Cage Team Defeated in Final Game

Milan Reserves Win Easy Victory over Local Bullpups

The last Huron League game of the season proved a bitter disappointment to local fans as Milan's Big Reds defeated the Bullpups 60-51 last Friday evening on the Milan home court.

During the first period Chelsea led 13-9 but lost their lead when the Big Reds started applying pressure. The second quarter saw Milan pick up 15 points to end the first half 24-20. Don Ing led the winners with 12 points, while Neil Buehler paced the Bullpups with six points to his credit.

Milan added 21 points to their lead in the third quarter, while Chelsea could net only 11 more to finish the quarter with the score reading 45-31. In the fourth quarter Chelsea picked up a few points but the game ended 60-51.

Don Ing led all scorers with 22 points, assisted by Don E. Massey with 11. Bob Bertke led all Chelsea scorers with 18 points, while Neil Buehler sank nine.

The Bullpups also finished on the small end of the score in their encounter with the Little Reds, losing 44-24. Dave Ducharme paced the Little Reds with 13 points, assisted by Otto Ramsey with 10. Harold Owings paced the Bullpups with five points while Lloyd Schneider, Glen Weir, Bill Roberts and Jim Hough each added three points.

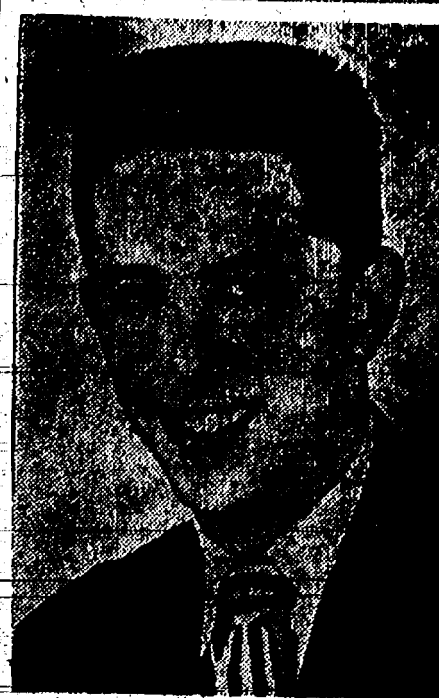

The school is located at Macon and is operated under the direction of the Brothers of Holy Cross.

Since its opening five years ago, Cavanaugh said, the lights of Columbus organization has been highly commended for their support of the work through voluntary contributions of individual members. The work is also supported by special contributions from philanthropic and social organizations of all denominations, according to Cavanaugh.

At present 167 boys attend the school at Macon where training and education in various trades and professions are aimed at developing qualities which will make the boys better citizens, morally and physically, after they have graduated.

Chelsea's K. of C. Council is comparatively new, having been organized in 1947. There are now 146 members.

Otto Hinderer Retires from Grocery Store

Otto Hinderer, in the grocery business here in the same location for 33 years, has sold his interest in the business to his brother, Wilbur, who has been in partnership with him and who will continue the business under the name of Hinderer's Market.

The store has been known through the years as Hinderer Brothers grocery store.

The Hinderer store is believed to be the oldest grocery store in Chelsea that had continued to be owned and operated by the same owners through the 33 years.

The Hinderer brothers went into business together in March, 1920, and weathered the depression years and the war years, with their rationing problems.

The retiring partner has been connected with the grocery business in Chelsea for more than 38 years. He had been employed for five and one-half years, before going into business for himself, in the former L. P. Vogel store, combined drug and grocery store in the present Chelsea drug store location.

Mr. Hinderer said yesterday that he has made no definite plans for the immediate future.

State Education Official To Talk at Kiwanis Club

A regular meeting of the Chelsea Kiwanis club was held Monday evening in the social center of the Methodist church. Jim Young of the Mill Lake school camp, was a guest at the meeting.

Present as the evening's speaker was Harold Coolman of Ann Arbor, Kiwanis district lieutenant governor. He announced forthcoming Kiwanis events, convention dates, inter-club activities and achievement aims and objectives for 1953. He elaborated on the fact that the year's slogan is "Freedom—Our Sacred Trust."

There was a short business meeting after the regular meeting, and also a committee meeting, called by Don Alber, to make plans for the club's 20th birthday party to be held March 28.

During the regular business session at the meeting, Basil Shell, elementary school principal, proposed that the club give annual citizenship awards to Chelsea junior and high school students. Details are to be discussed at a later meeting.

Nearly 2,000 Dogs Vaccinated During Anti-Rabies Clinics

1,892 dogs were vaccinated in the anti-rabies clinics sponsored by the Washtenaw county Veterinary Medical Association and the Washtenaw county Health Department, and conducted throughout the county during the past two weeks.

This is about 250 more dogs than were vaccinated in the same clinics last year. The best showing was made in East Ann Arbor, where 285 dogs were vaccinated. Dexter was next with approximately 250. Willow Village was third with 236. Some 220 dogs were vaccinated in Ann Arbor and 104 in Ypsilanti, but when the size of the communities served are taken into account, this is not an impressive number.

Vaccinations in the balance of the communities served were recorded as follows: Augusta township, 104; Lyndon township, 41; Manchester, 76; Milan, 95; Whitmore Lake, 141; Saline, 29; Saline, 115; Superior township, 30; and Chelsea, 100.

County health officials are relying heavily on the individual citizen to have unvaccinated dogs treated at the veterinarians' offices before March 1, when the license deadline expires and new licenses must be obtained. The law requires that each dog be vaccinated for rabies within the year preceding the granting of the license. Failure to live up to the law on the part of the dog owners will practically guarantee the return of the unnecessary expense and suffering that exposure to this disease entails.

Rabies, which used to be prevalent here, has disappeared simply because dog owners are getting their dogs vaccinated each year, according to the county Health Department.

Quota of \$1,675 Asked of Chelsea in Annual Appeal

Solicitation of every home in Chelsea was begun Monday when the 1953 Red Cross campaign got into full swing here. Chelsea's quota this year is \$1,675 but any amount raised above that will remain for use in the Chelsea area exclusively. Mrs. John Fischer, Chelsea chairman of the drive, pointed out.

Block workers, under the direction of four block captains, will attempt to reach every person in the area assigned to them. In case someone is missed, however, a call to any of the captains or to Mrs. Fischer will bring a solicitor at the convenience of the person calling.

The four captains in charge of the block workers are Mrs. Deane Rogers, Mrs. Stephen Slane, Mrs. Willard Pearson and Mrs. William Storey.

Mrs. Hugh Sorensen is in charge of solicitations in the business district, and Mrs. Jay Weinberg is contacting all organizations of the community.

Mrs. Fischer, following her own example, is also contacting the industries of Chelsea, herself.

Goal of the Red Cross drive in the county is \$70,400 with the national quota set at 93 million dollars.

Funds obtained are to be used for the many public services of the Red Cross, as well as to help disaster sufferers, servicemen and women, veterans and their dependents, and others in need.

Funds will also be allocated to finance the production of gamma globulin, a blood derivative now being used as a preventive of paralytic polio.

The election will be held in Sylvan Town Hall on West Middle street.

Only the People's party named a slate of candidates for office this year, with incumbent Village President Anton Nielsen heading the ticket.

Candidates for the remaining offices to be filled are Robert Devine, clerk; David Strieter, treasurer; Raymond Canine, Dahue Riker and Walter Gage, trustees; Ed Kersch, assessor; and Mrs. Miriam Hale and Philip Smith, Library Board trustees.

All but Smith are incumbent officials.

The Independent party named no candidates for the election.

Monday, in addition to being election day in the village, also marks the last day for registering for the Township biennial spring elections which will be held April 6.

Weight Restrictions Will Be Imposed Only Whenever Necessary

Weight restrictions will be in force in Washtenaw county whenever conditions warrant, Howard G. Minier, county Road Commissioner, said yesterday.

He stated that extra precautions are being taken in an effort to keep road damage to a minimum during the alternate freezing and thawing which normally takes place this time of the year.

Minier said roads in this vicinity, at present, are in "pretty good shape," but could change very quickly in case of heavy rain followed by freezing weather.

Work on the re-surfacing of Pleasant Lake road is progressing, Minier said.

Road construction workers have already applied approximately 2,000 yards of the sand lift, beginning at Esch road and working west.

At that time plans are to be formulated for presenting a unified protest to the state representatives and prosecutor relative to the present ban on petty raffles and games of non-profit organizations in Washtenaw county.

When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote. When the resident house numbers of any section of a Township, City or Village have been changed, such a change shall not affect the right of such voter to cast his vote. Corresponding change in the registration records may be made by the Clerk or upon election day upon proper showing.
