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
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Contract To Build Close Temperature Controlled Rooms

A local firm headed by L. E. Riemschneider has been awarded a contract for the construction of the first of a series of ultra-close controlled temperature precision instrument rooms for the Dearborn Gage company.

The precision instrument room was developed by Mr. Riemschneider upon the request of the Dearborn Gage company because of the rapidly developing need of the precision tool and instrument manufacturers for a satisfactory enclosure in which final operations

inspections may be made. This is necessary because of the extremely close tolerances which are now required in the manufacture of an increasingly large number of items, especially those of a military nature.

Immunization Clinic To Be Held April 22

Medical Society Sponsors Eighth Annual Free Clinics

County-wide immunization clinics to protect children of Washtenaw county against diphtheria, tetanus and smallpox were announced this week by Dr. Bradley Harris, president of the Washtenaw county Medical Society, sponsor of the clinics.

This will be the eighth year that the Medical Society has sponsored these clinics in cooperation with the county Health Department and the schools, said Dr. Harris.

The clinic will be held in the Chelsea Public School gymnasium the morning of Tuesday, April 22. April 7 there will be a clinic at Dexter, and April 9, at Manchester.

Last Tuesday, grade school pupils at the Chelsea Public School were shown a cartoon movie pertaining to the clinics, to acquaint them with the purpose of the immunization program and its benefits.

Last year more than 8,000 children were served in these clinics. Six thousand of them were vaccinated against smallpox and more than 7,000 received protection against diphtheria and lockjaw.

"If the clinics are as successful this year and in succeeding years as they have been in the past," said Dr. Harris, "danger of an epidemic of either smallpox or diphtheria will continue to be greatly reduced. Tetanus booster shots were added, the doctor reported, as a part of the civil defense program."

In the clinics, children who have not been vaccinated in the last five years will be offered vaccination for smallpox. Those who have not been immunized in the last three years for diphtheria and tetanus will receive booster doses for protection against these diseases.

Participating physicians are contributing their time free of charge in the clinics. "Washtenaw county physicians would much rather donate their services in protecting all of the children than to have to treat any of them for either diphtheria, smallpox or tetanus," Dr. Harris said.

The services of the Health Department and the schools are supported. No charge is made at the clinics for the immunizations or vaccinations made.

Ann Arbor schools clinics will be held in May, a detailed schedule to be announced later.

James C. Hendley Will Address Local Commerce Group

James C. Hendley, chairman of the Washtenaw county Road Commission, will discuss the new highway legislation passed by the legislature, increasing weight and gas taxes, and providing for a new formula for distribution of those taxes.

He will also explain the effect of petitions for referendum on this legislation.

Proposed construction planned by the Road Commission, including several local road projects, will also be covered. His talk will touch upon various Road Commission problems of interest to Chelsea residents.

Mr. Hendley was recently elected a director of the County Road Association of Michigan.

Railroad Strike Called Sunday but Settled Before Paralysis Hits

The surprise railroad strike, which began Sunday and ended late Tuesday afternoon, caused widespread inconvenience in the entire central section of the country served by the New York Central Railroad system. Buses were pressed into service to carry the mail and bus lines and airlines added extra sections to take care of most of the traffic.

In Detroit the walkout involved 800 men, while approximately 2,000 were affected in the entire state.

Cause of the strike was a three-year-old dispute over wages and working rules. Three of the railroad brotherhoods were responsible for the strike call, the Brotherhood of Railway Conductors, Locomotive Engineers and Firemen.

The strike was called off when the brotherhoods bowed to a court order to have the strikers return to work.

Service was expected to be back to normal by Wednesday night.

28 Per Cent of Grade Pupils Are Ill Monday

Monday morning of this week 28 per cent of elementary pupils were absent because of illness.







4 Years Ago ...

The LOON and Rebekah lodges here observed their 30th and 31st anniversaries at a joint banquet in the Congregational church dining room Thursday evening. Dr. Charles F. Klumpp, grand secretary of the grand lodge, was the speaker. In one of the heaviest votes cast in a village election in recent years, M. W. McClure was elected village assessor. A total of 617 votes were cast, all candidates on the People's party ticket receiving two-to-one majorities.

Chelsea voters are to go to the polls Tuesday, May 11, to determine whether the village form of government here should be changed to a city form of government.

Thursday, March 3, 1938—

Emil Regner, who recently returned from visiting his parents in Poland, spoke at the Kiwanis club meeting Monday. He said the people are expecting war and are anxious to get out of it. About 70 members of the Band and Orchestra Parents' Association attended the meeting and pot-luck supper last Wednesday. Walter Harper was elected president for the coming year. Other officers are: J. V. Burg, vice-president; Mrs. Adolph Duerr, secretary; Mrs. Ernest Weiss, treasurer.

14 Years Ago ...

McLaughlin, stating they had been in the flood area in Los Angeles, Calif., and are now in Coolidge, Ariz. 



## Washington

THE WEEK

**IN A RULING** which may have far-reaching repercussions, Speaker Carl Albert of the house of representatives has barred television and radio broadcasts of the proceedings of house committee hearings. Since the speaker's word is final in interpreting house rules, unless overruled by a majority vote of the house itself, it is likely that his decision will stand for this session of the congress.

Republicans in the house led by minority leader Joseph W. Martin, Jr., and Congressman Paul W. Shaffer of Michigan, immediately charged the speaker with "administration censorship."

The speaker told newsmen his ruling applied not only to "live" radio and TV coverage of hearings, but to tape recordings, TV filming and newsreel coverage as well, but not to "still" news photographs.

While the speaker's ruling does not affect the senate, last week Senator Herman Welker, Republican, Idaho, a freshman senator and a member of the senate crime committee which has been investigating crime in the District of Columbia, fired a broadcast at his colleagues for making a "speaking" of the proceedings of the senate committee, and violating the civil rights and the rights of privacy of witnesses before these committees.

After charging that the senate probe committees had no rules of decorum and were governed by no rules of law—that they admitted hearsay evidence and conclusion of witnesses in violation of all the rules of jurisprudence, that the witnesses were subject to the whims of the senators on the committees invading the constitutional rights of citizens, Senator Welker said: "I say there has been too much mugging on the part of many senators who have enjoyed this limelight of being on the television and before the radio audience, and I say it is about time to get back to fundamental justice, and decency, and get some courtroom judicial demeanor into this matter."

Both house and senate armed services committees have now approved a similar universal military training bill. The house committee

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
