Pilgrims Deplored "Yo Christmas Day"

Puritan disapproval of Christmas celebrations disembarked from the Mayflower with the Pilgrims in 1621 and, accordingly, Governor Bradford issued a statement publicly rebuking certain young men who declined to work on December 25, "ye day called Christmas."

This first New England Christ-

mas -or non-observance thereofshould not be credited as the first Christmas on American soil, since Leif Eriksen spent a winter or two on the North American continent around the turn of the 11th century. Leif was a Christian, and it is likely that members of his crew were Christians, too; although it is quite possible that some had accepted the faith without remodeling their pagan natures, since King Olar's methods were ruthless and his command "Be baptized, or else!" left them little choice.

Undoubtedly, flagons of crude, raw wine fermented from the grapes of Leif's Vinland were passed around, and the celebration may have been rather boisterous. but in all fairness to Leif-who, according to excellent testimony, was a sincere convert—it is reasonable

One of the most impressive customs in the world is observed in Switzerland where the "singing at the fountains" is done by the Se-bastlani brotherhood in the pictur-

esque spa town of Rheinfelden.
According to the Swiss writer
Gottleib Wyss, the custom is more
than 400 years old, dating from 1540 when a plague, sweeping through many lands, visited Rheinfelden. Twelve men formed a brotherhood in honor of St. Sebastian, promising to pray to him to safeguard their town from further distress. They also undertook to nurse those afflieted by the plague and to bury its victims.

If one of their own members died, the brethren acted as pallbearers. and up to the present day, by their own selection, the membership of A second-rate army is just as the brotherhood has remained at 12. useless as the second-best hand in Pestilence in the medieval period

was ascribed to the evil spirits in the water, and when the Sebastiani brethren make their rounds of brethren make their rounds of seven fountains on Christmas eve, they start at the fountain in the 'Froschweide' where the plague started in the 16th century. Danger of Fire Is Greatly Enhanced By Christmas Tree

THE AVERAGE CHRISTMAS tree can go up in smoke in only two minutes. That doesn't leave much time for the fire department to get

A live tree with roots packed in sure and keep the dirt moistened. A small tree is safer than a large one and festive trimmings can make up what it lacks in size.

Keep the tree outdoors until you are ready to set it up inside. When you bring it in, keep it in the coolest part of the house with the radiator nearest it turned off.

Use noninflammable aluminum feil-not cotton or paper-to conceal container in which tree is "'planted." Use noninflammable trimmings on

Don't use lighted candles. (This may seem an unnecessary precau-tion in this day of electric, lights, but lighted candles contribute to tragic fires every year.)

Check the wiring for the tree to see that it's not frayed and is in' perfect condition. The switch for turning off and on electric lights should be at some distance from the tree. Don't plug or unplug lights

Don't leave tree lights on when it isn't necessary and especially From time to time, check over the tree and see if needles near the lights are turning brown. If they have, move the lights.

Watch the calendar. New Year's is the day for the tree to go down. If you should extend the time, don't leave the lights on the tree for more than a half hour at a time.


