

The multi-million dollar copper development in the upper peninsula will be a needed shot in the arm for that area's economy. With backing of the RFC the Copper Range company of Boston will sink at least \$57 millions into the area to develop a model town. The development at White Pine will have more than 600 dwelling units, railroads, a new copper smelter, mill and other equipment to produce 70 million pounds of copper per year—an additional four per cent to the nation's supply.

The White Pine development was attractive because some of the copper veins are only six and eight feet deep. Many times shafts as deep as 7,000 feet must be sunk to get out copper ore.

Writing in his weekly newspaper, the Ingham County News, J. Brown, elder statesman of Michigan Republicanism, hailed Mayor Albert E. Cobo of Detroit as a "new star in the Republican skies of Michigan." It might be his beams may some day lighten the stygian darkness that now shrouds Michigan's GOP celestial sphere.

A new law will make it against the law to buy or sell alcoholic beverages in Michigan during a 24-hour period this Christmas. Sale must stop at 9 p.m. Christmas eve and cannot be resumed until 7 a.m. the day after the holiday.

Michigan's military units are short on recruits. On the heels of an announcement that there will be no change in the draft laws so long as volunteer enlistments remain so high, the National Guard and army organized reserves reveal they have had small results when they bent the drum for recruits. The Guard, especially, has been harried by rapid turnover and loss to the regular army.

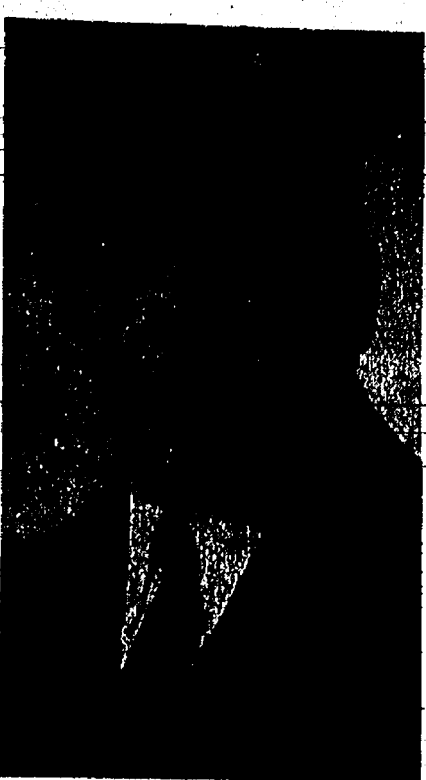

## Rev. Fontana Resigns Post Last Sunday

St. John's Pastor To Conclude Nearly 59 Years in Ministry



REV. JOHN FONTANA

At a meeting held at the close of the services last Sunday in St. John's Evangelical and Reformed church, Rogers Corners, Rev. John Fontana tendered his resignation as pastor. He will be 80 years old Jan. 20, 1952, and has served the Rogers Corners church since December, 1937. He will continue to serve the church until a new pastor is secured. His resignation marked his 14th anniversary as pastor here.

Ordained in 1893 as a pastor in the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Ohio, he has been a minister for almost 59 years.

He came to America from his native Germany in September, 1893, and was called to the Lutheran Seminary of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Ohio located at Afton, Minn. Because he would not have been of age to be ordained if he had graduated in 1892, he taught in a parochial school at Rapidan, Minn., for a year before taking his senior year's work at the seminary.

He graduated in 1893 and his first charge was at Stedoke, in Mercer county, Ohio. He served there from 1893 until 1895. In 1895 and 1896 he assisted in congregations at Brown and New Auburn, Minn., and in 1897 he joined the Evangelical Synod of North America at St. Paul, Minn., while serving as pastor of the church at Webster, South Dakota.

From 1898 to 1906 he served two Minnesota churches in Benton township. Rev. Fontana's next charge was Ebenezer church in Albany, Minn., where he remained from 1906 to 1909, and then he went to Friedens church in New Salem, N. Dak., serving there for 16 years.

During the past year Rev. Fontana was the principal speaker at the dedication of a new church building by the New Salem congregation.

For five years, 1925-1930, he was pastor of St. Luke's church at Lake Elmo, Minn., and for seven years immediately prior to coming to Rogers Corners, he was at St. Paul's church in Wells, Minn.

## Mrs. Delbert Howe Dies Friday Eve at Daughter's Home

Mrs. Delbert Howe, formerly of Homer, who had spent much time in recent years at the home of her daughter, Mrs. A. W. Wilkinson, on old US-12, died Friday evening at the home of another daughter, Mrs. Frank Benham, in Albion township.

Funeral services were held at 3:30 p.m. Monday at the Marsh Funeral Home, in Albion, and burial was in Riverside cemetery there. Rev. Charles Tucker of the Homer Methodist church officiated at the services.

Mrs. Howe was a member of the Homer Methodist church and its W.S.C.S. She was also a member of the Maybelle Literary Society.

Born in Albion township March 7, 1862, she was the former Harriet Finch, a daughter of James and Jane Finch. She attended Albion high school and Albion college preparatory school before her marriage, in 1884, to Delbert Howe. They lived in the vicinity of Albion most of their married life. For a number of years they lived two miles north of Homer and also at Six Lakes. Mr. Howe died in 1922.

Mrs. Howe was the last of a family of eight children, her twin sister, Mrs. Mary Bryant, having died in 1945. Four of her seven children survive, as well as 16 grandchildren, 19 great-grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Three daughters preceded her in death. Her surviving sons and daughters are James Howe of Detroit, Robert Howe, of Albion township, Mrs. Benham, at whose home she died, and Mrs. Wilkinson, of Chelsea.

## State Officer Visits FOE Auxiliary

Mrs. Edna Badger of Ann Arbor, state president of the FOE Auxiliary, made her official visit to the local auxiliary last week Tuesday evening. In a talk she gave during the meeting she mentioned various projects of the organization, emphasizing especially the work done by FOE Auxiliaries of the state at the Coldwater Training school.

## U. S. Cause of Distrust in East, Speaker States

Through our own lack of comprehension of Middle East psychology, the American nation has almost deliberately acted so as to incur the distrust, if not enmity, of the people involved. Such is the belief of Prof. F. N. Kfume of the University of Michigan political science department, who spent most of 1951 until mid-September in the area. He addressed a joint meeting of Friends of the Library and Library lecture patrons Monday evening.

Prof. Kfume stated that relations will not improve until the U. S. trains more people about the Middle East so the State department will have larger reserves of trained personnel from which to make appointments. The U. of M. is one of four universities offering such training.

The thinking of the Middle East is deeply rooted in the conditions of the people involved. Such is the belief of Prof. F. N. Kfume of the University of Michigan political science department, who spent most of 1951 until mid-September in the area. He addressed a joint meeting of Friends of the Library and Library lecture patrons Monday evening.

Improvements come slowly in the East, Baghdad, with a population of half a million, is a city of great traffic confusion because it has only one main street and two bridges across the Tigris, although plans for more bridges and parallel highways have existed for ten years. One reason might be that the study and the planning cost so much that there is no money to build the project.

Another might be the general inability of the people.

Infection and intestinal diseases are common. More than 40 per cent of the people go bare-footed, and constantly re-infect themselves. About 30 per cent are blind in at least one eye. Medical and sanitary facilities are lacking. In the Tigris, women wash bodies, mouths, vegetables, pots and pans in the same water and drink excreta. Young people are taught better, but have no facilities to practice better sanitation.

Throughout the Middle East, there are two societies, one for men, and one for women, and the two do not mingle except within the home. The university sections, which practice co-education, and western mingling of the sexes, produce a society whose members do not fit anywhere in the post-school years.

Middle Easterners admire America because of its idealistic foreign policy. (Continued on page seven)

Five Southwestern Townships Begin Solicitation Monday

Monday evening at 8 o'clock, CROP workers for this year's solicitation of gifts of cash and farm products for overseas relief in five townships of the southwest portion of the county will meet at Bethel church in Freedom township to start the week's campaign project.

Rev. T. W. Menzel, pastor of the church, will be in charge of the meeting. He and Lowell Parr, of near Manchester, are co-chairmen of the CROP campaign for the section comprising Lodi, Freedom, Bridgewater, Manchester and Sharon townships.

A county-wide meeting will be held the same night in Ann Arbor, it was announced, but plans in the section in charge of Parr and Rev. Menzel have advanced beyond the points to be brought out at that meeting and final details of the local campaign will be taken care of in the separate meeting scheduled at the church. A film, "Statesmen in Overalls," will be shown at the meeting. This depicts the manner in which the food is distributed and shows the value of the program in promoting world brotherhood, Rev. Menzel stated.

The Christian Rural Overseas Program (CROP) in Washtenaw county procured two carloads of wheat in last year's solicitation. No special quota is set for this year, Rev. Menzel said. Those who have no wheat to contribute may give cash or farm products other than wheat which may be sold and the money used to purchase wheat.

The solicitation will take place in the five southwestern Washtenaw townships the week of Dec. 10. The townships are divided into sections according to school districts, each one having local solicitors who will contact every resident.

sign, policy, its democratic standards, and its help to the people; but they dislike the United States because of its support of partition in Palestine, which they regard as a hypocritical support of Zionist aggression while U. S. resists aggression in Korea.

No-Easterner regards himself as a part of his government; he does not accept personal or public responsibility along that line. Except in Lebanon, Israel, and Turkey, no country has a homogeneous population, so people generally feel little loyalty to the state, but give loyalty first to the family, second to tribal chief, and only last to the state.

Generally, the Middle East realizes its military weakness, but its historical record and natural resources of such importance that they deserve the democratic treatment that some western nations preach but do not practice.

embarrassing both management and union officials. This pressure, result of some work shortages because of material lacks, is reflected in such demands as a 30-hour week spread available work—with, of course, 40 hours pay.

The little Hoover commission endeared itself recently to the hearts of every governor of Michigan, past and present. It recommended more power for the governor. The commission suggested a four instead of two year gubernatorial term with power to supervise all state officials, whether elected or appointed. It is recommended that a single administrative board head most state agencies, to be appointed by the governor with senate confirmation.

Loren B. Miller, commission director, termed the executive branch a "Chinese puzzle" and says the use of state commissions, able to act independently of the governor has led to "secret and hidden government" operating for special interests instead of the public good.
