# **School Board Given Report** on Enrollment

Net Increase of 40 **Pupils Noted over** Last Year's Average

At the regular Board of Educa-tion meeting held in the High school Monday evening, Superin-tendent Albert C. Johnsen gave a report of school membership. The report showed that there was an increase of 40 pupils compared with the average of a year ago. The in-crease comprises 24 pupils in the elementary classes and 16 in elementary classes and 16 in grades seven through twelve.

A report was also given at the meeting, on an evaluation of the ecent parent-teacher conferences held in place of sending out written report cards to parents.
