

Cagers Lose Final Game in Tourney

Win First Contest from St. Thomas To Enter Finals

Chelsea's Bulldog cage squad was eliminated from the Ypsilanti class C basketball tournament by bowing to Wayne St. Mary's, 45-20, Saturday night in the district finals.

After drawing a bye in the first round of tournament play for Thursday night, the Bulldogs encountered Ann Arbor's St. Thomas team Friday and defeated them, 45-21. After the first quarter Chelsea held a slim lead over the Irish with period scores ending, 8-7, St. Thomas' favor, 25-21, 34-25, and 43-41, Chelsea.

High pointers for the Bulldogs were Bob White and Neal Bushler with 16 points each, and Bob Bertke who added 10. Anderson was top scorer for St. Thomas with 14 points, with Rickelman placing second with seven.

Chelsea converted 9 out of 17 foul shots for a 52.9 average, while St. Thomas made good on 9 of 21 for a 44.4 per centage.

In the final contest fans saw Chelsea and Wayne St. Mary's play one of the tightest battles of the tournament. The Blue and Gold tried to hold their lead during the first three periods (12-12, 25-22, 31-30), but in the fourth quarter St. Mary's broke through by adding 12 points in a row, putting them beyond reach with the final score of 45-39.

Bob White and Dave Elkins shared scoring honors for Chelsea with 12 points each, and center Bob Bertke made seven. Phil Luke was high scorer for St. Mary's with 14 points.

Chelsea converted 50 per cent, 9 of 18 foul shots, and St. Mary's sank 65 per cent, 13 out of 20.

C. William Wahl Dies Early Sunday in Family Home

Charles William Wahl, a lifelong resident of this vicinity, died Sunday morning in the home at 4015 Francisco road, which had been the family home for more than 50 years. He had been seriously ill the past two months.

Born at the Wahl homestead, west of Clear Lake, July 25, 1868, he was a son of Michael and Jacobina Sheu Wahl. He attended the Palmer school in Waterloo township and was confirmed in St. Jacob's Lutheran church at Waterloo.

March 22, 1894, he was married in Jackson to Rosa Elizabeth Landis of Waterloo township. They operated the homestead farm for several years and for one year, 1899, lived near Unadilla, before buying the present farm where they have lived since 1900. Mr. Wahl had taken an active part in the operation of the farm until about three years ago.

Survivors, in addition to Mrs. Wahl, are a daughter, Hazel, now Mrs. Eldon Katz of Munith; two sons, Arthur of Manchester, and Harold of Francisco road; a sister, Mrs. Sophia Boos of Lansing; 12 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren. One grandson, Don Lee Wahl, died Dec. 22, 1952.

Starting Plan for Reading Improvement

A reading improvement program in the elementary school here, instituted with the naming of a committee to present recommendations for carrying it out, marks the beginning of a continuous reading program in which all of the elementary school will participate from time to time, and in which resource persons will be called in for advice.

Current information for reading improvement in the schools will continually be studied and evaluated for any advantages to be gained by applying new methods in the current program.

The committee, named by Basil Shell, elementary principal, includes Mrs. Sallie Smith, chairman; Miss Mary Wade, Mrs. Isaac Beisler and John Murdoch.

The first report was given at the teachers' regular bi-monthly meeting Tuesday, March 3. The committee presented the following resolutions:

Each teacher should list where pupils should resume reading progress at the beginning of the fall term.

A notation of the reading needs of each pupil should be made so that a definite program can be worked out at the beginning of the school year.

Diagnostic reading tests should be given at the end of the school year to give accurate and specific data on the strengths or weaknesses of each child.

New supplementary material should be added to the library—reading series and story books. (There is a series of books for remedial purposes to create interest in reading.)

A remedial reading group should be organized at once and given special instruction.

A remedial group, as recommended by the committee, is to be formed immediately and will begin operation Monday, March 16. Elementary School Principal Basil Shell will instruct these classes.

Pinckney Area Man Stabbed by Hiker Near North Lake

Bert Mathison of Patterson Lake, Pinckney, suffered stab wounds in his back and cuts on his hand, received while allegedly wrestling the knife away from his assailant on Stoffer road shortly after midnight Thursday, according to police reports.

A told to sheriff's deputies called to the scene, Mathison was on his way home when he picked up a hitch-hiker on Werker road, just north of Waterloo road.

On Stoffer road, a quarter of a mile before reaching the North Lake store, Mathison said, he got out to investigate a scraping noise at the rear of the car and found the fender scraping the tire. As he bent over to pull up the fender, the hitchhiker stabbed him. His assailant reportedly fled after Mathison succeeded in taking the knife away from him.

Mathison was given first aid by a local physician and then taken by ambulance to St. Joseph's Mercy hospital, Ann Arbor. Mathison is married and the father of two children.

FFA Team Places Second in Regional

Parliamentarians Lose Close Contest to Adrian Chapter

Feb. 24, Chelsea FFA chapter members traveled to Saline to participate in the district parliamentary procedure and public speaking contests. Thirty-eight boys taking Vocational Agriculture at Chelsea High school watched their parliamentary procedure team defeat teams from Milan, Dexter, Manchester and Saline.

Chairman of the Chelsea team is Lloyd Grau, secretary is Norman Foldkamp; other members are Bob Heller, Ken Galbreath, Jim Greenwood, Gene Lake, and Duane Satterthwaite. The Milan team was runner-up to Chelsea.

Charles Stapish, representing Chelsea in the public speaking contest, received a silver rating for his speech entitled "What the FFA Has Done For Me." The winner of the public speaking contest was Arnold Giesbach of Saline. His topic was concerned with the need for greater efficiency on the farm.

Winners of the district contests competed in the regional contests at Hanover-Horton High school Tuesday evening, March 10. Winners of the contests were Adrian in parliamentary procedure, with Chelsea placing in the runner-up spot. Martin Wagner of Tecumseh won the public speaking contest, with Phil Alger of Jackson, runner-up.

The Chelsea boys made a very fine showing and received a gold rating for their efforts in the parliamentary procedure contest, as did the winning Adrian team. The Reading chapter was awarded a silver rating.

Chelsea will compete in the state contest at Lansing if Adrian is unable to do so.

This is the fourth year that the Chelsea FFA has won the district parliamentary procedure contest. In 1950, the team, with Walter Zeeb as chairman, won the district contest, regional contest, and was third in the state contest.

Dr. Hawley Talks Before Kiwanis Club

A brief memorial service at the Kiwanis club meeting Monday evening honored the late Col. P. S. Holmes who died suddenly at his home early that day.

Rev. Thomas Toy served in eulogy and Dr. Hawley read a statement of condolence to show their respect. Col. Holmes had been active in the club's work since coming here almost six years ago.

The principal speaker during the program period at Monday's meeting was Dr. William B. Hawley, deputy superintendent of Public Instruction, in charge of vocational guidance and education for occupational confidence.

Dr. Hawley drew a comparison of high school attendance of the present generation and the preceding one, saying that there are 90 times more students attending high school in this generation. He explained this by saying that only those intending to attend college formerly attended high school, whereas now almost every child of 75 per cent of all high school graduates did enter college.

Today, he said, with the increased number attending high school, less than 50 per cent go on to college.

Dr. Hawley outlined desirable guidance services which could be incorporated in local schools in cooperation with industries and businesses of the community.

Col. Percival S. Holmes, active in local church and community affairs in the six years he has made his home here, died suddenly at 4 a.m. Monday after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage at his home, 18215 Chelsea-Dexter road.

Col. Holmes was a member and past president of the Chelsea Kiwanis club, vice-president of the Chelsea Friends of the Library, a member of the Congregational church, Herbert J. McKune Post, No. 31, American Legion, and the Chelsea Chamber of Commerce.

He served in the United States Army from 1917 until his retirement in February, 1944, and in June, 1947, came to make his home on the Chelsea-Dexter road farm he had purchased in 1937.

His wife, the former Beatrice Brinson, died Oct. 12, 1952.

A son of Thomas S. and Jennie Evans Holmes, Col. Holmes was born at Lebanon, Kan., March 2, 1882.

Survivors are his son, Thomas S., at home, and a sister, Mrs. Ralph D. King, of Chicago, Ill.

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No Charge Made for Clinic Services Throughout County

As part of the county-wide program of immunization for the protection of children against diphtheria, tetanus and smallpox, immunization clinics have been scheduled for all parts of the county, beginning March 10 and ending May 6. In Chelsea the clinic will be held at the public school April 28, according to present schedules.

Announcement of the immunization clinic was made this week by Dr. Thurston Thieme, president of the Washtenaw County Medical Society, sponsor of the clinics.

"This will be the fifth year that the Medical Society has sponsored these clinics in cooperation with the County Health Department and the schools," said Dr. Thieme.

Last year over 6,418 children were served in these clinics. 4,406 of them were vaccinated against smallpox, and over 5,454 received protection against diphtheria and lockjaw," he added.

Tetanus booster shots were added last year the doctor reported, and will be included again this year.

In the clinics children who have not been vaccinated in the last five years will be offered vaccination for smallpox. Those who have not been immunized in the last three years for diphtheria and tetanus will receive booster doses for protection against these diseases.

As in past years, University hospital resident staff physicians are assisting in many of the clinics. They will be working with local doctors in many areas.

"All physicians are contributing their time free of charge in the clinics," said Dr. Thieme. "Washtenaw county physicians would much rather donate their services in protecting all of the children than to have to treat any of them for either diphtheria, smallpox or tetanus," he said.

The clinics are being held in Dexter today and in Manchester schools tomorrow.

The services of the Health Department and the schools are tax supported. No charge is made at the clinics for the immunizations or vaccinations made. The serums and vaccines are furnished by the State Health Department.

Michigan industries have added 157,000 workers to their payrolls since January 1952, says the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

The marked employment rise, almost 15% in 12 months, resulted from increased defense production and increased consumer spending. In its short term outlook, the agency said, Michigan manufacturing plants plan to hire 25,000 new workers by March 15 while other industries may let out about 2,000. Unemployment in Michigan was listed at 50,000 with 25,000 of these workers in the Detroit area.

Michigan again leads all the states when it comes to issuing fishing licenses, having sold 1,124,000 in 1952. California is second with some 65,000 fewer, or 1,059,000. Wisconsin and Minnesota ranked third and fourth.

But after leading the list of states for several years in hunting licenses, Michigan dropped to second place. Pennsylvania ranked first with a reported 1,670,000. Then comes Michigan with 952,000, 18,000 fewer. New York and Ohio are third and fourth.
