

● You will pay more state taxes in 1955. Legislators agree, for the first time, that the argument continues to be the same. How much, for how long, how will it be collected?

● Democrats, who have plugged for years to enact a corporate profit tax of some sort, have adopted a "show me a better way" attitude. Representative Walter H. Nill has introduced a bill to introduce at this session, a tax on corporate profits.

Republicans, since the legislature's opening day, have sought a solution to the state's \$90,000,000 deficit and a means of raising an additional \$35,000,000 each year to offset future deficits. They hope to pass a tax that directly affects a large number of people so that once the deficit is reduced, there will be little pressure to do away with the tax.

● For a time they studied the idea of taxing wholesalers; then a proposal for a tax of five mills (half a cent) against payrolls, excepting employees of federal, state and local governments, and non-profit religious and social agencies. This bill would expire automatically in June 1955. Other suggestions include using part of the money set aside for veteran bonus purposes, taxing cigarettes, and taxing the sale of used cars.

● Bills to tax personal and corporate incomes were introduced in both houses. The idea is to change a percentage—between one and five per cent is mentioned—of the amount paid to the federal government. To make the idea more acceptable, the plans call for repeal of the state sales and corporate profit taxes, and specifies that schools and local forms of government will receive about the same amount of money as at present. Dropping the sales tax in favor of an income tax is a measure long favored by some groups as a fairer means of taxing those who have the ability to pay.

● It has been predicted that unless the Republicans can come up with a workable solution to tax problems, they will be faced with passing for lack of something better, a bill akin to the one Gov. Williams has been advocating for at least four years.

● Action and decisions should become the keynote of the legislative session, since May 22 has been set as adjournment day. This means that all but money bills have already been introduced and the time for counting votes is here.

● An increase in the cost of fishing licenses is one bill that will come up for consideration. Rep. Eugene C. Betz, (R. Monroe) introduced a measure to raise the price to \$2 for residents and non-residents; eliminate husband-wife licenses and to require licensees to carry a license to use for damages resulting from injury received while hunting on private property was also put before the House of Representatives.

● People in Michigan would be saved about \$605,000,000, or more than half a million dollars in 1954 if present efforts to reduce the federal budget by \$10 billion are successful. These estimates are figured according to population; this state has 5.05% of the people in the country and would benefit by an equal proportion.

● An offer of a new "final resting place" for the body of Michigan's first governor is being considered in Detroit. It came from the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau to provide a solution to a problem facing Detroit officials. They are trying to create more usable space in the congested area of state and Griswold where, a tiny park marking the grave of Stevens T. Mason, Michigan's first governor who held office when he was only 32, had

### Goodwill Industries To Pick Up Discards Here Next Monday

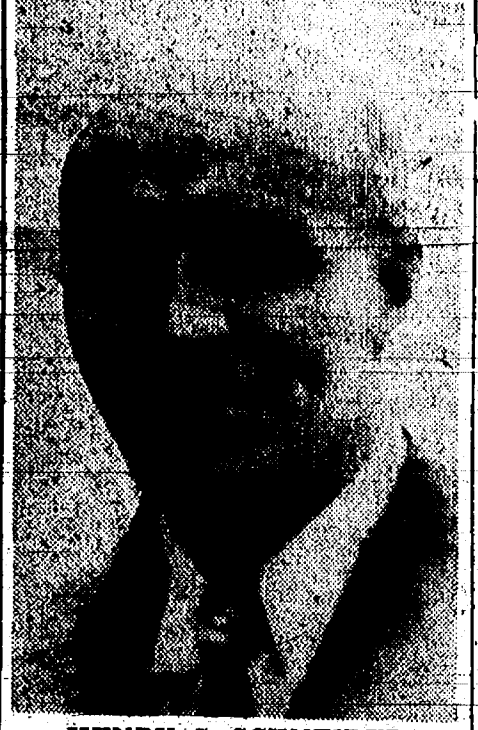

### Memorial Gift Fund Honors H. Schneider

Approximately \$800 has been added to the Chelsea Public Library building fund through memorial gifts in honor of the late Henry C. Schneider, former library board president and secretary-treasurer of the Friends of the Library.

In addition to the amount contributed to the building fund, many books were purchased by individuals for the Memorial Book Shelf at the library. With part of the memorial gift fund, a large dictionary will be purchased. A total of \$852 had been turned over to the Chelsea Friends of the Library.

Members of Mr. Schneider's family requested that the greater part of the money contributed in his honor, go into the building fund. They feel this disposition of the money would be what Mr. Schneider himself would have wished because of his very great interest in the local library.

Mr. Schneider died Jan. 30 of this year while he and Mrs. Schneider were visiting their daughter, Mrs. Horace R. Getz, in Altadena, Calif.

In addition to his work for the benefit of the library, Mr. Schneider was actively interested in the work of the Congregational church and had contributed valuable engineering assistance to the village and to the Chelsea schools.

He had formerly been a member of the school board, was financial secretary of the Congregational church for many years before retiring last year because of failing health, and supervised the construction of the village's service building and garage on North street, the electric power sub-station on Van Buren street and other projects.

At the time of his death, officials of the Chelsea Friends of the Library described Mr. Schneider as "the motivating force behind the success of the Chelsea Friends of the Library."

Head-on Crash  
Kills Two Sunday  
Near M-92 Corner

Mrs. Marjorie Hackney, 30, of 8075 Rexford road, Wolf Lake, and Red P. Stem, 59, of 32831 Norchester Drive, Beverly Hills, Birmingham, were killed instantly in a two-car crash on US-12 a short distance west of M-92 late Sunday afternoon.

The collision occurred in the center lane of the three-lane highway. Stem's car, headed east, and Hackney's car, going west, collided head-on with such force that the engine of the Hackney car was torn loose and hurled 30 feet.

Mrs. Stem, riding with her husband, suffered severe head and chest injuries and both legs were broken.

Clifford Hackney, driver of the westbound car, suffered head and groin injuries and his two-year-old daughter, Pamela Sue, received fractures of the spine and a leg.

The deaths of Stem and Mrs. Hackney were listed as the 16th and 17th in Washtenaw county since the beginning of the year.

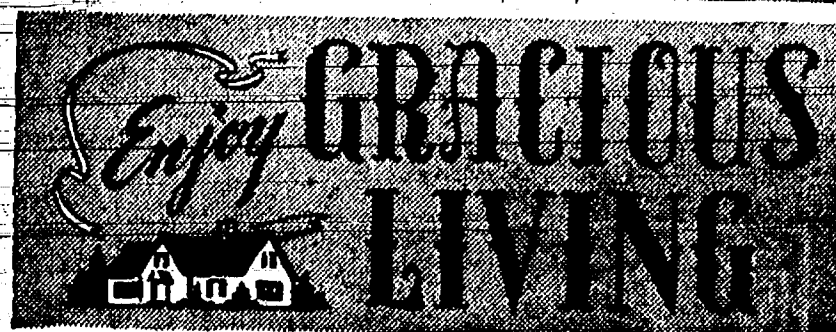

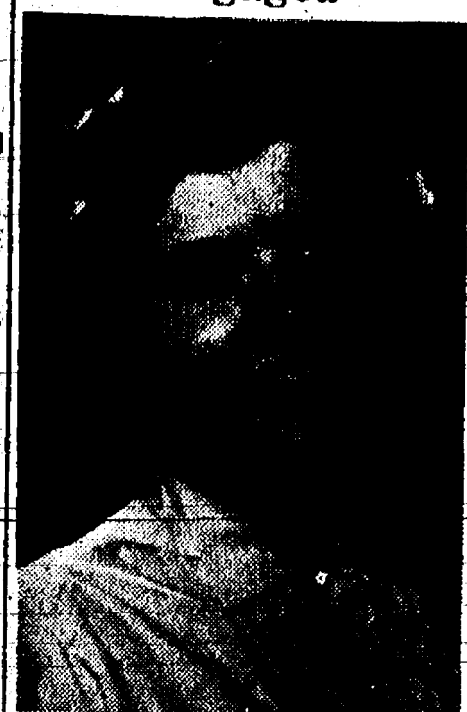

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## Police Emphasize Responsibility of Driving Privilege

Chief George Doe, today announced that his department is continuing its efforts to call to the attention of all motorists the serious responsibility that goes with the drivers license—a responsibility which is often a matter of life or death.

In commenting on the seriousness of the situation, Doe said, "When two cars crash together it proves that one or both drivers failed to live up to the responsibility of their license. When they received the license they stated that they knew how to drive safely and they promised to drive safely. Records prove that more than 80 per cent of the collisions are caused by specific violation—the breaking of the law the motorist had promised not to break."

According to Chief Doe the 150,000 accidents in Michigan last year substantiate the fact that far too many Michigan motorists do not take their licenses seriously. That is why he said that the law enforcement and court officials throughout Michigan are making a concerted effort to take action against motorists who insist on violating the traffic law and ignore the responsibilities that go with the privilege of driving.

Chelsea then broke Huron League and home floor records by whipping Ypsilanti-Lincoln 87-47. Dundee and Milan both outranked the Bulldogs in the remaining games of the season, 69-52 and 60-51 respectively.

The Bulldogs lost all their games except two against Manchester and U-High. The Pups, however, showed great improvement throughout the season and should be congratulated on their fine work and good sportsmanship.

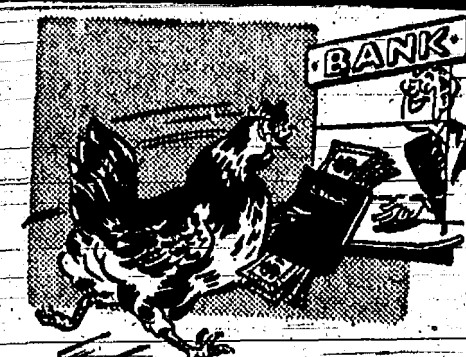
