



POACHED EGGS and boiled fish will hold together much more easily if you add a little bit of salt to the water in which they're cooked.

Cocoanuts will break more easily if they are placed in a hot oven for a few minutes before you crack them. Make a hole into the end and pour out the milk.

Add vinegar and salt to water in which you clean cauliflower and other similar vegetables. Let stand a few minutes to draw out bugs and worms.

Melt chocolate without soiling a pan or dish by wrapping the squares or chunks in a piece of aluminum foil or by lining the top of the double boiler with waxed paper.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK
Pork Tenderloin, Tomato Sauce (Serves 4)

2 pounds pork tenderloin
Flour, salt and pepper
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 tablespoon water
Bread crumbs
2 tablespoons bacon drip-
pings
2 cups tomato juice
Dip tenderloin, cut in serving size pieces in seasoned flour, then in egg diluted with water. Dip in crumbs. Brown in skillet with bacon drippings. Add tomato juice and simmer gently for 30 minutes. Serve with tomato sauce, thickened with flour and water, if desired.

Letting the tea cool slowly. Let it cool to room temperature before icing or placing in refrigerator.

Prevent olive oil from turning rancid by placing a lump of sugar in the bottle when you first open it.

Let cakes cool before taking them from the pan. They will not break if you set the pans after removing from the oven on a damp cloth for about five minutes.

Celery and lettuce keep crisp for several days if you wash in very cold water, wrap lightly in waxed paper and close the ends of the paper with rubber bands.

A dripping-pitcher spout can be cured easily if you rub fingers with a bit of butter, then go over the lip of the pitcher with them, once lightly.

Report from Washington

By Congressman George Meader

Washington, D. C., May 2, 1951—An example of the type of federal spending which requires close scrutiny in the interests of economy and the prevention of expanded bureaucracy was brought out in one phase of the debate on appropriation bills now being considered by the House of Representatives.

This debate also demonstrated why the Congress has to resort to percentage cuts in appropriation requests or to granting the same amount spent by a department or agency in the previous year, in-

stead of making more scientific economy efforts.

Representative Lawrence Smith of Wisconsin introduced an amendment to the Labor Department Federal Security Agency appropriation bill. This amendment, which was adopted, reads: "No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall be used for publicity or propaganda purposes not heretofore authorized by the Congress."

Mr. Smith pointed out that Mr. Oscar Ewing, Federal Security Administrator, had testified that he spent considerable money on traveling and made 18 speeches during 1949. Also, Mr. Smith said, it was proposed, under Social Security, to allow \$2,150,018 for printing and reproduction.

Representative Frank Row of Ohio, who was counsel for the Subcommittee on Publicity and Propaganda of the House Expenditures Committee in the 80th Congress, cited Budget Bureau figures showing that in 1946, \$75,000,000 was spent on propaganda and publicity activities of the federal bureaus and departments and that 45,000 employees were identified as engaged in such activities. Actually, he said, many employees not so identified also were engaged in propaganda activities. He estimated the propaganda cost for this year at \$100,000,000.

In support of Mr. Smith's amendment, I made the following statements during the debate:

"There is far more than merely the amount of money involved in this particular principle. I have previously urged my belief that it is necessary to strengthen the Congress in the interest of formulating national policy by the people themselves.

"It is a corollary to that principle that public opinion ought not to be subjected to influence and direction by the executive agencies, the administrative branch of the Government, in the manner that it is today.

"In a democracy, where public opinion rules in the long run, the media of communication: the press, the radio, television and the printed word, are very potent weapons in the control of the affairs of this country. The people should not finance use of these agencies to foster and perpetuate the bureaucracy—not the people's objectives in national policy.

"If \$100,000,000 is being spent by the Federal agencies on the executive branch of the Government for the purpose of influencing opinion, that is a trend and a tendency which is not in the interest of government by the people, but fosters and supports bureaucratic direction of the thinking of the electorate. That is the basic question which is involved in the amendment.

I expressed the belief that simply restricting the use of funds for propaganda purposes is not an adequate solution to the problem, and asked Representative Fogarty of Rhode Island, chairman of the subcommittee in charge of the appropriation bill, to what extent his committee had been able to isolate the Government activities devoted to propaganda, how many employees and what expense are involved in these activities, and whether the committee has a staff to make a continuing check of these activities. I offered to support any request Mr. Fogarty might make for an adequate staff to obtain this information.

Mr. Fogarty replied that the difference between propaganda and proper publicity had not been defined, and called upon the supporters of Mr. Smith's amendment to "come up with some concrete evidence of what is being issued as propaganda."

"When you produce the proper evidence, we will get a sufficient staff to make a thorough investigation," he stated.

It should not be incumbent on individual members of the Congress to dig up evidence of the use of public funds for propaganda purposes. That is precisely the

function that ought to be performed by the staff of a committee. If members of the Congress had the time to obtain such evidence there would be no point in having a committee staff.

The members of the Congress do not have the time for thorough fact-finding concerning departmental or bureau activities, however. Adequate committee staffs are needed to do this job.

The Congress has the will to economize—it needs now is the instrument by which it can economize efficiently and intelligently.
