, Sept. 7.

A number of courses of study will be offered in the high school grades and pupils may select any one or a combination of the following: college preparatory, commercial, agriculture, home economics and shop.

Surveys completed among graduates and employers two years ago indicated a need for an improved and more practical commercial program in the high school.

Johnson said. With this in mind, plans have been made to meet these needs, he said, and a new course called "office practice" will be offered for the first time this year. The course will include the transcription of shorthand to typing, use of adding machines, dictaphones, filing equipment, etc. Machines have been purchased for this program.

The speech correction program instituted here last year has proved very successful. Mr. Johnson said. Approximately 100 children participated in the program last year and about the same number is expected this year.

The schools of Chelsea, Dexter and Manchester co-operated in the program last year. The three school systems pro-rated the amount of the cost of the program and reimbursed by state each district paying its share. A fourth school—Saline—is being added to the co-operating group this year.

## 5-Mill Levy Will Be Asked for School Site

The Chelsea Agricultural schools board of education voted at a special meeting Tuesday evening to submit to electors the proposition of a five-mill building and site fund levy for one year, the fund thus-raised to be used solely for school building and site purchase at some future date.

The election on the proposition is to be held in the gymnasium at the school Sept. 12 and polls are to be open from 2 until 8 p.m. A public meeting to discuss the proposition is to be held next Thursday, Aug. 31, at 8 p.m., at the High School.

Because of unsettled conditions in the building field because of war conditions, the board deemed it unwise to push any proposed building program at this time, but felt that a building and site fund raised at this time would aid greatly in any future building program.

Other business transacted at Tuesday's meeting included acceptance of the resignation of Ned Sauter as coach at the High school, effective immediately. The resignation had been submitted to school officials Monday.

## Korean War OK'd by Moscow, Says Dawson

Prof. Dawson of the University of Michigan, who served in several branches of the federal government during the war and was sent to Greece by the government when the United States decided on its program of aid to that country, was the guest speaker at the Chelsea meeting Monday evening.

Commenting on the Greek situation at the present time, he said it was a credit to the United States that Greece had been put on a better economic basis than it had known for many years.

He said the Greek situation was the first of the threats of Communism domination and marked the beginning of the so-called cold war. He said Greece today is proof of the soundness of the Marshall plan.

He spoke at length on the Korean situation and said that the North Korean invasion of South Korea was staged almost to the day that was the third anniversary of the day General Marshall first mentioned his plan of aiding Europe in a speech at Harvard in 1947.

He said it was his belief that the action by the North Koreans was undoubtedly not only approved by Moscow but instigated by it. He spoke of probable intentions of Russia in the Korean set-up, stating that the little country of very little military value to western powers could be a real nuisance to Russia in event of "all-out" war, because it is in the line of communication between Siberia and Port Arthur.

## Washtenaw October Draft Quota Set at 64

Next Thursday, Aug. 31, almost 400 men from the county are to go to the Detroit induction center for their pre-induction physical examinations. If draft processing can be completed in time, men from this group will be among the county's quota of 64 to be inducted in September.

Spokesmen at draft headquarters in Ann Arbor said yesterday that 290 men will be sent to Detroit for pre-induction physicals Sept. 25. The Ann Arbor draft board office had not yet received official notice of the October induction quota, which presumably will be filed from this pre-induction group.

Draft officials are finding it difficult to provide the large numbers of men required for pre-induction quotas from the higher age groups. They said yesterday that they are getting down to the 19-year-olds in the group needed to fill the county's pre-induction quota, to be called for physicals Sept. 25.

Mrs. Martin Merkel, who had been in ill health for some time, died unexpectedly at her home Thursday evening. ## THIS WEEK IN Washington

MORE THAN A MONTH late, the senate has finally passed the omnibus appropriations bill for fiscal 1951 which started July 1, 1950, carrying a total of some \$24,000,000,000. The final measure was made indefinite by adoption of an amendment to require a 10 per cent cut in all but postal, military and foreign economic aid funds. It is possible the 10 per cent cut will top off approximately a billion dollars.

However, none of the senate action was certain to be in the bill which is to be sent to the President, since the house several weeks ago passed a bill carrying \$23,393,694,668, but not including foreign aid. The two bills now go to conference. In the meantime, the President has asked for \$10.5 billion in 1951 supplemental military appropriations and for another \$4 billion for military aid abroad.

According to Sen. Scott Lucas of Illinois, Democratic majority leader, the omnibus measure, approach to the appropriations proved a step and it is the thought of congress to go back to the old method of passing separate bills for appropriations for each department of the government.

The senate finally beat down all attempts by opponents to slash ECA appropriations, one attempt by Senator Kem of Missouri, two by Sen. Kenneth Wherry of Nebraska and actually they increase ECA funds when Sen. Carl Hayden of Arizona got through an amendment to provide \$2,450,000 to aid Arab refugees from Palestine, bringing the total in the bill for that activity to \$27,450,000. In addition, the senate went further and approved a \$100,000,000 loan for Spain by the export-import bank and upped the ECA funds by another \$58,000,000.

In the meantime, the house and senate were highlighted by a raging fight on what economic controls to give to President Truman in the Korean war effort. Both branches of congress passed and reversed themselves, the house twice on measures for this purpose and finally wound up just where they started. **THE FIRST PASSAGE** in the lesson text records a part of Mary's song of rejoicing when she had been greeted by Elizabeth as the mother of the Lord. The song has become known as the "Magnificat." In the second passage we read of Mary as she found the boy Jesus in the temple. The third shows Mary and sons seeking Jesus as he taught a multitude. The fourth depicts the scene at the cross, when Jesus committed his mother to the care of John. The last tells of Mary, after the resurrection, praying with the disciples in the upper room.

From these several passages we learn that Mary came only at the last to realize how truly great was her Son—came to sit, as it were, at his feet as the Saviour of the world.

Mary is not due the adoration of the Roman church, but she should be accorded a higher place among Protestants than is commonly given her. Stainless in soul, ever a tender and solicitous mother as she watched over her illustrious Son, she exhibited at times human errors in dealing with him, but came at last to the full understanding of his mission and to trust in him for the life which he had come to bring men more abundantly.

Let us give Mary an exalted place as the mother of our Lord, the while we pray to God alone and trust in Mary's great Son for redemption and eternal life.

## Labor Specialist Reports Shortage of Farm Helpers

John R. Vloch, farm labor specialist for this area, reports that there is a critical shortage of farm help at the present time, that is, help for seasonal and year-round work. He therefore urges farmers to report their needs immediately to the local employment office so that the local offices and farm labor specialist in those offices can process immediately any applicants looking for farm work. Tomato pickers are starting to migrate from the Traverse City area, and that type of labor must be placed immediately or they will continue on to other states.

Therefore, Mr. Vloch suggests that anyone who is needing tomato pickers should report their needs immediately to one of the local offices, so that people migrating from Traverse City area can be referred to those jobs immediately. He also suggests that if anyone in this area knows of persons who are desirous of obtaining a farm job, either year-round or seasonal, that person should report the idle help immediately to one of our local employment offices. Offices are located in Monroe, Adrian, Ypsilanti, Ann Arbor and Wayne for this area. The office phone number at Monroe is 1096, at Adrian 490, at Ann Arbor 2-4491, at Ypsilanti 374 and in Wayne 3725.

He reports that there are many jobs open for year-round help, both single and married men, and anyone who is desirous of obtaining a year-round job should contact one of these members. All offices will be glad to give you full information on the job openings at the present time, and he again urges anyone knowing the whereabouts of any idle farm labor to report it immediately to one of these offices so that it may be utilized in this area.

**'Death Stretch' on US-12 Claims Two More Victims**

The accident on US-12 last week Wednesday afternoon in which a Detroit couple was killed and three persons injured is said to be one of the worst ever to occur on a Washtenaw county highway. Two trucks and four automobiles were involved in quick succession after the trucks side-swiped and went out of control.

One truck was loaded with 1,300 cases of beer and the other was an empty truck with a flat bed used for hauling baled paper. Both were large vehicles of the "semi" type.

The beer truck driver, Robert E. Davis of Niles, narrowly missed burning to death when his cab burst into flames as he succeeded in stopping it after the collision. He jumped an instant before the cab was enveloped with flames.

Driver of the empty paper truck was Wyman Cobb of Detroit. Mr. and Mrs. Christie Walters of Detroit, 71 and 68 years of age, respectively, were the ones who were killed, and the injured were Mr. and Mrs. Duane Fowle of Jackson, with cuts and bruises.

George Miles of Detroit, who suffered a broken neck, and Davis, the beer truck driver, who was burned on the left arm.

The three-lane highway west from Ann Arbor has been labeled a "death stretch" because of the frequent and serious accidents which have occurred there. Since April of this year six persons have lost their lives in accidents along the two-mile stretch of highway about four miles west of Ann Arbor, near the Staebler road intersection.

Speed controls with patrolling officers to enforce them are being advocated by the sheriff's department as an immediate measure to cut down accidents on the three-lane highway. Eventual widening of the entire length of US-12 to make it a four-lane highway is considered by many people in the community to be the only real solution to the problem.

Saline — Police Chief Ray Ott announced Saturday that an attempt would be made here to organize a Junior Police department, consisting of boys between the ages of 12 and 15 years.

"We hope to make this program educational as well as recreational," said Carlton, "and in the functions of the law. 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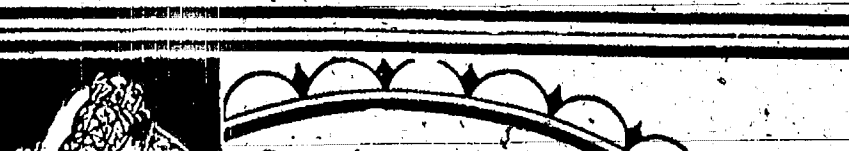

**EASY DOES IT**

TO REMOVE THE RING around a bath tub, apply kerosene with paper toweling, then wash clean with soapy water. Rust stains may be removed from bathtub by rubbing with cut lemon. Wash off after using, as acid will stain porcelain.

Never apply polish to dusty furniture as it leaves it sticky. A dirty cloth will soil and darken the wood. Leave no trace of unabsorbed polish on furniture, or it will give a cloudy appearance. Test for dryness with a clean dry finger: it will not leave a track.

When applying wax to furniture, rub with a heavy flannel cloth until desired sheen is reached. Use only thin coatings of wax.

If furniture has been badly neglected, use a mixture of 3 table-

Chevy Chocolate Brownies  
(Makes 16)  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1 1/4 cups brown sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1/2 cup flour  
2 squares chocolate, melted  
1 cup broken pecans  
Add sugar, vanilla and melted, cooled chocolate to beaten eggs. Add flour and half of the pecans. Spread 1/2-inch thick in a buttered square pan and sprinkle remaining pecans over the top. Bake in a slow (325°F.) oven for 20 to 25 minutes. Cut into squares while warm. Dust with confectioners' sugar, if desired.

spoons lard, 1 tablespoon turpentine and 1 quart of hot water. Mix thoroughly and let cool. Wring a soft cloth out in this solution and wash a small area. Wash quickly and dry quickly.

Cut glass may be washed with a soft brush in mild soapsuds and lukewarm water. After drying, place on a turkish towel to let it absorb excess moisture. For a brilliant luster, dip the outside, while slightly wet, in jeweler's sawdust. When dry, remove sawdust with soft cloth or tissue.

Cloudy glass vinegar cruet can be cleaned by letting a dilute solution of ammonia stand in them for a short time. Rinse off solution, then wash in soap and water and rinse thoroughly.

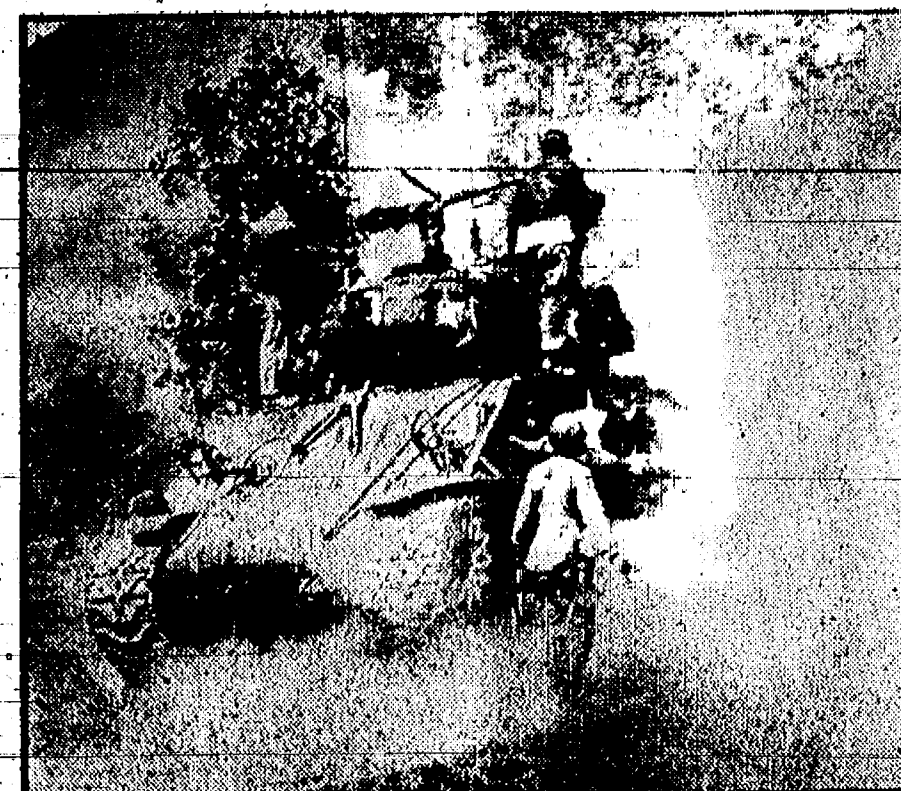

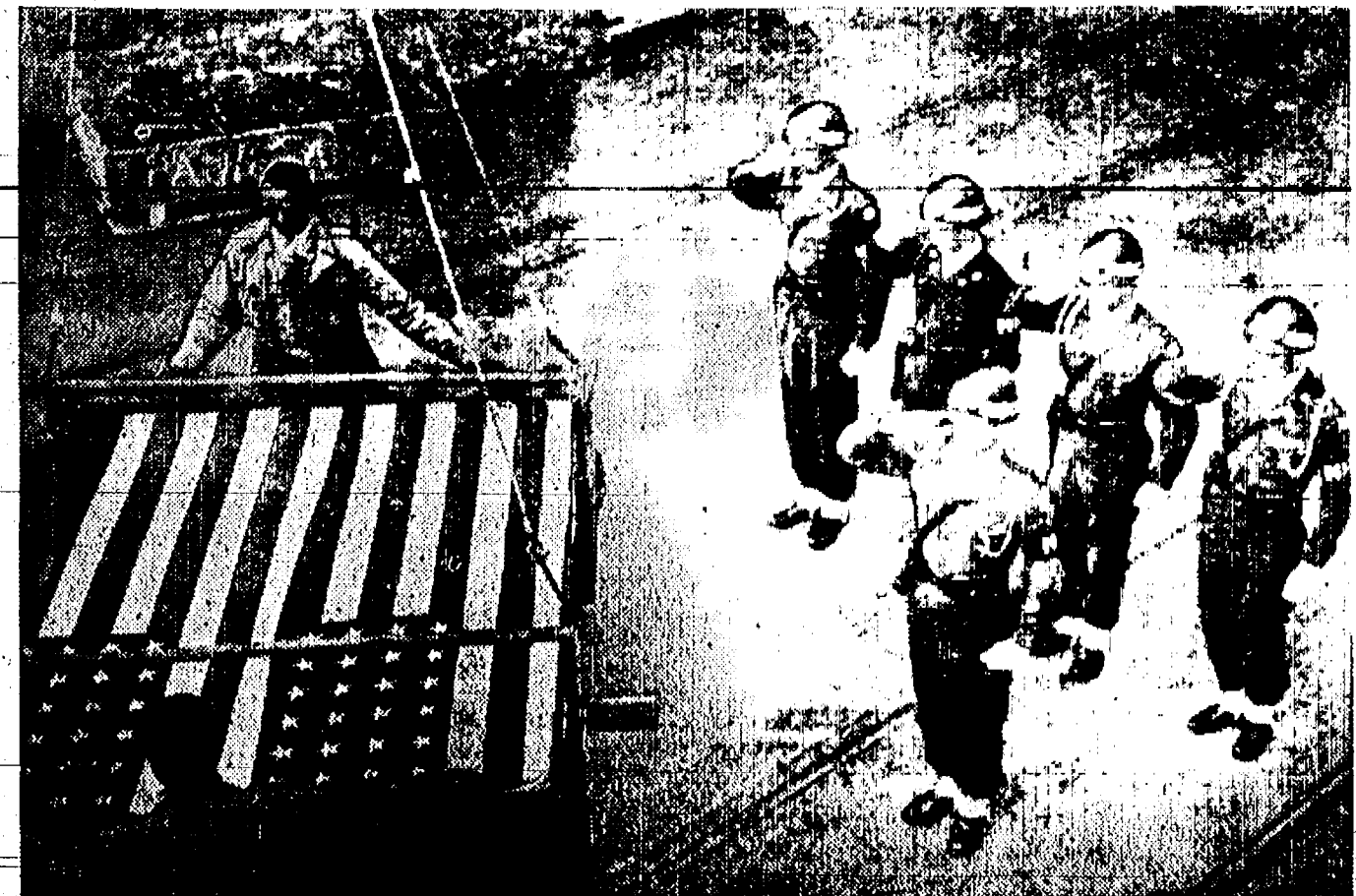

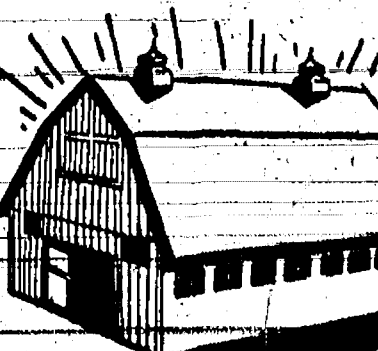
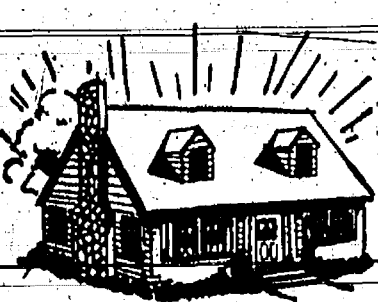
## Railroad Crossings Will Be Improved

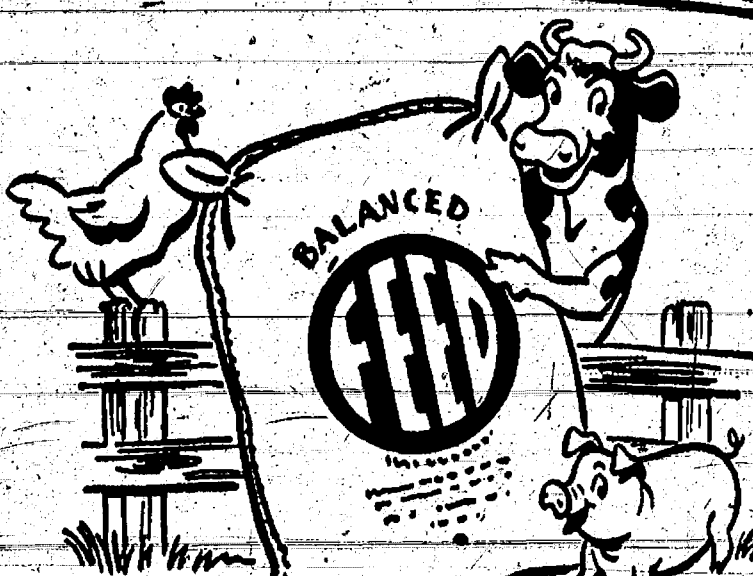
