Recreation
Program Will
Start Monday

Chelsea's summer recreation program will begin Monday morning, June 25, and continue five days a week for a full eight-week period. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Harvey, who were in charge of the program last year, are to guide the activities again this summer.

Mrs. Harvey will lead the playground activities on the school grounds each morning, while Mr. Harvey will be at the athletic field. Each afternoon is to be given over to the increased swimming program planned for this year.

Two school buses with their regular drivers will be made available for the entire eight-week swimming period, and four people qualified to act as lifeguards will be on duty at all times at the beach.

In addition to the lifeguards, a Red Cross instructor will be present two afternoons a week to note the progress of youngsters in passing their qualification tests for swimming certificates. George Winchester, who already has his senior life-saving certificate, is now taking Red Cross training to become an instructor. He is one of the lifeguards who will be on duty each day.

Douglas Vogel, one of the bus drivers, has also qualified for lifeguard duty and Mr. and Mrs. Harvey are the others who will act in that capacity.

Two lifeguards are being added to the equipment at the playground. Enrollment in all activities last year was 5,600, with an average of 100 youngsters taking advantage of the swimming program. Swimming was provided only three days a week last year. It is expected that this year's enrollment will be considerably larger in all divisions of the program.

The budget for the recreation program this year was set at \$1,500 and Recreation Council officials said this week that they still lack \$200 of that amount. They suggest that all organizations and persons who plan to contribute do so as soon as possible.

'M' Professor
To Address
C. of C. Group

DR. J. PHILIP WERNETTE

At the June 19 meeting of the Chelsea Chamber of Commerce, Dr. J. Philip Wernette, professor of Business Administration at the University of Michigan, addressed the group on the topic "The Strength of the American Economy."

A native of Michigan, he lived in Grand Rapids when he was a boy. The family later moved to California and he graduated from the University of California. He went to Harvard for his doctor's degree and taught there from 1927 to 1945. From 1945 to 1948, he was president of the University of New Mexico. He is a member of many professional and honorary organizations and has written books and articles on economic and business subjects. Widely traveled, he has visited every state in the United States as well as twenty foreign countries and has served as financial adviser to the governments of Colombia and Peru. He was in government work in World War II and spent a year in Europe, studying economic and political problems.

He is editor of the Michigan Business Review.

Dr. Wernette spoke in the Chelsea Public Library lecture series.

M'-Go-Round
Given for
Pierce Park

Lloyd Heydiauff, chairman of the park committee of the Chelsea Chamber of Commerce, has announced that through the generosity of Central Fibre company employees and Donald Bacon, president of the company, Pierce Park is to have a 12-foot merry-go-round.

The merry-go-round will accommodate from 35 to 50 children at one time. The merry-go-round is described as completely safe. It is operated with hand and foot pumping apparatus which work with pull rods attached to an eccentric on the top of the axle assembly. Pumps are made of steel pipe for easy hand grip.

There are eight seats on the merry-go-round and two of these are equipped with the hand and foot pumping apparatus.

Safety features of the merry-go-round are listed as follows: (1) Propulsion pumps eliminate need for hopping on and off merry-go-round while it is in motion. (2) All moving parts are enclosed. (3) Base is inside of seat diameter so legs cannot be caught. (4) A safety mesh prevents children from falling through structure. (5) Seats are 28 inches above the ground and pumps are 18 inches above ground. (6) Machine operates level with ground with no side sway.

The merry-go-round is shipped in triangular-shaped sections which are ready to bolt together. The axle assembly is completed and ready for installation. The merry-go-round can be assembled by two men in two or three hours, it is said.

It is believed the merry-go-round will be in place this week.

Contracts Awarded
for Construction of
Elementary School

At a special meeting of the Chelsea Agricultural Schools Board of Education Thursday evening the body authorized signing of the contracts for the new elementary school building to be erected on the Maywood-Pierce site. The contracts were officially signed Tuesday afternoon of this week. The original low bids of \$258,686 for the general contracting and \$45,500 for the mechanical contract were lowered to \$238,068 and \$44,320 by eliminating some items which can be added later. The size of the building and the number of rooms remain the same. There will be 14 classrooms and the all-purpose room and kitchen as planned, in addition to office space and restrooms.

Contracts call for construction to begin within 15 days after approval is secured for the amount of steel needed. Maximum time for completion is given as 350 days. School officials, however, are hoping the building will be completed in less time.

As signed, the contracts are as follows: W. N. Bjorklund, Douglas, Mich., general contracting, \$238,068; United Piping and Erecting Co., Lansing, mechanical contract (plumbing and heating) \$44,320; City Electric Co., Ann Arbor, electrical contract, \$15,200. This brings the total amount to \$297,578.

Architects for the building are Louis C. Kingscott and Associates, of Kalamazoo.

Monday Evening

Mrs. Maude C. Fox died at her residence, 124 Grant street, Monday evening after an illness of five weeks which followed a year of failing health.

Born in Kalamazoo, Ont., Dec. 22, 1872, Mrs. Fox was the second of three daughters born to David and Ann Wenham Dufos. The family came to the United States in 1884 and made their home in Adrian township, Lenawee county. Mrs. Fox was married there to her husband, Ford D. Fox, Nov. 21, 1893. They lived in Franklin township, Lenawee county and in Lapeer county and Detroit before coming to Chelsea in Nov. 1937. Mr. Fox died here four years later.

Mrs. Fox was a member of Unit 81, American Legion Auxiliary. Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Thursday (today) at the Miller Funeral Home with Rev. Skentelbury officiating. Burial will be in Brookside cemetery, Tecumseh.

Filing Date
Nears for
School Board

The annual school election will be held here July 9, for the purpose of electing one trustee for a 3-year term, and to vote on a proposal regarding salaries of the secretary and treasurer of the Board of Education. The term of William Kolb expires this year.

The proposal for an adjustment of the salary of the secretary and treasurer provides for payment of \$5 per meeting for each meeting over a required 20 meetings per fiscal year. The secretary now receives \$200 per year while the treasurer receives \$300. These salaries would remain fixed at this amount for the first 20 meetings of a fiscal year and then the two officials would receive \$5 for each meeting they were required to attend over and above the 20 meetings.

The three remaining trustees receive \$5 for each meeting they attend throughout the year. With the present building program, officials state, the secretary and treasurer are required to attend as many special meetings that the fixed salary per year is deemed unfair to them.

The school election will be by regular ballot and will be held in the high school gymnasium, the hours to be announced later.

Persons desiring to have their names placed on the ballot as candidates for the office of school trustee must file petitions with the Board of Education 20 days before the election date. Final date for filing petitions is June 19. Each petition must bear the signatures of at least 50 qualified electors of the district.

Petitions are available at the superintendent's office in the high school.

Zion Pastor
on 25th Year

REV. M. W. BRUECKNER

Members of Zion Lutheran church at Rogers Corners will honor their pastor, Rev. M. W. Brueckner, at special services in the church at 10 a.m. Sunday and at an open-house reception in the parish hall in the afternoon, in observance of the twenty-fifth anniversary of his pastorate here. He came to the Rogers Corners church in 1926. Two years ago, on Aug. 7, 1949, Rev. Brueckner was feted by the church on the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the ministry. At that time he was presented with a new Ford car as a gift from his parishioners.

People of the community are invited to attend the morning services and the open-house in the afternoon. Former members of the congregation are especially urged to be present for both occasions. A program will be given at the open-house and will begin at 3 o'clock.

Rev. Brueckner has served only three parishes in his 52 years as a minister of the American Lutheran Church. Graduating from Wartburg Seminary in Dubuque, Ia., in 1899, he was ordained in St. James church in Toledo, Ohio, where he remained as pastor until 1912.

From 1912 to 1926 he served as pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran church in Alpena, and the remainder of his ministry has been spent at the Rogers Corners church.

From 1910 until 1922 he was president of the Michigan District of the American Lutheran Church and for the past 30 years he has been a member of the board of directors of the Lutheran Orphans' and Old Folks' Home at Toledo.

He is the only member of the class of 17 with whom he graduated, who is still actively engaged as a minister. Two others of the class are the only ones beside himself, who survive. The two are both retired.

Rev. Brueckner is now 74 years old. He was born in Pine Hill, Michigan, April 4, 1877. His father was also a minister and he has two sons who have taken up the work. They are Rev. Bruno Brueckner, of Capac, and Rev. Ted Brueckner, of San Bernardino, Calif. Two of his daughters, Mrs. James Hunter, of St. Clair, and Mrs. Herbert Schaefer, now in southern India, are wives of ministers. Another son, Morris, lives in Detroit, and another daughter, Mrs. Robert Warren, resides in Temperance, Ohio.

Report from Washington

By Congressman George Meader

Washington, D. C. — Four specific suggestions to help strengthen Congress, to improve the quality of legislation and block infiltration into the legislative process by power-hungry bureaucrats were offered to the Senate Committee on Expenditures in the Executive Departments last week.

They were contained in testimony which I presented on committee procedure and the staffing of congressional committees in response to an invitation from the committee, which is making a review of all phases of the operation of the Congress under the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946.

The proposals are:

1. Substantial increase in the number of investigators, attorneys and research assistants provided in the Act for each of the 19 standing committees of the House and the Senate.

2. Discouraging the practice of borrowing committee staff personnel from the executive branch of the government.

3. Maintaining a corps of competent, trained investigators by the Senate Rules Committee and the House Administration Committee, to be made available to any committee of either house for investigative activities.

4. Discontinuing the use of committee staff for the payment of political debts through patronage appointments.

My position has repeatedly been made clear that the strengthening of the Congress is one of the greatest needs of the government today; that this can best be done by employing competent committee investigators to provide the Congress with the basic facts on complicated national problems.

Without such information, the Congress will go on as it has, creating executive boards, commissions and agencies, granting them vast discretionary authority, entrusting to them huge amounts of public funds with only the most superficial and cursory check upon their activities. And the Congress will continue to be influenced in its legislative work by the thinking, the statistical and factual studies, and the representations of

empire-builders in the executive branch of the government.

A 1950 survey showed fewer than 300 professional staff employees for all the committees of the Congress. This is about one fact-finding helper for each two congressmen and senators. This puny staff is expected to provide the factual information needed by the Congress in adopting the laws and providing the supervisory and investigatory control for more than two million employees in the executive branch.

The invasion of committee staffs by the executive departments, is a virtual fifth column movement when executive personnel is borrowed for committee investigations. This practice has the natural effect of coloring legislation with the point of view, the philosophy and the interests of the executive branch. A permanent employee of a department cannot divest himself of the outlook and desires of his department while he is on loan to a committee.

The idea of a pool of trained investigative personnel is not a suggestion for a congressional civil service. An elected representative of the people must have flexibility in the selection of his assistants. There must be complete loyalty and confidence between the member of the congressional committee and the staff. If the committee were forced to take employees against their will, the teamwork without which a committee could accomplish very little, would be impossible.

However, this is no endorsement

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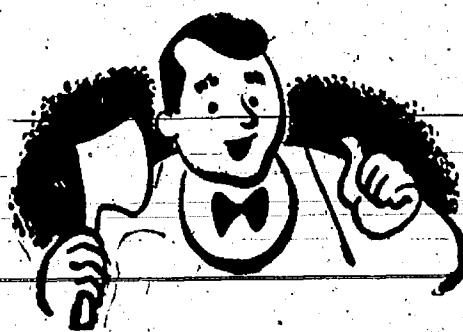

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of the use of committee staffs for patronage purposes. In the House, a member is stripped of his patronage appointments when he becomes a committee chairman, on the theory that the positions on his committee staff will substitute for his usual patronage.

Committee staff positions are too important to be used in this manner. The Congress needs on its committee staffs persons of ability who can make a real contribution to the fact-finding job of the committee, not political hacks whose contributions might be less than nothing.

Continuous Rat Control
