Chelsea upset Saline to the tune of 49-46 before a capacity crowd last Friday night.

The local squad took an early lead, lost it, and could not regain it until the second half.

The first quarter left Saline in the lead, 15-14. Jim Cook of Saline and Gop White of Chelsea, both clamped in seven points.

Second quarter found Saline widening their margin to 31-26. Hornet Don Feldkamp scored six points, while the Bulldogs' Dick Merkel and Bob White accounted for four each.

During the third quarter the tide turned in favor of Chelsea as Bob White's long shots started con-

Chelsea was still clinging to a precarious lead in the fourth quarter as Dick Merkel tipped in five while Feldkamp made but three.

On foul shots Chelsea took 20 and made 11 for a percentage of 55. Saline made good 6 of 15 tries for a percentage of 40.

Bob White led the Bulldog attack with 20 points, while Dick Merkel dumped in 11 and Joe Greenwood worked in 10.

Much credit should also be given to backboard rebounding. This effort shows in the final score, but never in the statistics.

The victory is a great personal triumph for coach and members of the team that was rated as definitely "underdog" during the early part of the season.

U. of M. Professor Speaks Tonight at St. Paul's Banquet

Dow V. Baxter, professor of forest pathology and of botany in the School of Natural Resources at the University of Michigan, is speaking tonight at the biennial father and son banquet at St. Paul's church.

Professor Baxter is an authority on plant diseases, particularly those of forests in the northern regions.

The lecture he gives tonight will be illustrated with color pictures showing scenes in Alaska, one of the many places which he has visited while directing field expedi-

Since 1930, Professor Baxter has directed more than a dozen University field expeditions to investigate forest diseases in Alaska, Canada, Puerto Rico, Newfoundland, Labrador, as well as in various parts of the United States.

He has brought to the University for teaching purposes, one of the largest collections of forest fungi in existence.

Approximately 100 fathers and sons are expected to be present at the banquet.

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Plan Revealed for Marriage Counseling

Washtenaw System Is First of Its Kind in Entire State

Representatives of the county social agencies, teachers' organizations, bar association, medical society, fraternal clubs, ministerial associations, the Board of Supervisors, law enforcement groups, city, village and school officials and others, were present Saturday night at dinner meeting in the Michigan Union, Ann Arbor.

The meeting was sponsored jointly by Circuit Judge James R. Breakey, Jr., and the James Foster Foundation, its main purpose being to acquaint representative persons in the county with the marriage counseling service made possible by a \$12,000 grant from the Foundation.

Mrs. Katherine Greene, who has been appointed marriage counselor for the county under the new plan, was introduced at the meeting.

Judge Breakey, who presided, explained that the county's marriage counseling service is the first of its kind in the state and one of the very few in the nation.

He also explained that the counseling continues to assist, in the event a divorce is deemed necessary, by advising those involved on adjustment to changed home conditions.

Pre-marital counseling, in the event of re-marriage of divorced persons, Judge Breakey said, is also a part of the service. In this way, he pointed out, the pitfalls encountered in a marriage that failed can often be avoided in the new marriage.

Judge Paul W. Alexander, of Toledo, Ohio, who is widely known as an authority on divorce, was the principal speaker at the dinner meeting. He gave a general outline of the possibilities of a marriage counseling service such as the one now functioning in Washtenaw county.

A panel discussion on the subject of marriage counseling and its relation to the work of other organizations in the county was held during the afternoon, preceding the dinner meeting, and was attended by approximately 35 representatives of county groups.

Among those from Chelsea who attended the dinner meeting at the invitation of Judge Breakey were Sylvan Township Supervisor Elsie Gage, Village President Anton Nielsen, School Superintendent Albert C. Johnson, and Mrs. Norbert Merkel.




