### New Wheat Crop Harvest Showing Excellent Quality

The first load of 1952 wheat was brought to the Bliss Elevator company at Four Mile Lake last Friday morning. The load came from the Carl Wollpert farm near Grass Lake. A steady run has continued ever since, William Blaess said yesterday.

Under the government support wheat program in which he is participating this year, Blaess said, he already has his full storage allotment completely committed.

The wheat has been of exceptionally good quality, Blaess said, most of it well under the allowable maximum moisture content of 13.5 per cent.

Lyle Haaslerwerdt, at Chelsea Milling company, said the first wheat of the season was brought to the elevator there on Friday.

The first load came from the Don Sommers farm at St. Michaels and is of fine quality. Sommers booked 1000 bushels to be brought in here. Most of the wheat brought in, to date, Haaslerwerdt said, has been of premium quality, with test weight of 60 lb. and better to the bushel and having an average moisture content of about 13 per cent.

Average price paid for wheat this year has been \$2.00 with premium quality bringing a cent a bushel.

The big 24-hour-a-day run of wheat is expected the end of this week and the beginning of the coming week, Haaslerwerdt said. Coffee and doughnuts are served to farmers while they are lined up waiting to unload their wheat during the rush hours.

The rain Monday night caused a halt in combining on Tuesday and very little wheat was brought in throughout the day.

### Cassidy Lake Pair Get Life Sentences in Murder Charge

Jack Howard, 19, of Muskegon, and Sylvester Salva, 20, of Detroit, were found guilty of first degree murder in the March 31 death of Anthony Bedard, 19, a fellow inmate of the Cassidy Lake Technical school. The verdict was announced by the jury at 9:15 Monday night. They appeared before Judge James R. Breakey, Jr., to receive mandatory life sentences to Jackson prison at 9 a. m. Tuesday.

The trial of the two Cassidy Lake Technical school inmates began in Washtenaw county Circuit Court last Wednesday. Chief Assistant Prosecutor Edmund F. Devine was in charge of the case for the prosecutor's office.

The slaying took place at the Cassidy Lake school March 31 and the body was not discovered until May 1. The slain youth had been listed as missing after his disappearance. His body, tied to a concrete block, was found in a shallow septic tank on the grounds.

Testimony offered at the trial by a former inmate indicated that the accused slayers had believed the body would be dissolved in the tank.

Motive for the slaying was to prevent Bedard from turning informer regarding their activities which they felt would spoil their chances for parole.

According to early statements allegedly made the two inmates, Salva was the one who inflicted the stab wounds found on the body and Howard was the one who had first struck Bedard on the head.

During the trial the two defendants stated the crime was not premeditated, as the state claimed, but that they had merely planned to "scare Bedard" so he would keep silent about their activities.

Eleven women and three men were on the jury for the trial of Howard and Salva.





**Good Soil Tilth Helps Crops Thrive in Drouthy Weather**

CROPS grown on soils of good tilth have a better chance of standing drouthy summer weather, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

"The reason for this is that such soils soak up more moisture and store it for the use of crops during dry weather," says a statement issued by the committee.

Plant nutrients play an important two-way function, says the committee, in helping make more water available for crop use:

1—By producing larger amounts of organic matter, they help increase the soil's water-holding capacity. Less water runs off; more is saved for crop use.

2—The nutrients help the plants make more efficient use of water.

"When ample plant nutrients are provided," says the committee, "the crop will actually make more growth per unit of water taken-up. So crops grown on soils of good tilth take longer to be affected by drouth when they are well nourished."

One of the best ways to add organic matter, according to the committee, is to follow a rotation that includes plowed under deep-rooted legumes such as alfalfa and sweet clover. These mellow the soil and improve drainage.

You can fertilize the legumes and row crops following, with phosphate, potash and nitrogen as needed to produce bigger yields. In that way

The Chelsea Juniors (16 years old and under) lost their opening league game to the local lads in nine innings by a score of 8-7.




