ABA Directors Attend Instruction Meeting in Saline

An instructional meeting for all Artificial Breeders' Association directors, and inseminators of Washtenaw and Monroe counties was held in the Saline Hotel April 28. Supper at 7 p.m. preceded the business session.

A. C. Baltzer, of Michigan State College Dairy Extension Service, and Byron Carpenter, field man for the Michigan Artificial Breeders' Cooperative, were the speakers.

Forty men were present including William Van Riper, Walter Wolfgang and Floyd Fowler, of the Chelsea area, William Denham, Jr., and Harold Gross, of Dexter, and Vincent Ives, of Grass Lake.

Baltzer reported that the MABC now owns the best collection of Holstein, Guernsey and Jersey bulls to be found anywhere in the world. There are 105 bulls in the MABC barns on the Michigan State College campus, he said.

Baltzer also reported that there are only eight or nine states in the United States where operation is on a local basis with control in the hands of local boards of directors. This system, he said, is to the best advantage of the common farmer who not only can use the service of better bulls but can have a part in managing the business. He called attention to the five top quality Brown Swiss bulls that have been added recently.

Sylvan Township Zoning Code Ready for Examination

Zoning in Sylvan township has been receiving serious study the past few months by the five men who are members of the zoning committee, and they are now ready to submit their proposed zoning ordinance for examination and approval of residents of the township. It is pointed out that the township regulations would have no application to the village of Chelsea. (The Village Council is in the process of drafting a zoning ordinance for the village.)

Members of the zoning committee for the township are Floyd Rowe, Harold Glazier, Doris Whitaker, Reuben Lesser and George Brotschneider. They form a representative group from the four sections of the township and have been talking with many township residents in an effort to draft an ordinance to best serve the majority of the people.

Last week, Wednesday evening, they met informally in Sylvan Township Hall with approximately 30 people of the township, including members of the township board. At that time the entire ordinance was read, except for the many definitions.

Floyd Rowe and Harold Glazier have stated that anyone in the community who wishes to look over the copy of the ordinance as presently drafted, may make an appointment with either or both of them and they will go into full detail in explaining it.

The ordinance touches on all phases of zoning, restrictions, regulations and collection of permit fees.

Provision is also made for appointment of a Board of Appeals with specific duties outlined to protect the rights of individuals.

Opening paragraphs of the proposed ordinance state that its purpose is to "define and establish certain land use districts or zones within which districts given forms of utilization, that is, agriculture, forestry, recreation, playground, trade, industry, soil conservation, and water supply conservation, may be regulated."

Regulation of the number of families to be housed in "hereafter erected or altered" dwellings in the district and uses of buildings or structures, including trailers, and permission for their erection or alteration are included.

Yards, courts and other open spaces around dwellings have all been considered in the proposed ordinance.

A public meeting will be held in Sylvan Township Hall May 20 and residents of the township should plan to be there.

Schaible Honored
for 50-Year Service
in Local Banks

Paul G. Schaible, president of the Chelsea State Bank, was honored Thursday at a dinner in the Michigan Union, Ann Arbor, commemorating his fifty years of affiliation with banking services in Chelsea. The dinner was attended by directors and employees of the bank.

In recognition of his many years of service, the directors and employees presented him with a silver platter.

Beginning his banking career here as a bookkeeper and clerk in the old Chelsea Savings Bank February 2, 1903, he remained with that institution until 1908 when he was instrumental, together with businessmen and farmers of the community, in organizing the Farmers and Merchants Bank. The bank opened for business June 2, 1908, in the building which is now the office of the Michigan Consolidated Gas company.

Schaible served as cashier of that bank until 1921 when he was elected its president. The Farmers and Merchants Bank purchased the present building in 1927.

In 1924 the bank merged with the Kempt Commercial and Savings Bank to form the Chelsea State Bank as it is known today. Schaible was elected president at the time of the merger and has served continuously in that capacity to the present time.

276 Children Given Immunization at Local School Clinic

At the immunization clinic held April 28, at the elementary school, a total of 202 children were vaccinated for smallpox; 217 received diphtheria-tetanus booster shots; and 17 children under two years of age were given the triple shots for whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus.

Total number of children who passed through the clinic was 276. This included children of St. Mary's school and rural schools of the area, in addition to the ones in the Chelsea public schools. Dr. J. V. Fisher and Dr. T. G. Kabza were in charge of the clinic and administered the shots. Assisting were Miss Belle McKinney, Washtenaw county public health nurse and Mrs. Ann Meissner, of the Health Department, and volunteers from the Chelsea Child Study club.

Yesterday, eight Chelsea area children were taken to Ann Arbor where ear specialists were to see them at the Child Health Conference at 1135 East Catherine street. This was a follow-up of the hearing tests conducted throughout the county last fall.

The Chelsea area children were part of the 101 children of the county who were referred for medical care out of the 10,000 children who received the tests last fall.

The Chelsea group reported at Child Health Conference at 9 a.m. Children from Dexter were seen at 11 a.m. and Manchester area children were scheduled for 1 p.m.

Two U. of M. Students Die at North Lake

Two University of Michigan students, visiting at North Lake, were drowned Sunday afternoon when their canoe capsized about 100 yards from the south shore of the lake. The water was about 10 feet deep and it is believed the couple became so panic-stricken they were unable to make their way back to shore.

The victims, Jerome B. Schaack, 22, and Marcia Babbidge, 20, were guests at the cottage of Dr. Philip N. Northrop, a professor of dentistry at the University of Michigan.

The bodies were recovered in a few minutes but efforts to resuscitate them were unsuccessful. The Chelsea Fire department rescuator had been rushed to the scene.

The storm which occurred in this vicinity Sunday afternoon had reportedly passed before the couple set out in the canoe which belonged to Dr. Northrop.

Miss Babbidge, a junior in the literary college, was from Brooklyn, N. Y., while Schaack, a senior in the School of Business Administration, was from Evanston, Ill.

The bodies were taken to the Staff-Hilinger Funeral Home in Ann Arbor.

Rural School Pupils Take Part in Music Festival at U. of M.

Rural school pupils of this vicinity were among the 3,000 from Washtenaw county and portions of Monroe county who took part in the rural May Festival program at Hill Auditorium, Ann Arbor, yesterday afternoon.

The children learned the songs in their own schools from the radio classroom series broadcast during the school year by the University radio station. The children have no rehearsals together as a mass group until they get to Ann Arbor for the festival program.

Included in the program are songs from the United States and some from other lands.

The radio plan of teaching vocal music in rural schools was begun in Washtenaw county three years ago and the idea has spread until most of the state is now carrying out similar programs. At least ten similar festivals will be held at various points throughout the state.

4-H Plowing Contest To Be Held Saturday

A county-wide 4-H tractor plowing contest will be held at the Nelson Fox farm on Saturday, May 9, beginning at 1 p.m.

Sixteen contestants will take part in the contest, all winners from their own club contest, Frank Gendron, 4-H club agent, stated.

The site of the contest is about three miles east of Manchester on the Clinton-Manchester road, about one-quarter mile off M-11 on the Clinton-Manchester road.

Contestants are judged on their ability to properly handle their tractor, plow straight furrows of uniform depth and complete covering of trash and turn of furrow.
