Report Four Deer Taken in Waterloo

Officials Request Kills Be Reported for Record Purposes

Donley Boyer, conservation officer in this area, checked 77 deer hunters in this vicinity the first three days of the present hunting season. He pointed out this number only includes the hunters actually checked and that there were most likely a number that were not checked.

Boyer had reports of four deer being taken in the Waterloo area, three of them on the first day, Bruce Hopkins, of Old US-12, and Ralph Hartley of Grass Lake, were two of the successful hunters the first day. Boyer said the third man's name was Flynn, but he did not learn his first name.

An 18-year-old boy was Saturday's successful deer hunter in the area, downing an 8-point buck in the Leake road swamp. Size of the other deer taken here were a 5-point one for Hopkins, 10-point for Hartley and 8-point for Flynn.

First deer of the season reported to the Standard was a spike horn weighing about 200 pounds, downed by Hartley in Lake County near Luther at 7:45 a.m. on the opening day. Hart returned home immediately after getting his buck, arriving here shortly after noon, less than 24 hours after starting. He had left for Luther at 4:15 Wednesday afternoon.

Conservation Officer Boyer said he had unofficial reports of two deer being taken in the Pinckney area also. He requests that all hunters who take deer in this vicinity report their kills to him. In this way, he said, valuable records may be obtained of the estimated deer population and the approximate kill which may be expected another year.

Boyer stressed the importance of hunters making certain the deer has horns before they shoot. Three does were killed last year, one during the small game season. If a wounded or dead doe is seen, Boyer said, he should be notified as soon as possible. He pointed out that cooperation with the conservation department will result in better hunting conditions and a larger deer population for another season's sport.

CHS Debate Team Competes Against Keego Harbor

Chelsea High school debaters are entering the Michigan High School Debate contest which is sponsored jointly by the University of Michigan Bureau of School Services and the Detroit Free Press. Chelsea's debate team is composed of Barbara Speer and Jean Schweinfurth, on the affirmative side and David Bertke and Sandra Baldwin, negative. They will debate with the Keego Harbor team Dec. 3.

More than 2,000 high school students will have taken part in the debates before the final appearance at the University of Michigan April 25.

Subject of the debates is: Resolved: That All American Citizens Should Be Subject to Conscription for Essential Service in Time of War.

A debating team from the U. of M. debated the question before the Chelsea High school speech class here Nov. 13. Main points discussed were the manpower supply of the United States, conscription as being fair or unfair to workers and the Buffalo plan of conscription.

Football Squad To Be Entertained by Kiwanis Club

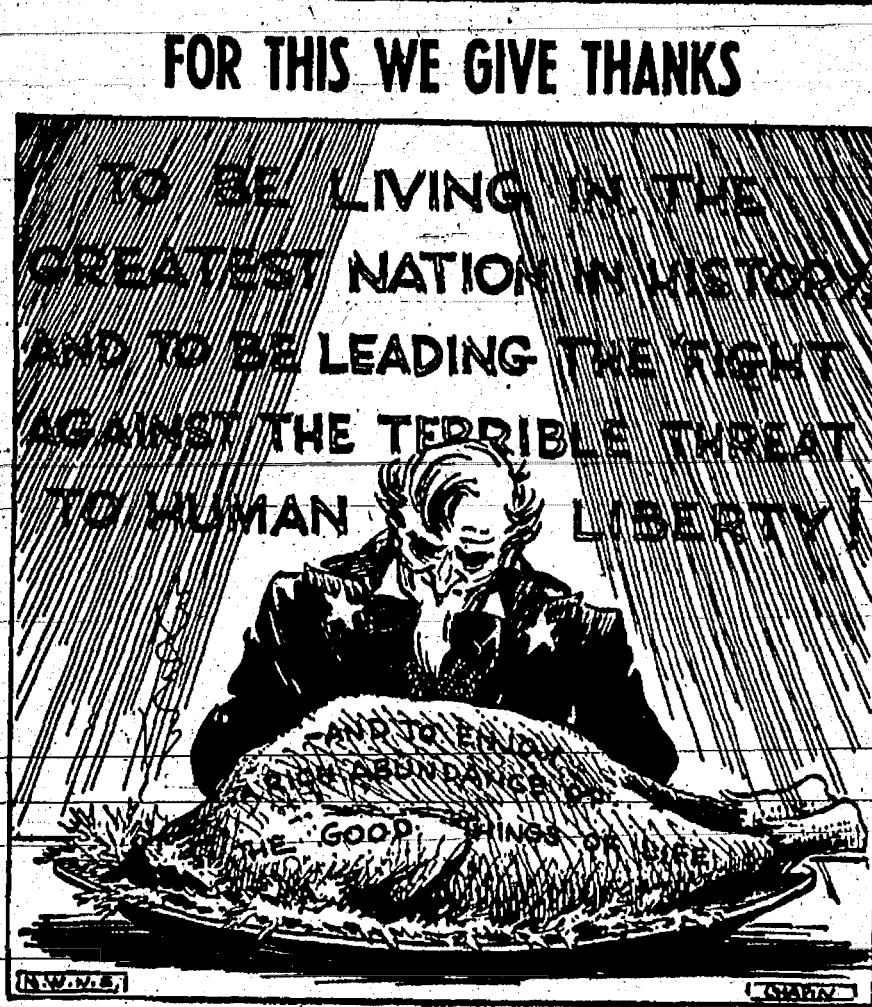

Chelsea Flower Shop Is Sold by Mrs. Visel

Mrs. Elvira Visel announced this week that she has sold her Ann Arbor store known as the Chelsea Flower Shop, to Mr. and Mrs. Sam Bell. Mrs. Bell has been an employee at the store for the past 11 years.

Mrs. Visel continues in her partnership with the F. S. Armstrongs in the Chelsea Greenhouses on Lingane road here which she founded 50 years ago last September.

When interviewed about her 50 years in the greenhouse business, Mrs. Visel had many interesting anecdotes to relate. Questioned about why and how she happened to choose the work as her career, she said her choice was the result of reading an article in a September, 1901 issue of The Saturday Evening Post while she was acting as what is now known as a "baby sitter."

She had been left at home to look after a young nephew while her parents were away and to amuse the young fellow she was showing him the pictures in the magazine when she came across the article which started her on her life work.

Wonderful things were prophesied for those who would go into the greenhouse business, and according to the story, it was a short-cut to quick riches.

Telling her mother the next day that what she wanted most of anything in the world was a greenhouse of her own, her mother fell in with her plans and immediately went out and helped measure a spot 20x40 feet in size on which to build her greenhouse in the front yard of their farm home.

Their first plan was to raise mushrooms as a side-line for a steady source of income. Mrs. Visel said this didn't work out as planned but she remembers send-

ing five-quart pails of mushrooms to the Glazier family here who were particularly fond of them.

She financed her venture with \$750 she had saved by teaching school. She recalled that she had earned a flat wage of \$50 for three months of teaching at Lyndon Center school, then \$25 per month for nine months. She taught at the Savage school for nine months after that, and later at the McLaren school. Her highest monthly wage as a teacher was \$30 per month.

Mrs. Visel said she visited greenhouses in the vicinity of Plymouth to get ideas on heating and learned that heating with stoves and flues was not practical because greenhouses heated in that manner were troubled with bugs. Steam heat was not considered practical either because if the flues got low it would take too long to get up steam again and the plants might suffer damage. Hot water heat, it was found, was the best for her purpose so she hired local help to install the hot water system.

Not being familiar with this type of heating the local installers left no overflow vents and the noise of the water pounding in the pipes was terrific before they discovered the cause, Mrs. Visel recalled. She said coal for heating the water cost \$3 per ton at that time.

In her first bench of greenhouse flowers she grew a row of sweet peas with carnations at either side.

One Alice Stimpson, who was employed in the Glazier Bank, ordered the first funeral spray Mrs. Visel made. A Mrs. Cooper, East Middle street, had died and Miss Stimpson wanted the spray made up for the funeral. Never having done any such floral work, Mrs. Visel said she told her she couldn't do it. Miss Stimpson said she'd "seen it done" and would help her, so Mrs. Visel picked the carnations and greens and drove to town in her horse-drawn buggy and the two young women proceeded to assemble the funeral spray.

Mrs. Visel said the spray turned out very nicely, too. It might be said that Mrs. Visel's business was long before the discovery that wiring each blossom simplifies making floral pieces.

Carnations at that time were 50 cents a dozen and Mrs. Visel remembers she got an order for a spray that cost \$4 which would take eight dozen carnations. Through the years which have followed the thought has haunted her that she never could remember whether she had put the eighth dozen in or not, Mrs. Visel said.

Mrs. Visel opened an Ann Arbor store 20 years ago. The shop has been in the present location at 203 East Liberty street for the past 15 years. For five years before that she had sold flowers in the general market on Washington street. From 1919 until 1931 she sold flowers on the curb market in Ann Arbor. For most of that time the market was located in the Court House square.

The F. S. Armstrongs, who have been in partnership with Mrs. Visel for the past seven years, came here to work at the greenhouse in 1932. Originally from Minneapolis, Minn., Mr. Armstrong had been in greenhouse work in Ann Arbor, Holly and Jackson before he came here.

Feb. 10, 1947, the greenhouses suffered a disastrous fire but the building was begun immediately and in the spring their customers were again being supplied.

Construction Underway at Meth. Home

Hope New Chapel May Be Dedicated on Easter Sunday

Extensive improvements and additions are now under construction at the Methodist Home and include a chapel, a retired ministers' cottage, a 15-foot addition to the kitchen and basement, two extra fire escape stair wells, and a sprinkler system in the two oldest sections of the home. The newer portions of the building are of fireproof construction but the two original buildings are of fire-resistant construction and the sprinkler system will provide additional fire protection.

An eight-inch water main is being constructed from the village system and involves going under the railroad tracks.

At the time the newest addition was built two years ago, all fire laws were complied with. However, since that time, several disastrous fires have occurred in hospitals and institutions and state fire laws have added requirements which made it necessary to add another fire stair well to the newly constructed building.

The second fire escape stair well is being put into the kitchen and basement addition.

The chapel is being built at the south end of the Home, facing east, and will be connected to the main building with a breezeway, so residents need not go out-of-doors to reach it.

Rev. M. J. Betz, superintendent of the Home, said this week that he is hopeful the chapel may be dedicated Easter Sunday. Capacity of the colonial style chapel will be 100 persons. Inside finish is to be silver white, while outer construction will be of brick to match the other buildings. A steeple will add to its attractiveness.

The cottage for retired ministers and their wives, is an experiment, Rev. Betz said, and if it proves successful, more will probably be built. The cottage under construction at present is already roofed and enclosed. It will contain two apartments of four rooms and bath each. The apartments will each have picture windows in the living rooms and will face north.

To the west of the main part of the Home, the cottage is near the present caretaker's cottage. A row of trees makes a pleasant setting for the cottage now being built and for possible future buildings of the same type.

The 15-foot addition to the kitchen will provide needed room for the work of preparing meals for the ever-increasing number of residents. The additional space in the basement will be used for a food storage room.

North-Moller company of Jackson is the builder. The company also built the new addition which was constructed two years ago.

Christmas Trees To Be Erected in Downtown Section

At Monday's Village Council meeting arrangements were made for the decoration of downtown streets for the Christmas season. Instead of the small trees in front of all business places, as has been the custom for a number of years, it is planned to have four large trees at each of the two main intersections downtown. One of the large trees will be at each corner of Main and Middle streets and the other four will be similarly placed on Main street at the Park-South street intersection.

Village President Anton Nielsen said the trees are to be put in place this week.

Thanksgiving Service Wednesday Evening

Rev. David Bryce is to be the speaker at the Union Thanksgiving service being held tonight (Wednesday) in St. Paul's church at 7:30. Pastors of the Protestant churches of the community, and Rev. M. J. Betz of the Methodist Home, will participate in the service.

No Mail Delivery

There will be neither city nor rural mail delivery out of the Chelsea Post Office on Thanksgiving Day. Postmaster Carl J. Mayer has announced that morning mail will be dispatched as usual and the lobby of the post office will remain open until 12 noon but there will be no window service.

Suggestions Made for Easy Mailing of Greeting Cards

Suggestions for the mailing of Christmas greeting cards and gifts were listed this week by local postal officials as follows:

Greeting cards mailed as first-class matter receive many advantages over the unsealed cards. Such greetings, prepaid at the first-class rate, may be sealed and may contain written messages; they are dispatched and delivered first; forwarded, if necessary, without additional charge, and if undeliverable, returned at no further expense to the mailer, provided the sender's return address is shown on the envelope.

Unsealed Christmas greetings may be sent as third-class mail without unauthorized writing enclosed and are chargeable with two cents postage (if weight does not exceed two ounces). However, a minimum charge of three cents is applicable to such greeting cards which measure less than four inches long or two and three-quarters inches wide.

Patrons having a number of greeting cards to deposit are urged to tie them in bundles with addresses all faced one way.

All mail matter must be plainly and completely addressed, preferably in ink, giving street name and number. Zone number should be included if mail is intended for delivery in larger cities.

Cooperation of the public with the postal services, officials state, will facilitate their expeditious handling and will avoid unnecessary delay and disappointment.

While parcel post rates were increased as of Oct. 1, 1951, there will be no further increase in mailing rates until Jan. 1, 1952.

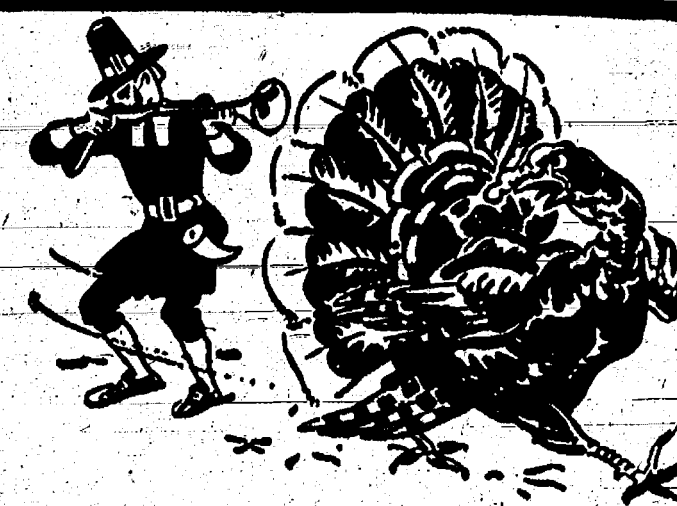
