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Sprouting and storage losses of root crops controlled with maleic hydrazide

A new growth regulator, maleic hydrazide, has reduced or prevented sprouting of stored onions, potatoes, sugar beets and vegetable root crops in experiments conducted by Michigan State College Agricultural Experiment Station.

Sprayed on plant leaves at specified times before harvesting, maleic hydrazide has lengthened the storage life of onions, even perishable hybrids. Treated potatoes have been kept up to 12 months without sprouting. Storage losses of carrots, beets and other vegetable root crops have been greatly reduced. 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County Federation of Women's Clubs Holds 36th Annual Convention in Dexter

Washtenaw County Federation of Women's Clubs held its 36th annual convention Monday at the Methodist church in Dexter.

Mrs. Meredith Bixby of Saline, was re-elected president of the Federation and other newly-elected officers are Mrs. John W. Cate of Ann Arbor, recording secretary, and Mrs. A. A. Weinert of Manchester, treasurer.

Tribute was paid to the late Mrs. Albert Sutton of Manchester, who was treasurer at the time of her recent death. Mrs. Naomi Aird of Ypsilanti, chairman of Religious Education, read the memorial.

Other officers of the Federation are Mrs. Munnia Kenny of Dexter, first vice-president; Mrs. James R. Breakley, Jr. of Ypsilanti, second vice-president.

Mrs. Earl Savery, president of Dexter Child Study club, led the convention in the salute to the flag after the morning session was opened by Mrs. Bixby.

Mrs. Kenny, president of the Dexter Woman's Club, gave the address of welcome and the response was given by Mrs. Luther Lawyer, president-elect of the Milan Woman's Club.

Annual reports of officers and reports from the club presidents were given at the morning session. Founding dates and the number of members in the various clubs were read, revealing that the Ypsilanti Ladies' Literary Club is the oldest in the Federation and was founded in 1878.
