Last Sunday the Chelsea Independents won their fifth league game of the season by defeating Lansing, 8-6. It was the second time this year that Chelsea has defeated this Lansing team. Marty Tobin has been the winner in both of them. In Sunday's game Marty gave up 12 hits, walked only three and struck out 13.

Chelsea took a one-run lead in the third inning on a walk, a fielder's choice and a double by Arden Musbach, but Lansing came back in their half of the fourth to score two times and put the fourth in the lead. In the last half of Chelsea's fourth the Independents once more took the lead and this time they didn't lose it.

George Heydauff led off with an infield hit, stole second and went to third after Hansen flied out to center. Miller then walked and with McClear at bat Heydauff stole home and Miller went down to second. McClear then walked and Dick Merkel followed with a single into left field which scored Miller and put the Independents in the lead.

In the fifth inning Chelsea scored five more runs as nine batters went to the plate. The runs were scored on singles by Arden Musbach, Stan Knickerbocker, Don McClear and Dick Merkel, plus two Lansing errors, two wild pitches, and stolen bases by Heydauff and Jim Miller.

## Settlement of Long Steel Strike Means Gradual Recall of Local Plant Workers

Steel production was to be resumed this week following settlement of the strike last Friday. The strike, said to be the costliest as well as the longest steel strike in American history, was in its fifty-third day when it ended.

Announcement that the strike was over was made from the White House where the president conferred with U. S. Steel Chairman Benjamin Fairless and CIO President Philip Murray.

The announcement that the strike was over did not include announcement of terms reached as to wages and other demands. The strike was reportedly no great victory for any of those involved—the union, the government, or industry.

The raise in wages of 16 cents an hour and provisions for increased vacations and holiday pay will be reflected in an increase of \$3.20 per ton of steel produced by the 380 plants involved.

Locally, resumption of the production of steel is expected to gradually bring about the recall of workers laid off as a direct result of the strike.

At Central Fibre Products, Inc., 60 per cent of the workers had been laid off. Donald Bacon, president of the company, said the plant will start recalling workers as fast as materials are received.

He said the company is expediting shipments of steel by the end of this week. It will take two or three weeks, however, to get back to normal operations, Bacon said.

Chelsea Manufacturing Corporation is operating on the barest essential basis with only two men working. The situation will remain the same, at least through this week, according to E. P. Sarman, treasurer of the company.

Although the company had steel on hand, operations were halted because customers cancelled deliveries and storage space at the local plant was taxed to its fullest capacity. Sarman said employees will be recalled as soon as possible.

Chelsea Products was not expecting to be affected by the steel strike unless it continued through to the end of the month.

Lowell Davison, plant manager of Chelsea Spring, said it is his opinion that it will take from 80 to 45 days to get operations back to normal at the plant. Approximately 40 per cent of the workday had been laid off because of the effects of the steel strike.

Federal Screw Works anticipates no further lay-offs now that the strike is over, but no call-backs of workers laid off are scheduled for the time being. Materials for defense orders are expected in a week or 10 days but the domestic and automotive industry work done at the plant will not be back to normal for from two weeks to a month.

Those passing the tests will receive Red Cross certificates. Mr. Magiera and Larry Soldan, the Red Cross swimming instructor, have decided that certificates should only be given to those who meet all of the requirements. Even though all the children who participate learn much, Mr. Magiera feels that since the certificates mean a great deal, they shouldn't be given out freely to all participants with no regard to the completed requirements.

The high school playground will not be open during this extra week of Aug. 11 to 15. Daily activities will be carried on as follows: athletic field from 9:30-11:30 a.m.; swimming program from 12:30-4:30 p.m.; and evening program from 6:30-8:30.



## Congl. Pastor Ends 10-Year Service Here

### Announcement Ends Longest Pastorate in Church's History

Completing his tenth year as pastor of the First Congregational church of Chelsea, Rev. William H. Skentelbury surprised his church members last Sunday when he announced his resignation, stating also that he had accepted a call to the Litchfield Congregational church.

Rev. Skentelbury's pastorate has been unusually successful, according to members of his congregation, and it was with regret that the church accepted his decision which, he stated, was made only after very careful and prayerful consideration.

His has been the longest pastorate in the history of the Chelsea church, and many substantial changes have occurred during the decade of his service here. As a result of Rev. Skentelbury's leadership, church board members state, the church is in very sound condition—both spiritually and

physically. Rev. Skentelbury has received an average of more than 20 persons into membership each year, and more than \$20,000 has been expended on permanent improvements on the church and parsonage.

The church building was improved in many ways, including the re-wiring of the entire electrical system, providing new chancel furniture, installation of a new altar, first-floor kitchenette, enlarged primary room, large well-furnished basement dining room, modern rest rooms, well-equipped kitchen, and the entire church was re-decorated.

The parsonage was completely remodeled, and a modern kitchen and bathroom provided. A garage was constructed, and all buildings were re-decorated.

It was typical of Rev. Skentelbury that he included in his title describing the Chelsea church "The Friendly Church," and he himself will be remembered because of his friendliness to everyone in the community.

The organization of the Congregational church is such that its pastors are engaged by the members and boards of each individual church, but it is customary to counsel with the State Conference of the Congregational and Christian Churches, the Superintendent being Rev. Harold N. Skidmore.

The Chelsea church will not hold services during August as this is the normal period for the pastor's vacation. Plans for the church services in the Fall will be arranged for by the Board of Deacons.

Rev. Skentelbury came here in September, 1942. His resignation becomes effective Aug. 31. Tuesday, he left by automobile for California to be away for about three weeks. He plans to return by plane.
