The League, then known as the Young People's Society, was founded Jan. 19, 1902, by a group of 17 young people who met with Rev. A. A. Schoen, pastor of St. Paul's church at the time.

Lehman), Emma Seitz (Mrs. Maal), Clara Hieber (Mrs. Hills), Minnie Hieber, Mary Sager (Mrs. Castle), Sarah Koch (Mrs. Emanuel Bammiller), Emma Jensen, and Lillie Blaich (Wacker).

Of this number, the following are known to be deceased: Conrad Lehman, Louise Heber (Winans), Pauline Schoen and Rev. Schoen.

Meetings were held each Sunday evening and at the end of the first year 43 members had been enrolled. The League now is governed by an executive council which includes the officers, Richard Schneider, president; Norman Feltkamp, vice-president; Alice Ann Wenk, secretary; and Dean Guenther, treasurer.

This Election Vital to US for Generations, Says Lecturer

"National Politics in Election Years" proved to be a lively topic for discussion at the Library Lecture Series last Monday evening. Professor Joseph Kallenbach of the University of Michigan department of Political Science, was the speaker.

Under the party stewardship heading, Democrats plot to prosper, as shown by private and corporate incomes, rising living standards, reduction of unemployment, progress in safeguards against social economic hazards as old age, unemployment, etc.; while Republicans claim such prosperity is due to the armament programs, and call attention to bungling in Korea, waste, inflation, high taxes, and Communist sympathizers, etc.

Royal Arch Masons of Michigan Name Paul Belsler to Highest Position in State

Paul P. Belsler became Michigan's 95th Grand High Priest of the Royal Arch Masons, following election and installation ceremonies held by the Grand Chapter at Marquette, Saturday, Oct. 18.

Belsler is the fifth Washtenaw county Mason to hold this exalted office, the highest the Royal Arch Masons of Michigan have to offer. His predecessors were Benjamin Franklin Watts of Ann Arbor, 1888; Charles Lowell Stevens of Ypsilanti, 1902; John Hampden Kingsley of Manchester, 1915; and William Walter Watts, also of Ann Arbor, 1914. The Watts were father and son.

Some 600 delegates, representing the state's 161 Royal Arch chapters, with a membership in excess of 31,000, voiced their selection of Belsler who succeeded Paul F. Becker of Bessemer.

He was elected in Ann Arbor Council No. 86, April 30, 1949, and served as Third Illustrious Master in 1947. He was knighted in Ann Arbor Commandery No. 13, April 24, 1943, and served as Eminent Commander in 1949-50.

Heart Attack Fatal to Jacob Fahrner, Ann Arbor Lawyer

Jacob F. Fahrner, who had been an Ann Arbor attorney for 44 years and served as Washtenaw county prosecuting attorney from 1919 to 1922, died about 10 o'clock Saturday morning while being taken to St. Joseph's Mercy hospital after he collapsed in the court house following a heart attack.

Mr. Fahrner's collapse occurred near the Circuit Court room while he was waiting for pending cases to be called. His son, Jacob F. Fahrner, Jr., was with him after he suffered the heart attack.

Mr. Fahrner was a member of the First Methodist church of Ann Arbor, the Golden Rule Lodge of the Masons, and the Washtenaw County Bar Association. He was a former vice-president and one of the oldest attorneys holding membership in the association.

He had served as public administrator, a state appointment, and as a member of the county board of auditors.

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Special Gathering Tuesday Evening Open to Public

"COURT HOUSE FACTS"

Desiring to fully inform the citizens of Washtenaw County of the facts involved in the program for a new County Building, we are bringing to your attention the complete report made by the State Fire Marshal to the Board of Supervisors on August 12, 1952. This report follows - -

Dear Sir:

A representative of this department accompanied by Fire Chief Ben Zahn of the City of Ann Arbor, made a fire inspection of the above captioned building.

The means of egress from the second floor are insufficient. The outside fire escape in no way complies with the State Specifications for fire escapes and should a flash or quick burning fire ever occur in the basement, people in the court room could be easily trapped and would have no way of getting out of this building.

You have very important records of the county in this building and should a fire ever occur, all these records could be destroyed and as you know, the records of the county in many cases are irreplaceable.

It was observed that you have built a new vault in the basement with just an ordinary metal door protecting this vault from the main building. This vault has ordinary glass windows, however, they are protected by steel bars, but anybody could break one of the windows and throw anything from the outside into the vault and destroy the contents. This new vault has been constructed with wooden shelving, and is used by a large number of people. It was observed that many people go into this vault smoking, and there was evidence of cigarette butts in the vault, and it was also observed that the housekeeping conditions in this vault were very bad. The housekeeping conditions on the third floor are in a deplorable condition, this including the hallway and one room used by the County School Commissioner and one room used by the County Clerk. **IN FACT, THIS THIRD FLOOR SHOULD BE SEALED OFF AND ALL ELECTRICAL WIRING DISCONTINUED.**

As a result of this inspection, we are making certain recommendations which we believe should be carried out for the protection of the records and occupants of the building, **BUT THESE RECOMMENDATIONS ARE NO GUARANTEE THAT THIS BUILDING COULD NOT HAVE A SERIOUS FIRE AND DESTROY ALL THE RECORDS AND PERHAPS CAUSE A NUMBER OF CASUALTIES TO THE PERSONS ON THE SECOND FLOOR.**

1. Clean out all unnecessary combustible materials from the third floor, including storage rooms used by the County Clerk and the School Commissioner and maintain better housekeeping conditions on this floor at all times.
2. Replace all the old knob and tube and rat tail wiring and the poor box hookup on the third floor, and have same comply with the National Electrical Code, or cut off this part of the building from electrical service.
3. Remove all fuses from branch circuits that are over 15 amp.
4. Keep the third floor free of human occupancy, and install a door or gate with lock so that the third floor will be accessible only to authorized persons.
5. There are insufficient safe exits from the second floor which houses the court room, and with the open stairways from this floor, proper exits should be provided. This would require the services of an architect to work out, which this office would cooperate with.
6. The present fire escapes are in very poor condition, and should be replaced.
7. Have the present rotunda of the building, which is constructed of wood, sealed off at each floor level with metal lath and plaster to eliminate the chimney effect of the rotunda shaft should a fire occur.
8. The open circular stairways between first and second floors should be enclosed at the second floor level as a smoke barrier between floors in event of fire.
9. Provide direct exit from the probate court room into the hallway by eliminating the office in the east end of the first floor corridor.
10. Install an approved four hour fire door to entrance to basement vaults.
11. Install wired fireglass in the vault windows.
12. Post no smoking signs in the vault and enforce the rule at all times.
13. Fill in the pipe openings into the vault with solid masonry.
14. Remove the accumulated baled paper storage from the basement.
15. Install closed metal cabinets in janitors quarters for the storage of paints.
16. Remove the storage closets under the basement stairs.
17. Install a self closing approved fire door at the entrance to the boiler room.
18. Comply with all orders of the inspection engineer, on his orders of June 26, 1948.
19. **THE PRESENT RECORDS THAT ARE KEPT IN THE VARIOUS OFFICES ARE NOT PROTECTED AGAINST ANY SERIOUS FIRE THAT COULD OCCUR IN THIS BUILDING. IMMEDIATE ACTION SHOULD BE TAKEN TO PROVIDE PROPER VAULTS FOR THESE RECORDS. THIS TO INCLUDE ALL COUNTY DEPARTMENTS.**

IT IS THE OPINION OF THE WRITER THAT THIS PRESENT BUILDING IS NOT A SAFE BUILDING FOR THE PRESENT TYPE OF OCCUPANCY AND CONSTITUTES A SERIOUS FIRE TRAP.

Nice Cooperation Turns Illegal Hunting into Difficult Business

Doris Oatts, a 30-year-old Detroit resident, paid a fine of \$75 and costs of \$7.80 when he appeared before Judge Francis O'Brien in Municipal Court, Ann Arbor, Tuesday, Oct. 14, on charges of shooting pheasants out of season. He was arrested by Conservation Officer Donley Boyer on Sylvan road in Sharon township, Saturday, Oct. 11.

Donald W. Connor, 41, of Ann Arbor, was sentenced Oct. 15 to spend one day in jail, pay a fine of \$75 and costs of \$7.80 and had his hunting license revoked for the season after shooting a hen pheasant during the closed season. He was arrested in Ann Arbor township, Oct. 14.

Connor's arrest was brought about because of a chain of circumstances and with the cooperation of a number of persons. A farmer who witnessed the shooting reported the license number of the hunter's car to Conservation Officer Donley Boyer who telephoned the Sheriff's department. Sheriff's department officers radioed Ann Arbor city police to be on the look-out for the car.

Patrolman Curtis, of the Ann Arbor Police department stopped Connor's car on Stadium Boulevard and found the dressed hen pheasant under a coat on the front seat.

He was turned over to the conservation officer for disposition of the case.

Boyer commended the farmer, the sheriff's officers and Ann Arbor police for the cooperation which resulted in Connor's apprehension and urged that others follow the farmer's example in reporting promptly any infractions of the conservation laws which come to their attention.

Investigate Car Stranded in Brush

At 9:30 Sunday night Julius Haas lost control of his car on Cavanaugh Lake road, one quarter of a mile east of Musbach road, and the car plunged into the ditch and overturned, damaging the top.

Sheriff's deputies were also called out Sunday night to investigate reports that a car had gone over an embankment and was stranded in the brush some distance from Island Lake road, east of Werkner road.

Deputies had the car towed to Chelsea and traced the registration to a Northville owner who said the car had been sold to Harlan Hughes, 8080 Werkner road. Investigation revealed that the car had been stranded in the field for a week because Hughes hadn't been able to get it out.
