Danger Stretches To Receive Special Summer Patrolling

US-12, beginning in Redford township, Wayne county, and continuing through Grosse Pointe and Lincoln townships in Washtenaw county, and thence to Sheridan township in Calhoun county, is on the State Police list of 29 stretches of highway in the state to be specially patrolled this summer in a campaign to cut down the number of traffic fatalities.

Strict enforcement of traffic laws and frequent patrols are expected to help reduce the number of accidents on the 29 stretches of highways, all of which are considered especially dangerous.

Other Washtenaw county roads which are on the list include US-23, US-112, M-17 and M-168.

The US-12 section includes the stretch immediately west of Ann Arbor, frequently referred to as a "death stretch" because of the fatalities which have occurred there in the last several years.

Tooth Decay Prevention Plan Offered

Eligible Children Should Register Now for Program

Mrs. John Chaplin, Elementary PTA chairman of the fluoride dental treatment program to be carried out in the schools here again this summer, announced this week that parents who wish their children to take the treatments should register them immediately by calling either of the following Chelsea telephone numbers: 6664 or 2-3581.

Children who should have the treatments this year are those who will be entering kindergarten in the fall and the children who are at the present time in the second, fifth and eighth grades.

A senior dental student from the University of Michigan who has been approved by the Michigan Department of Health, will give the treatments here.

The program here is sponsored by the Elementary PTA, with arrangements being in charge of Mrs. Chaplin and her committee, Mrs. P. B. Shattuck, Mrs. Claude Biles, Mrs. Clinton Collier and Mrs. Russell Bernhart.

Mrs. Chaplin pointed out that it is very important to have the registrations made at this time so that arrangements may be completed and the time set for the treatments to be given.

Present plans are to have the clinic at the school here early in August. Payment of the clinic fee (\$3.00 per child) must be made at the time of the registration and the payment will be refunded if it is found later that for some reason the child will not be taking the treatments. The committee should be notified in advance if the child cannot be present.

The treatment, which includes a cleaning and four applications of the fluoride, is said to reduce the number of new cavities by approximately 40 per cent in a group of children.

Programs for this type of tooth decay prevention have been made possible through the cooperation of the Michigan State Board of Dental Health and the Michigan Department of Health and the county health departments.

Rev. Bryce Starts New Pastorate Next Monday

Rev. David Bryce, who has served as pastor of the Chelsea Methodist church the past three years, will begin new duties as pastor at St. Paul's Episcopal church, in Muskegon, June 1.

While his duties at his new charge will officially begin next Monday, he will preach his first sermon in the Methodist church here the following Sunday, June 7.

Rev. Bryce has been pastor of the Chelsea church the past three years, coming here from the Dearborn field church which he had served for the same length of time. He had previously served pastorates in Samaria and at Galloway Lake, Pontiac.

Rev. Bryce received his B. D. degree from Garrett Biblical Institute at Chicago and studied in the graduate school of theology at Oberlin for two years.

Rev. and Mrs. Bryce, with their children, Laura, Christopher and Anne, will move to Muskegon as soon as living quarters are found for them.

Rev. Bryce's successor in the Chelsea church will be named at the Detroit Methodist Conference meetings scheduled for early June.

Limaneers Provide Trial Flower Bed for Pierce Park

The Limaneers, a club composed of 20 women, all present or former residents of Lima township, has, during the past week, provided a flower bed at Pierce Park as a community project. The project is being carried out this year on a trial basis and if the flower bed is not molested by children or vandals the club plans to arrange more than one bed and more elaborate plantings another year.

The flower bed, 12 feet long and six feet wide, is located under the sign designating the name of the park and approximately in the center of the main street frontage. It contains various and colorful plants bordered with red and white petunias.

Spring Company Included in Corporate Merger Plans

Boards of directors of the Standard Steel Spring Co. (of which the Chelsea Spring Co. is a division) and the Timken-Detroit Axle Co. have approved plans for a merger of the two firms, according to announcements made Sunday by William F. Rockwell, chairman of the boards of both firms.

The boards of directors of the two companies will now take the next step toward the proposed consolidation by asking their respective stockholders' approval. The vote is scheduled for Aug. 31.

The consolidated firm would be known as Rockwell Spring and Axle Co. with Rockwell slated to be chairman of the board of directors.

Principal products of the consolidated firm which will employ 19,000 people in its 21 plants, will be axles and transmissions, universal joints, bumpers, and springs for automobiles and farm equipment, oil and gas hose, landing units, brakes, forgings and stampings, steel gratings and trunks and rolled and machined armor plate and shells for the Army.

Lowell Davidson, manager of the Chelsea Spring company plant, said yesterday that according to present indications the organization of the Chelsea plant will remain the same if the merger becomes a fact. The merger would become effective Sept. 30 if the Aug. 31 vote favored consolidation.

In addition to the Chelsea plant the proposed merger would include plants of the two present companies located in Detroit, Jackson and Allegan.

Sales of the combined companies totaled \$388,534,833 in 1952, and total assets aggregated \$154,859,820 as of March 31.

It was explained that one share of common stock in the new company will be given for each share of Detroit-Timken common and each share of Standard Steel Spring common. Standard Steel's 44,720 shares of \$50 preferred stock will be called for retirement on July 1, with each share convertible into 2.4255 shares of common in the new firm.

Bids Opened for Surfacing Project on Manchester Road

The \$34,050 bid of the Detroit Concrete Products Co. was the lowest of those submitted at Lansing on Wednesday of last week for the 3.5 miles of bituminous surfacing of Chelsea-Manchester road, immediately south of US-12.

The contract will probably be awarded the Detroit firm following the necessary formalities.

Howard G. Minier, Washtenaw County Road Commission manager, explained yesterday that the county pays half of the cost and the state pays the remainder.

Conditions of the contract will call for completion of the project by July 31.

This is the final link of a three-year improvement program on the Chelsea-Manchester road, which provides a continuous black-top highway between the two communities.

Among bids submitted the same day on other work in the county was one for the bridge which will carry Stone School road traffic over the new M-17 bypass route around Ann Arbor, south of the city. Amount of the low bid, submitted by Johnson-Greene Co., of Ann Arbor, is \$112,738.

The bridge is to be 17 feet long and will have a roadway 26 feet wide. It is to be completed by June 30, 1954.

The storm by-passed this vicinity but struck violently at Port Huron and at Sarnia, Ontario, directly across the St. Clair river. Many smaller communities were also hit.

Scores of persons were injured in the two communities and five persons were killed.
