**Top Honor Climaxes Enviably Record in Youthful Group**

Kenneth Proctor, Jr., received the State Farmer degree at the 24th annual convention of the Michigan Association of Future Farmers of America. This is the highest degree granted by the Michigan association and was received by 196 boys in the entire state. No state may elect more than two per cent of the total state membership. They were

chosen from the 9,856 FFA boys in Michigan.


The following are the minimum qualifications Ken had to meet to be elected to the State Farmer degree:

- (1) Must have held the degree of Chapter Farmer preceding election to the degree of State Farmer, have been an active member of the FFA for at least two years, and have a record of satisfactory participation in the activities of the local chapter.
- (2) Must have satisfactorily completed at least two years of instruction in vocational agriculture, have in operation an outstanding program of supervised farming, and be regularly enrolled in a vocational agriculture class (or have completed all the vocational agriculture offered in the school attended).
- (3) Demonstrate proficiency in parliamentary procedure.
- (4) Must have earned by his own efforts from farming or other agricultural work and deposited in the bank or otherwise productively invested at least \$250 (at least two-thirds of the amount must be derived from his supervised farming program).
- (5) Show outstanding ability as evidenced by his leadership and cooperation in student, chapter, and community activities, and have a satisfactory scholarship record as certified by the local school superintendent or principal.
- (6) Kenneth is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Proctor, Sr., of Hoppe road.

## Emergency Vehicle Must Be Given Right-of-Way

All vehicular traffic should pull to the side of the road and stop immediately when the siren of fire equipment, police car, ambulance or other emergency vehicles, is sounded. Cars should remain stationary until all the emergency equipment has passed.

Over the week-end, with the fire department making a number of runs, infractions of the state law regarding motor traffic allowing fire equipment the right-of-way have become more noticeable.

Monday afternoon when the run was being made to a car fire on US-12, the police car following the fire truck with its siren screaming full blast, was held up by a car which turned onto Main street directly in front of it and kept on going instead of pulling to the side of the street and coming to a complete stop as required by law.

Similarly, the pumper, rounding the corner a minute later, barely missed a vehicle making a left turn in front of it at Main and Middle streets. The pumper's siren was sounding at the time also.

## New Church Consecrated in Ann Arbor

**West Side Methodist History Closely Tied to Local Churches**

The consecration services at the new West Side Methodist church on South Seventh street in Ann Arbor, last Sunday, was of special interest to people in the Chelsea area because of the early connection of that church with churches in this vicinity.

Officially organized as a congregation May 8, 1847, by Rev. Peter Schumucker, district superintendent of the German speaking Methodists of the Ohio conference, the Ann Arbor church was the forerunner of German Methodist churches in Ypsilanti, Chelsea, Waterloo, and Franciscio. The latter, now known as Salem Grove Methodist church, and the Ann Arbor West Side church are the only two churches remaining as separate congregations, the others having merged with churches in their respective communities.

The first preacher to serve the German Methodist churches organized in 1847 and the years immediately following, was Rev. Johann H. Sedelmeyer. The churches continued as mission charges of the Ohio conference until the formation of the Central German Conference of the Methodist-Episcopal Church in 1864.

The German conference merged with the English speaking conference in 1935 and the West Side church and Salem Grove church are now members of the Detroit Conference of the Methodist Church.

Rev. Edwin J. Weiss is pastor of the Ann Arbor church.

A banquet was held at the church last night and the week-long celebration of the opening of the new \$138,000 church will be concluded next Sunday when the 105th anniversary of its founding will be observed.

Rev. Frank L. Fitch, D.D., district superintendent, will preside at the 11 a.m. service. From 2 until 5 o'clock there will be an open house reception, and in the evening, at 7:30, Dr. Dwight Large and the church choir of the First Methodist church in Ann Arbor will be in charge of the service.

William D. Schmidt, an active member of the West Side Methodist church for 50 years, now makes his home with his daughter, Mrs. Norman Nash, on Trinkle road, near here.



## Cerebral Palsy Clinic Sponsored by Easter Seal Agency

A cerebral palsy clinic is to be held at the Rackham School in Ypsilanti, June 27. It has been announced by the Washtenaw county Society for Crippled Children and Adults, the local Easter Seal agency, which is a co-sponsor of the clinic.

Dr. Meyer Perlestein, consultant for the National Society for Crippled Children, will conduct the clinic, which is the fourth one conducted under the sponsorship of the Easter Seal agency.

A special institute and nursery school for cerebral-palsied children and their mothers is to be sponsored by the Michigan Society for Crippled Children, while the National Society will assist Michigan State Normal College, Ypsilanti, in sponsoring a special course for teachers of cerebral-palsied children. The special course was inaugurated four years ago and has attracted teachers from all states of the nation. It is the plan of a new summer session at the college to train personnel to conduct state and community programs in paralytic children in relation to handicapped children.

In the special institute and nursery school program sponsored by the state society, the parents and palsied children will live on the Ypsilanti campus two weeks. During that time the children will be in charge of trained teachers while their mothers will receive instruction in understanding cerebral palsy.
