

**County Polio Chapter Now Providing Care for 82 Area Patients**

Washtenaw county's polio chapter is taking care of 82 local cases at the present time, according to Mrs. Robert Langford, executive secretary of the chapter.

There is no way of knowing when a patient is admitted to the hospital with polio, how long the treatment will last, Mrs. Langford explained.

"Some cases cost several thousand dollars," she said, "with one patient in Washtenaw county costing \$9,000.

Out-patient care is a large item for the local chapter. This involves physio-therapy, purchasing braces, wheel chairs and crutches. A great many patients leave the hospital and return months or even years later for surgery or other treatment made necessary because of the original cause of polio.

Mrs. Langford stated that usually only families in very high income brackets can meet the entire cost of caring for a polio patient. The ideal arrangement would be for the polio fund to pay all of the cost for everyone, but since the funds are limited, this cannot be done, Mrs. Langford explained.

"However," she added, "no one is ever asked to make a financial sacrifice."

"If a family is in a financial position to do so, they are asked to pay what they can, and the local chapter pays the rest."

"One of the basic principles of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis is that no child shall be made to feel guilty because his family had to make financial sacrifices to pay for his treatment for polio," Mrs. Langford emphasized.

When a polio patient is admitted to the hospital, the family is told to get in touch with the Foundation. The executive secretary of the local chapter is notified of all patients by the hospital authorities. The local chapter gives direct financial aid to patients from Washtenaw county, and notifies the home chapters of other patients so that they can make arrangements for financial assistance for patients in their own localities.

In addition to giving financial aid in any amount necessary for the treatment of patients, the funds from the Foundation for Infantile Paralysis are used for research in the prevention, cause and cure of polio, and in an educational program for all chapters. All chapters are supported entirely by contributions to the March of Dimes campaign.

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





**Corncob Filler Used for Light-Weight "Insulated" Concrete**

Ground corncobs, used as a filler, may produce a lower cost, lighter weight, better insulated concrete for Michigan farmers. Tests by the Agricultural Experiment Station of Michigan State College, using various combinations of corncob, cement, sand, gravel, lime and limestone, have produced strengths to meet many farm construction needs. Wall and floor slabs of corncob concrete were exposed to weather for 20 months, through 2 winters, and showed no apparent defects. 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

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
