

Teachers To Attend Wash. Institute Fri.

Chelsea High School Chorus Will Sing at Opening Session

The Chelsea High School Chorus will sing at the opening of the morning session of the annual county teachers' institute being held in the Raskham building in Ann Arbor tomorrow.

Others from Chelsea who have a part in the day's program are Superintendent of Schools Albert C. Johnson, who is to preside at part of the morning session, and Miss Mabel Fox, Chelsea High school teacher, who is to give a report during the Michigan Education Association meeting in the afternoon.

Julius W. Haab, Washtenaw county superintendent of schools, will preside when the meeting opens at 9:30 a.m. Rev. Walter S. Press, pastor of Bethlehem Evangelical and Reformed church, Ann Arbor, is to give the invocation and Willard C. Olson, dean of the U. of M. School of Education, will welcome the 375 teachers who are to attend the institute.

Supt. Johnson will introduce the morning speakers, Lawrence E. Vredevoe, director of the Bureau of School Services and associate professor of Secondary Education at the University of Michigan, and Hon. James R. Brankley, Jr., Washenaw county circuit judge. Prof. Vredevoe's topic will be "The Middle Century Teacher" and Judge Brankley's "What Constitutes Security?"

Miss Beatrice McManus, president of the Washtenaw county district of the Michigan Education Association and a teacher in the Willow Village schools, will be in charge of the afternoon session. Miss Fox is to give a report on MEA reorganization in the state.

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The final speaker at the MEA meeting will be Thomas Northey, of Lansing, field representative of the MEA in this area, who will talk about MEA services.

The convocation of students in the University School of Education will be held at 3:10 in the Raskham lecture hall. Marvin L. Niehaus, vice-president of the University, will preside, and the scheduled speaker is Virgil M. Rogers, superintendent of schools in Battle Creek and president of the American Association of School Administrators. "The Role of the Teacher in School-Community Understanding," is the subject of the address he is to give.

Crippled Children To Benefit from Easter Seal Sales

The annual Easter Seal drive for the benefit of crippled children and adults will get underway in Chelsea and vicinity with the mailing of the sheets of seals the first of the week.

The drive in Chelsea is sponsored by the local Kiwanis club. Paul F. Niehaus is president of the Washtenaw county chapter of the Michigan Society for Crippled Children and Adults, Inc.

Each letter sent out will contain 100 of the seals and an addressed return envelope in which the free-will contributions may be enclosed for mailing. Any contribution, large or small, will be welcomed. Niehaus stated. He pointed out that 91.7 cents of every dollar contributed will remain in Michigan to benefit Michigan crippled children and adults.

"Because crippled children's societies throughout the nation are united in a great federation known as the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults, it is possible to attack problems on a national basis; to institute coordinated nation-wide programs of care, treatment and research; to enlist the highest level professional cooperation," Niehaus said.

Direct and effective help to 228,000 crippled children and adults was made possible last year throughout the country by the proceeds from Easter seals, according to Niehaus.


Alfred Knickerbocker Becomes Eagle Scout

Victor F. Moeckel Dies Suddenly After Operation

Victor F. Moeckel, life-long resident of Waterloo, died unexpectedly Friday morning at Mercy hospital, Jackson. He had undergone an operation at the hospital on March 5, and had improved steadily, and was expected to return to his home Saturday or Sunday. Death was attributed to an embolism.

Mr. Moeckel was born in Waterloo, July 16, 1884, a son of John and Marie Joos Moeckel. He was confirmed at the St. Jacobs Lutheran church near Waterloo, in 1897.

He was a member of IOOF Lodge No. 40 of Stockbridge, the Waterloo Gleamers and the Waterloo band. He was among the first members of the band at the time the late Aaron Snyder was the leader, and had continued to be active in the organization the remainder of his life.

He formerly owned the Waterloo Mill. Since selling the mill a number of years ago, he had worked as a carpenter.

He was married Sept. 28, 1910, to the former Ione Lehman at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lehman, 14900 Cavanaugh Lake road.

Survivors of Mr. Moeckel are his widow; a daughter, Mrs. Wilber Beaman, who is the former Leona Moeckel; a grandson, Gordon John Beaman; a sister, Mrs. Laura C. Reimiller, who resides in her home with Mr. and Mrs. Moeckel; and a brother, Reuben Moeckel, of Stockbridge.

Prayer services were held at 1:30 Monday afternoon at the Miller Funeral Home in Stockbridge, and the funeral service was held in the Second Evangelical United Brethren church in Waterloo at 2:30. Rev. Leonard R. Smith, pastor of the Waterloo church, and Rev. P. H. Grabowski, pastor of St. Paul's Evangelical and Reformed church, of Chelsea, officiated at the services.

Burial followed in Mt. Hope cemetery, Waterloo.

Red Cross Total Hits \$650 with One Week Left

Mrs. John Fischer, Red Cross drive chairman, reported early this week that the present drive has so far netted \$650 of the \$1,600 quota set for the community this year.

Only two block workers however, had completed their calls and turned in their reports to be included in this figure. The block workers are the volunteers who are responsible for contacting every home here during the solicitation for funds.

With the campaign in its third week, the sum collected represents only about 40 per cent of the goal to be reached and persons planning to contribute are asked to do so as soon as possible.

This is Mrs. Fischer's third year as chairman of the annual drive for Red Cross funds here. She said she felt sure the remainder of the quota would be raised.

Mrs. Leigh Palmer, chairman of the Chelsea branch of the Washtenaw county chapter of the American Red Cross the past six years, shares Mrs. Fischer's hope that the drive may again go "over the top" as it has in past years.

Mrs. Palmer's duties as Chelsea chairman include recommending chairmen for all Red Cross activities in the local community, and in this capacity she secured Mrs. Fischer to take over the fund campaigns the past three years.

Other services of the Red Cross for which Mrs. Palmer is called upon to recommend volunteer chairmen, in addition to fund raising, are Junior Red Cross; public information; blood program; nursing services program; safety services such as first aid, water safety and accident prevention; the Congress-chartered disaster service, and the home service for men in the armed forces and veterans in which the Red Cross is the only connecting link between the man and his family in case of emergency. These services groups, which include canteen, arts and skills, gray lady, motor, nurses aid, production and supply, social welfare aid and volunteer staff aid services.



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
