Police Campaign Seeks To Eliminate Excessive Speeds

Sergeant G. H. Austin, commander of the Jackson post of the Michigan State Police, is appealing to motorists to practice strict, self-enforced speed control to reduce the alarming high number of highway accidents.

"Excessive speed is public enemy number one on the highways," Sgt. Austin said. "It is a factor in two out of every five fatal traffic accidents."

"During the summer months when travel is at a peak, speeding is especially hazardous and deadly. Week-ends are the worst."

"Last year 470 persons were killed in Michigan traffic during June, July and August. An average of 21 fatalities occurred every week-end."

"Motor vehicle travel this summer is expected to exceed an average of 80 million miles per day. Unless greater caution is taken, particularly in maintaining safe driving speeds, the accident toll will again be shamefully high."

"There is no good reason why accidents cannot be kept at a minimum. It simply requires some effort on the part of the drivers. By practicing courtesy, caution and common sense, lives can be saved and injuries and accidents prevented."

"If you take a motor trip, get off to an early start. Take your time and stay with the normal flow of traffic. Adjust your driving speed to conditions. Be careful and be here, next year."

Transfer of Registration; Application, Time

SEC. 19. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereon and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the (30) days next preceding any election or primary election. (Unless such 30th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day), provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 20. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote. When the resident house numbers of any section of a Township, City or Village have been changed, such a change shall not affect the right of such voter to cast his vote. Corresponding change in the registration records may be made by the Clerk or upon election day upon proper showing.

Colored lights speed culling of cherries

Colored lights help sorters of fruits and vegetables to detect small but important defects before processing. In a new technique developed in the agricultural engineering department of Michigan State College, plain white, blue and red fluorescent lights were tested. Under blue fluorescent light, sorters spotted defects 10 to 30% more efficiently than under white fluorescent. Under red fluorescent, sorter efficiency increased an average of 84% over white. 

Production Test
Brattleboro, Vt.—With an average of 398 pounds of butterfat and 11,846 pounds of milk, the five-cow herd of registered Holstein-Friesians owned by Lowell Spike, Michigan, completed their test year recently.

Their production averages approximately 20 quarts of milk daily for each cow in the herd for the year. Testing was carried on under the official Herd Improvement Registry program of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

Milking was done twice daily and testing was supervised by Michigan State College in cooperation with the national Holstein headquarters.







The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

Elector Unable To Make Personal Application, Procedure

SEC. 16. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote

SEC. 1. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 108, P. A. 1951.)

Transfer of Registration; Application, Time

SEC. 19. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the (30) days next preceding any election or primary election, (unless such 30th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day), provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 20. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote. When the residence house numbers of any section of a Township, City or Village have been changed, such a change shall not affect the right of such voter to cast his vote. Corresponding change in the registration records may be made by the Clerk or upon election day upon proper showing.
