Mrs. Holmes said she has been informed that many other communities are following Chelsea's lead in organizing blood banks for the benefit of their citizens and Red Cross mobile units in charge of the blood donor program, are booked through August.

To clarify understanding of the project, Mrs. Holmes emphasized that the local Blood Bank is for the benefit of every resident of Chelsea.

Murder Charge Lodged Against Transient Seaman

George A. Kolibab, the merchant seaman whose wallet was found on the New York Central freight train from which Felix S. Hendrickson fell to his death near Lima Center three weeks ago today, is to be charged with murder following his admission that he hit Hendrickson with a wine bottle causing him to lose his balance and fall to his death beneath the wheels of the train.

According to the story told to detectives investigating the case, Kolibab had admitted getting on the train with Hendrickson, whom he had never met before. They had planned to ride the freight train from Detroit to Chicago, he said, but the two men got into a fight over their respective wine bottles and the fall beneath the wheels of the moving train followed.

Kolibab claimed Hendrickson tried substituting his cheaper bottle of wine for Kolibab's better grade and Kolibab struck him over the head with the bottle.

When the train reached Jackson, according to the accused man's own story, he leaped from it before it reached the station and boarded another freight train back to Detroit where he was arrested for being drunk and sentenced to 30 days in the Detroit House of Correction. He was tracked down and found there the next day because of a seaman's card issued to him in Detroit. The card was in the wallet he had dropped on the train in his leap to the ground in Jackson.

At first, claiming to remember nothing that happened after he and Hendrickson boarded the freight train in Detroit.

Hendrickson's body was exhumed April 30 at Oak Grove cemetery where he had been buried Tuesday, April 28.
