Speed Limit Depends on Many Factors

"How fast is fast?"

This question, Chief George Doe told The Standard today, probably arouses more widely divergent opinion among drivers than any other traffic safety topic.

"When such a marked difference of opinion exists, it is obvious why so many traffic accidents each year involve a speed violation."

A dangerous number of motorists, according to National Safety Council studies, feel that "too fast" is some sort of definite speed limit above which the laws of physics determine that a driver cannot be depended upon to have complete control of his car.

"Actually, 'too fast' may be any speed from 10 miles an hour to 100 miles an hour. We can't just arbitrarily say that 80, 70, 60 or 50 miles an hour is 'too fast' and let it go at that. These are times and places, for instance, when 90 miles an hour may not be an excessive speed at all—a supervised race course, for example. Even more often than this, however, there are times and places when 20 miles an hour may be literally 'fatal!'"

Chief Doe's interpretation of the problem was based on the theory that weather, road surfaces, mechanical factors, and the driver's physical and mental condition are the determining factors in the problem of what is a safe speed and what speed is dangerous.

"Posted speed limits," he said, "give only the top speed at which enforcement and engineering officials feel travel is safe under ideal weather, physical and mechanical conditions. Anything less than that calls for a proportionate reduction of speed."

Doe's discussion of speed coincided with the Michigan State Safety Commission's announcement of the June-July program of traffic safety education, which has as its slogan: "Now—Take It Easy!"

The program is being sponsored in cooperation with the National Safety Council and coordinated in Chelsea by the Police Department.

"Year in and year out," Chief Doe said, "about 9,000 traffic accidents in which at least one person is killed involve a speed violation of some sort. This is the price that drivers can expect to pay if they forget, or ignore, the fact that dangerous speed is any speed—when weather or other conditions are such as to cancel out an appreciable part of the driver's skill."

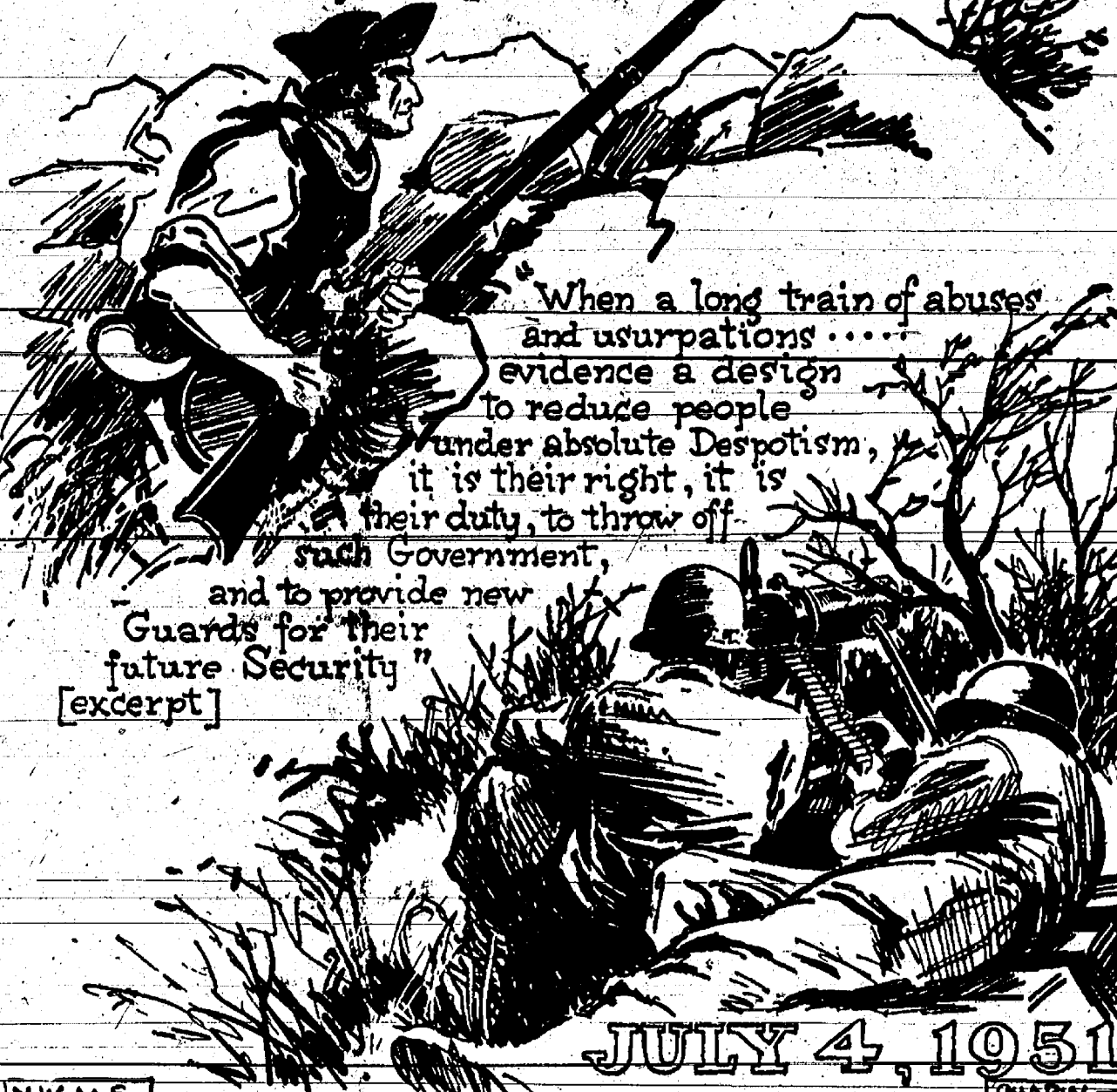
Bacon Family Plans Reunion in Park

Corn Borer Reported on Sweet Corn

Corn Borer eggs have been observed on sweet corn in Washtenaw county in the last week. They are found on the underside of the corn leaf and can be identified as a small cluster of silvery colored eggs. These eggs turn dark colored just before hatching. The color of the eggs will help in determining the time of the first spray which is usually five to eight days after the eggs are first noticed, or one to two days after the eggs become dark. For control use:

(a) A 5 per cent DDT dust at 25 to 40 pounds to the acre depending on the size of the corn.

(b) 3 pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT to 100 gallons of water. (3 level tablespoons to 1 gallon of water). The usual rate of application is 100 to 125 gallons of water per acre. Smaller plants take less spray. Emulsions may be used at 1 1/2 actual pounds of DDT to the acre providing they are used that do not burn or otherwise injure corn plants.

(c) 40 per cent ryania dust at 30 to 40 pounds to the acre depending on the size of the corn.

(d) 1 per cent rotenone dust for gardens only.

Treatments should begin when the eggs hatch. Otherwise commence when the extended leaf height is 25 inches. DDT and ryania treatments should go on every 5 to 7 days for 4 to 5 treatments or until 10 days before harvest. Rotenone should be put on every 5 days for 5 treatments.

Some Limit Catches Made as Anglers Invade Local Lakes

The size of the "fishing army" on opening day, Monday, this year was approximately 25 per cent smaller than last year, according to a report by Don Boyer, conservation officer for Washtenaw county.

Boyer said this was probably accounted for by the fact that opening day was on a Monday. On one local lake, he pointed out, there were 87 boats out last year, by actual count, on the opening day, while this year's count on the same lake was 61. The average held on most lakes in this vicinity.

Most fishermen were having fairly good success with blue gills and pan fish, Boyer said, and a number of limit catches were seen. Some fine black bass were also taken although no spectacular catches of bass were reported. The largest noted averaged three and one-half to four pounds.

Boyer said he had seen no pike taken from local lakes up until Tuesday noon.

Bait which proved most successful was reported to be night crawlers and worms.

Contract on Manchester Road Job Let

The Mid-American Engineering Corporation, which presently has its asphalt plant operating west of Chelsea, was the low bidder on the blacktopping of the 3.8 miles of Manchester-Chelsea road which is to be done this summer. Howard Minier, superintendent-manager for the Washtenaw county Road Commission said Monday that the State Highway Department has been authorized to proceed with the contract.

According to the construction company's schedule, providing favorable weather conditions prevail, it is hoped to complete the resurfacing project on US-12 the first week in July. Priming on the Manchester road stretch could then begin on July 5 and blacktopping approximately five days later. The 3.8 miles of the Manchester-Chelsea highway to be paved this year begins at a point between Waldo road and Lehman road and extends south to Pleasant Lake road.

The Mid-American company's bid for the job was \$38,948.40. Next lowest bid was \$36,450 submitted by the John Yerrington company.

After Monday's regular Road Commission meeting, Minier announced that work on the repair of the Waldo road bridge is to be begun soon. A contract for the bridge repair work was let last week.

Other action at the Road Commission meeting included setting July 28 as the date for the annual picnic of Road Commission employees. The picnic is to be held at Dexter Huron park.

State-Wide Tid Bits

Politics in Michigan also is on vacation. Some stirrings are evident, but from all appearances the summer slacks is here.

Most activity stems from the GOP state central committee where they are trying to create a more tightly knit organization—such as has been definitely lacking in the last two elections.

The new 18 1/2-year-old draft has caused the greatest furor in the state the last few weeks. Despite assurances that "it will be months or even years" before any men under 19 are called—eligible men are reluctant to enter colleges as employers are to hire them until the new law has been tested.

Reports in the college draft deferment tests show that some two-thirds were above the passing mark of 70. Seventy doesn't mean deferment for sure... this phase of selective service is as confused as any other.

Michigan's first draft call for doctors has been chopped from 87 to 41. The medical will get the nod July 26. The number was cut because it was impossible to recruit 87.

Senator Moody already has drawn fire. Discussing the controls program in a Washington news letter Republican Rep. Shaffer said, "A publicity minded freshman attracted some attention recently by soliciting the advice of Bernard Baruch on the subject of inflation."

Moody is not being ignored by the GOP.

Meanwhile Michigan Republicans have opened a campaign to present a unified front against more federal consumer taxes. In telegrams sent to several congressmen Owen J. Cleary, chairman of the state central committee, suggested a solid bloc to oppose further taxes on income, gasoline, cigarettes, automobiles and other items.

Not missing an opportunity to blast the governor, Cleary said: "While Gov. Williams, as a Democrat, says he is opposed to consumer taxes, he hasn't raised his voice about the Democratic plans in Washington to grab millions of dollars more from Michigan people—the federal government is bleeding Michigan."

Gov. Williams is still promoting the St. Lawrence Seaway project to open Atlantic shipping to the midwest. He said that the \$18,000,000 project did their best to sell the project to Missouri valley representatives at a meeting of 15 inland governors. Result? Nothing as yet.

While the CIO is working to get a referendum on the 1 1/2 cent per gallon gasoline tax rise, the Good Roads Federation has been assured that opponents of the tax will be stymied in any efforts to invalidate or repeal the levy.

John J. Jacob, general counsel of the Wayne county road commission, says the "gas tax increase is the state constitution exempts appropriations for state institutions from a referendum."

It will be inflation or deflation this summer? Economists say the Russian ruble is rising but the dollar is falling. But does it HAVE to be one or the other? There was a time.

A safety program has been started to reduce the number of small plant accidents. There are 225 accidents for every million man hours in small organizations while large plants have a casualty rate of only 8.95.

Is there too much industry in Detroit? A Washington house-sense too much concentration of defense industry in the Motor City. That is national security, the committee calls it.

A bill providing \$3,000,000 for county and city TB hospitals has become law. The money will be distributed by the emergency appropriations commission ("Little Legislature").

Average price of farm real estate on March 1, 1951, in Michigan was nearly 2 1/4 times that of March 1, 1941. As a whole land prices have risen 14 per cent in the last year.

Gov. Urges Salvage of Scrap Iron, Steel

At a recent session of the Washtenaw County Board of Supervisors the following self-explanatory communication was read:

Mr. Samuel Morgan, Wash. County Bd. of Supervisors, Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Dear Mr. Morgan:

American industry has reached production levels which threaten to cut sharply into our national inventories of scrap-iron and scrap-steel. The Administration of the National Production Authority, Mr. Manly Fleischmann, has asked me to enlist the help of Michigan County Government to meet the situation.

There is no intent to conduct intensive scrap drives of the type made familiar to us during World War II; rather, the present program is designed to start dormant scrap moving into normal channels of trade.

Your attention is also called to the fact that the demand actually is for heavy scrap which represents an important percentage of the materials needed for production of steel.

As one of the great industrial states, Michigan has a special interest in the continued flow of these materials. In view of this I would appreciate it if you would call the attention of county organizations to the present need and urge them to see that heavy iron and steel scrap are promptly disposed of to dealers. Presumably county highway departments would prefer to be the chief source, but other possibilities should not be overlooked.
