

Independents Win Third League Tilt

Winning Run Scored in Ninth Inning on 'Squeeze' Play

Last Sunday at Webberville, the Chelsea Independents won their third league game of the season, 8-7. It was a see-saw battle all the way through the game until the ninth inning when Chelsea scored one run which was enough to break a seven-seven tie and win the game.

The Independents scored first in the second inning. Jerry Lehman led off by walking, Dick Merkel followed by hitting to the shortstop who let the ball go through his legs for a two-base error. Then with Lehman on first and Merkel on second, Bob White hit a bouncer in front of the plate, scoring Lehman and sending Merkel to third. Tobin struck out but Ralph Erskin lined a single to left field which scored Merkel from third.

Webberville tied the score up in their half of the second inning, on two hits and one Chelsea error, but the Independents took the lead again in the fifth inning. Ralph Erskin led off and was out on an error, Stanley Knickerbocker then grounded out to the second baseman, with Erskin taking second, George Heydlauff popped to the catcher but Oscar Hansen singled to center to chase home Erskin.

In their half of the fifth, Webberville took the lead by scoring two runs, making the score 2-1, but in the seventh inning Chelsea again took the lead when Tobin was safe at first on an error and Erskin singled to left. They were both scored when Hansen lined a double to left center field.

Two more runs were produced by the Independents in the eighth when Arden Musbach led off with a double to left and Jerry Lehman singled to center, sending Musbach to third. Lehman then stole second and when the catcher threw down to second Musbach scampers home with Lehman taking third on the return throw to home. He scored minutes later on a passed ball.

In the last half of the eighth Webberville again tied the game up with a three-run outburst, but in the first of the ninth Chelsea scored the winning run. With Ralph Erskin on third base and only one out George Heydlauff executed a perfect squeeze play by bunting down the first-base line.

Hitting honors for the day were shared by Oscar Hansen and Ralph Erskin. Hansen had three hits, one a double, and he also batted in three runs. Erskin, playing his first full game, collected two hits, batted in a run, and scored three runs himself.

Next Sunday the Independents will play Howell at their field. The game will start at 2:30 p.m.

Run-Off Election Hold for Two Posts in Amalgamated

Amalgamated Local 437, UAW, held run-off elections Friday at the Union Hall to determine winners of the offices of guide and trustee for three years.

The run-off elections were necessitated because neither of the three candidates for each of the two offices obtained the required 50 per cent of all votes cast for the office in the regular election held June 13.

For the office of guide, originally sought by Homer Conley, Lloyd Mankie and Lloyd Collins, Conley and Collins were candidates on the run-off last Tuesday. Collins won by a vote of 32 to 21.

In the run-off balloting for trustee for three years, Biane McCannan was elected when he received 44 votes to the 13 received by his opponent, Alvin Vail.

In the original election, June 13, Vail had received 122 votes, McCannan 105 and the third candidate, Blair Wierison, 60.

Jackson Man Drowns Sunday in Clear Lake Park

Chris Walker, Jr., a 28-year-old Jackson man, lost his life Sunday at the Clear Lake county park. The cause of his death was undetermined after artificial respiration failed to revive him.

At the lake with his wife and a sister, Walker had dived off the dock and failed to reappear. He was removed from the water by Mr. and Mrs. Edward Gervan of Ann Arbor, when the sister reported found him after they had reportedly called for help when he failed to come to the surface after his dive.

Don Guskett, life saver at Camp Lakewood, nearby, began artificial respiration immediately and, with Deputy Paul Peltes, took charge until state police from the Jackson post arrived in about 15 minutes with the resuscitator.

Residents of the lake praised the quick action of Deputy Peltes who took charge at the scene; also of Don Guskett and the lifeguards from Camp Takonah and Camp Kivela who alternated with him in administering artificial respiration. All professionally-trained lifeguards were untiring in their efforts to save Walker, according to people at the lake.

After he was pronounced dead by a Jackson physician called to the scene, the body was removed to the Hilliker Funeral Home in Jackson.

The tragedy occurred about 5 p.m. while hundreds of bathers were at the beach.

John W. Griffin Named To Be Principal of Chelsea High To Succeed Cameron

John Griffin, formerly of Sioux City, Iowa, is the newly-appointed principal of Chelsea High school, according to an announcement made by Charles S. Cameron, former principal, who officially took over his duties as superintendent July 1.

The new principal, who is 28 years old, is a graduate of Morningside college where he received a bachelor of science degree, having majored in physics, and mathematics. He obtained a master's degree in school administration from Columbia University, New York.

He was superintendent of schools at Bergland, near Ironwood in the upper peninsula, for the past two years and prior to that had taught in the high school at the Hornick, Iowa, High school. He was also basketball coach there.

Mr. Griffin is married and has a four and a half-year-old daughter, Rochelle. His wife, also a native of Iowa, was a home economics teacher.

VFW Camp Opened for First Session Wilkinson Rd. Improvement Undertaken

Forty-nine boys from Detroit and vicinity are attending the first two-week camp period at Camp Norcom, recently purchased by the Department of Michigan Veterans of Foreign Wars. The camp opened Sunday after a hectic campaign of cleaning and renovating in which Chelsea VFW Auxiliary and Post members took a prominent part.

Friday evening Mrs. Mary Kniss, Mrs. Clara Hutzel, Mrs. Flora Weber and Mrs. Mac Packard, of the local Auxiliary, put the finishing touches to the dining hall, cleaning the hall and washing dishes.

Men of the Chelsea Post had worked the previous week-end cleaning and renovating one of the cottages, adding new sanitation and bathroom. The cottage will be for the use of the camp director and his family. Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Harms, directors of the VFW camp at Union Lake the past four years, are in charge of the local camp. The Union Lake camp has been sold. Harms is a physical education director in a Detroit school system.

Camp personnel includes a cook, assistant cook, kitchen boy and five counselors. Mrs. Augusta White of Ann Arbor, Department of Michigan Auxiliary representative on the camp committee and chairman in charge of arranging for the opening of the local camp, said that a sixth counselor is desperately needed.

Mrs. White said good used porch furniture is needed for the screened porch and she is contacting VFW groups and others in an effort to obtain the items. She said the dining hall is still in need of drapes but on the whole, the camp is in good condition for the opening period, considering that there was only three weeks time to get ready after the camp was purchased. She explained that there is still much to be done before proposed plans for the camp are completed.

The second camp period, also for boys, begins July 14. Girls will be accommodated at the camp for the remaining four weeks of the summer program. There are no vacancies left for boys at the local camp unless there should be cancellations. Mrs. White said, but there are still a few openings at the VFW camp at Bills' Lake, near Newaygo.

Boys and girls from 9 to 13 years of age may attend the camps by making arrangements with the VFW Post or Auxiliary in their community.

Street Repair Work Nears Completion

Street repair work in Chelsea, done by the T. P. Flynn company of Detroit, is expected to be completed this week, according to Raymond Canine, village council president pro-tem and a member of the council's street committee. Also on the street committee is Walter Gage.

Work done or in-process of completion is as follows: Taylor street from Pierce to the south end of the street, completely surfaced.

Grant, Pierce, Maywood and a portion of Lincoln streets, all in the vicinity of the new elementary school, and Howard road, re-graded and prime-coated.

Park street, from Madison to Main, East and West Middle from Madison to the railroad tracks at the Methodist Home; McKinley from Middle to the railroad; Grand Middle to the intersection of Chandler and Summit; and Van Buren from Main to the hill at the Washington street intersection, all patched and resurfaced with oil seal coat and crushed stone.

Some work of patching and sealing is to be done on the village parking lot at the streets. The Harrison street, from the east end of the school property to Madison; and East street from Harrison to Middle are being widened to conform to the rest of the two streets. Bob Fitzsimmons is doing the grading and removing the old curbing on the two streets. The new curbs will be installed next week by Anderson and Schoening of Grass Lake.

Village officials have been besieged with complaints of dust on the streets newly resurfaced with crushed stone on tar. The crushed stone has contained somewhat more than the ordinary amount of dust, but the contractor has assured village officials that the dust situation will be corrected after the power sweeper is used on all the resurfaced streets. The sweeper will be used as soon as the resurfacing work is completed, the street committee has been told.

The resurfacing and repairing of the village streets and the widening and curbing of East and Harrison streets will cost approximately \$18,000.

Cedar Lake Camp Opens for '52 Season

New Dock Is Built with Cooperation of Conservation Dept.

The Girl Scout Camp at Cedar Lake, which opened for the season last week, has a new dock, which extends 60 feet out over the water, as the result of cooperation between representatives of the state Conservation Department and of the Cedar Lake Camp area committee.

The camp is leased from the Michigan Conservation Department by the Girl Scout Councils and associations of Ann Arbor, Belleville, Brighton, Chelsea, Lincoln School, Milan, Northville, Plymouth, Ypsilanti, and Wayne.

The Chelsea Girl Scout Association, of which Mrs. Alfred Mayer is president, in charge of shore maintenance for the camp area, made the arrangements for the new dock after conferring with Paul Ackerman, who is in charge of the group camp programs in this district for the Conservation Department. The Cedar Lake Camp area committee provided the material for the dock while conservation men supplied the labor.

The dock rests on a permanent metal pipe framework and the wood platform is removable for winter storage.

The Cedar Lake Camp area committee spent approximately \$250 on improving the waterfront facilities at the camp this year. In addition, volunteers recruited in Chelsea have assisted with some of the maintenance work. Albert Cammen, Charles S. Cameron, H. T. Moore, Basil Shell and Alfred Mayer went out one day the week before the season opened and painted the camp's six boats, inside and out.

Mrs. Jay Weinberg is secretary of the Camp Cedar Lake camp committee. Mrs. S. L. Bunnell, of Wayne, is president; Miss Frances Young, of Ypsilanti, vice-president; and Mrs. K. L. Hulsing, Plymouth treasurer.

Mrs. Alfred Mayer is Chelsea representative on the camp committee.

Among others in the community who show special interest in the Girl Scout camp is Jay Weinberg who contributed a large quantity of booklets describing the camp and containing the camp registration form and instructions for girls who plan to attend.

Oil Company Seeks Lease on Area Land

Residents of an area approximately two miles wide and three miles long, located east of the Chrysler Proving Grounds, have been approached during the past week regarding the granting of 10-year leases on their farms for possible drilling of test wells for oil or gas. The man, who called on a number of people in the area, identified himself as a representative of the Pleasant Oil company.

He reportedly stated that he was the opinion of certain oil men that test wells drilled in this vicinity in the past few years had never gone deep enough and it is their belief that oil or gas could be found in pay quantities if the wells were drilled to as much as 4500 feet below ground level.

Reports that some residents of the area had already signed leases have not been verified, to date.

Farmers in the area are planning to hold a meeting in the near future for the purpose of discussing the situation and planning a course of action.

The area on which the company representative said he was interested in securing leases, reportedly begins at the north line of the Reuben Lesser farm on the Chelsea-Manchester road, and extends south to Sager road and approximately three miles east, forming a section containing six square miles.

George D. Hurrell, director of the Washtenaw County Planning Commission, when asked for an opinion regarding the leasing of the land in the area, advised owners to protect their own interests by investigating as many sources of reliable information as possible to get the facts related to the potentialities for oil or gas on their lands before entering into any contracts.

The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

**Elector Unable To Make Personal Application, Procedure**

SEC. 16. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

**Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote.**

SEC. 1. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 108, P. A. 1951.)

**Transfer of Registration; Application, Time**

SEC. 19. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved there and the date he was last registered, and by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the (30) days next preceding any election or primary election, (unless such 30th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day), provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

**Transfer of Registration on Election Day**

SEC. 20. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote. When the resident house numbers of any section of a Township, City or Village have been changed, such change shall not affect the right of such voter to cast his vote. Corresponding change in the registration records may be made by the Clerk or upon election day upon proper showing.
