

Winter Hits Local Area Once More

Some Roads Closed Sunday Because of Drifting Snow

Four to five inches of snow fell here over the past week-end and strong winds blew the snow into drifts so deep that several roads were closed.

The road crews from the Chelsea yards worked Sunday afternoon to keep the west end of North Territorial road open.

Monday morning road crews tried to clear Heim road with the truck plow but the road was too soft, so they went out with the power grader Tuesday morning.

Sunday's snowfall was the heaviest since the big snow of Christmas day and caused road workers here more trouble than they had experienced for some time.

The big noise in Michigan is all-taxes and the possibility of a constitutional convention, those who are getting up a playmate who are getting tired around so much these days.


