**Narrow Bridge
on M-92 Replaced
with Wide Culvert**

The narrow bridge on M-92 near Ivey road, which has long been a bottle-neck for traffic, north of Chelsea, was replaced during the past week. Installation of a 60-foot culvert, which cost \$2,000, at the site will allow four-lane traffic where formerly there was room for only one car to cross at a time.

Blacktopping on the Chelsea-Manchester road, beginning immediately south of US-12, is expected to begin soon, according to Howard G. Miner, Washtenaw County Road Commission manager.

He said the asphalt plant of the Detroit Concrete Products company, which has the blacktopping contract, is now set up at the Kuhl gravel pit south of Chelsea.

**Harold Rowe
Stricken with
Heart Attack**

Harold A. Rowe, of 525 North Main street, died Sunday evening shortly after suffering a heart attack while riding in a motor boat on Cavanaugh Lake. After suffering the attack he fell into the water and his clothing became entangled in the propeller of the boat, keeping him from sinking until he could be brought to shore.

A Chelsea Fire Department rescuer team which included Gaken, Herbert Roy and Melvin Leaser responded in record time following receipt of the call for help but were unable to revive him.

According to police records, Rowe started out in the boat alone at Al. Parsons, the owner, left to go home. He was about 75 feet from the shore on the southern end of the lake when Mrs. Adolph Leavelle, a resident at the lake, noticed him slump over and fall into the water. She gave the alarm and help was quickly summoned.

With his clothing caught in the propeller and no one to steer the boat it kept circling until it was close to the shore near the George Boots' cottage and it was Mrs. Boots who brought him out of the water.

It was at first believed he had been drowned.

Born at LeRoy, May 19, 1910, he was a son of Charles and Eva Williams Rowe. He married Ada Vaughn in Marion, Ohio, March 23, 1935, and they came to Chelsea in 1936. He had been employed at the Federal Screw Works since coming to Chelsea.

He was a member of the Chelsea Rod and Gun club and UAW-CIO Local No. 487.

Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the Staffan Funeral Home with Rev. Shirley S. Kinde of the Methodist church officiating.

Burial was in Oak Grove cemetery.

Survivors are Mrs. Rowe; a son, Norris Edward; a daughter, Dixie Lee, and a stepdaughter, Mrs. Roma Jean Salyer; two grandchildren; four sisters, Mrs. Albert Ripley of Reed City, Mrs. Oscar Edstrom of LeRoy, Mrs. Floyd Hinkley of Cadillac, and Mrs. Cecil Daniels of Ovid; and two brothers, William of Grand Lake, and Kenneth, of Muskegon.

**Four Accidents
Reported to Police
During Past Week**

Wednesday, June 17, at 7:50 p.m., a car driven by Kenneth Surbrook, 4600 East Michigan avenue, Jackson, sideswiped a car driven by Mrs. Minnie Scripser on Bush road, two miles south of Waterloo road, according to police reports.

Mrs. Scripser told a sheriff's deputy that she saw the Surbrook car coming fast along the narrow road and drove her car as far as possible off the highway and had almost come to a complete stop when the other car struck hers, doing considerable damage to the left side.

Thursday, June 18, cars driven by Leslie Elfrink of Stockbridge, and Harry Sachs of Detroit, collided at the corner of Island Lake road and Stofor road as Elliott, headed east, attempted a left turn onto Island Lake road. The Sachs car was headed west on Island Lake road. The accident occurred at 2:45 p.m., according to deputies' reports.

A third collision, which occurred at 11:15 p.m. Sunday, involved cars driven by Albert White of Ann Arbor, and Malcolm Sibbald, of Lima Center. The right side of a car driven by Robert Aldrich, 319 North street, was damaged considerably when it was involved in a collision with one driven by Charles H. Burgess, 13055 Sager road, on Monday. Police reports of the accident state that Aldrich, driving south on Main street, attempted a left turn into Van Buren street, when the Burgess car, headed north on Main street, collided with it.

Rev. Kinde's appointment by Bishop Marshall E. Reed to the pastorate of the Chelsea church took place during the Detroit annual conference of the Methodist Church held at Albion June 9 through 12. He succeeds Rev. David Bryce who is now in Muskegon.

Rev. Kinde, after completing his formal education in Chicago, was assigned by the Methodist Church to the Sheridan Avenue Methodist church in Saginaw in August, 1938.

In 1940 he was assigned to Fairgrove and in 1944 to Trinity church, Iron Mountain. While there he merged two Methodist congregations, the Central English and the Wesley Swedish, to form the Trinity church. Plans were then drawn for a new Trinity church to cost \$155,000. It is now under construction and Rev. Kinde plans to attend the dedication in November.

While in Iron Mountain, Rev. Kinde was active in the Iron Mountain-Kingsford Kiwanis club and served as president of the Dickinson county Ministerial Association.

In 1952 he was assigned to the Tuscola Street Methodist church in Saginaw, his assignment to the Chelsea church following this year.

Rev. Kinde was married in 1939, his wife being the former A. Loretta Wessel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Wessel of Saginaw. Their daughter will be ten years old June 30, and their son is four years old.

Mrs. Kinde is a graduate of Moody Bible Institute, Chicago.

Being active in church is only one of Mrs. Kinde's interests. She likes sports and was a letter-winner in Saginaw High school. She is a member of Chapter A of PEO Sisterhood, the Council of Church Women, the Saginaw Ministers' Wives Association, and the WCTU.

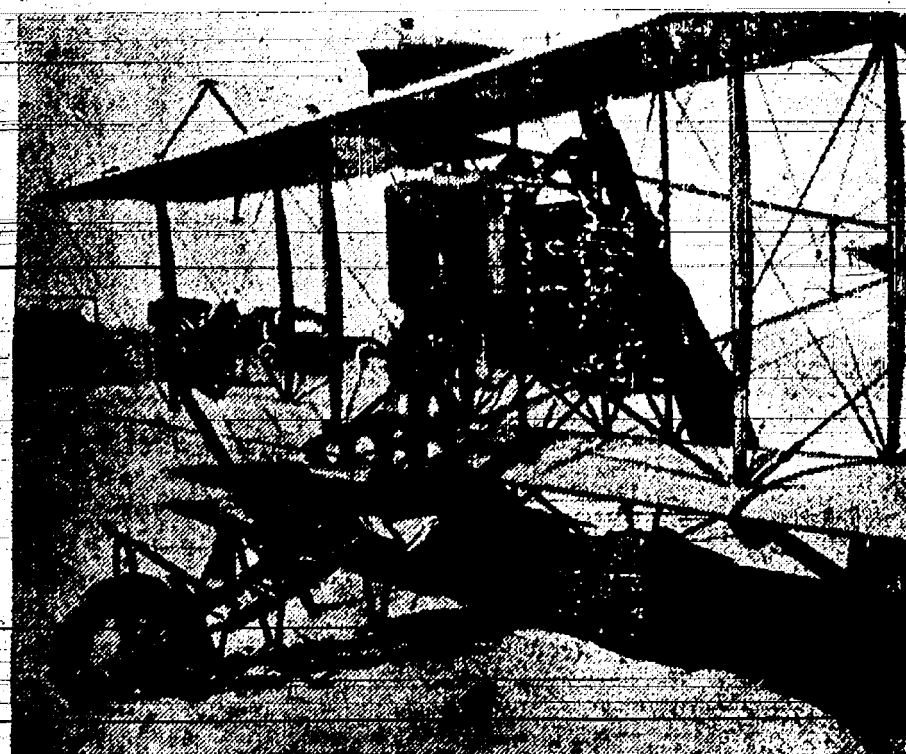

Wright "Pusher" Will Fly Again At Detroit Show



Yep, it still flies—and not only that, but this "Pusher" biplane, the type flown by the Wright Brothers, will be seen in flight at the International Aviation Exposition show each day, July 9, 10, 11 and 12, as part of the Eastern Air Lines "Span of Flight" exhibition depicting the advance of aviation over the last half-century. The original Wright flight at Kitty Hawk, N. C. on December 17, 1903 was of 12 seconds duration and for a distance of 120 feet. It will again fly that distance at the Detroit show at the Detroit-Wayne Airport. Note the old type autos and horses and carriage in the background. A World War I "Spad," the same type that Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker flew on his 26 victories over German aircraft and the first Pitcairn Mailwing will also be flown again each day during the Detroit Show.

Top Dressing Speeds Alfalfa's Comeback After First Cutting

ALFALFA fields will make a quick comeback this summer if you top dress them with phosphate and potash fertilizer after the first cutting of hay, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

The committee lists these benefits from top dressing:

1—Forage production is increased.

2—Alfalfa stands are longer-lived.

3—Hay quality is improved, with

leaves, more nutritious growth.

"Alfalfa demands upwards of 150 pounds of potash and 40 pounds of phosphate for every 4 tons of hay produced during the short summer season," says a statement issued by the committee. "If the alfalfa is to make its best growth it does not

have time to pry mineral nutrients loose from a reluctant soil.

"Although there may be a large stock of slowly available potash in the soil, the alfalfa crop needs a good supply of quickly available mineral nutrients to make full growth possible. This can be provided by top-dressed fertilizer."

How much you apply depends upon the level of nutrients in your soil, the committee points out. But

agronomists in many Middle West states recommend 200 to 300 pounds of an 0-20-20 or an 0-10-30 or 0-0-27 fertilizer after the first cutting of alfalfa.

Upside Down Oat Muffins
(Makes 1 dozen)

1 cup rolled oats
1 cup milk
2 tablespoons fat

4 cup sugar
1 egg, beaten
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon salt
3 teaspoons baking powder
4 tablespoons honey

12 drained cooked apricot halves

Combine rolled oats and milk; let stand five minutes. Cream together fat and sugar. Add egg and beat. Add oat mixture. Sift together flour, salt, and baking powder; add to first mixture. Stir only until mixed. In each well-greased muffin pan place one teaspoon honey and an apricot half with cut side up. Fill 3/4 full and bake in moderate oven (350-375°) 25 to 30 minutes. Turn out fruit side up. Serve hot.

● "My main effort while in office," said Secretary Cleary, "will be dedicated to reducing as much as possible the loss of life and money from automobile accidents in Michigan." This goal, he added, is one requiring much thought and understanding on the part of every citizen of the state.

● The Wolverine state was on top in a recent survey to find the state having the highest per centage of home ownership. In Michigan 47.5% of all dwelling units are owned by the inhabitants. New York showed the lowest per centage—37.5. Following Michigan is Minnesota with 68.4% Indiana, Idaho, Oregon and Utah were grouped closely behind.

● Tourists will spend about \$500,000,000 in Michigan this year, said C. C. Wells, secretary manager of West Michigan Tourist and Resort Association. Insufficient facilities to handle peak summer loads are expected to exist for several years. Tourist leaders are attempting to interest manufacturers in a plan to spread vacations over a 12-month period. In this way, fishermen could vacation as early as April, hunters could take time off during the winter.

● Memories went back to army days for thousands of Michigan men last week with the announcement that Fort Custer, induction center and training station, would be closed June 1. Deactivation of the army post is part of a military economy move which includes six other camps and will save the government \$2,000,000 the first year; \$40,000,000 each succeeding year. Nearly 1,000 civilian employees will be released and the camp will be staffed by a stand-by group which can reactivate it within 60 days. Fort Custer will be used each summer for two months for training purposes.

● Republicans have gone on record as favoring a new prison to relieve overcrowding at Jackson, but they make no reference to size, cost or financing. Austin MacCormick, nationally known prison authority who studied the Jackson riots, reported that overcrowding was the largest single cause for the riot, and if it is not remedied, more riots can be expected.

● Michigan has more railroads than any of 11 leading foreign countries. Figures show that 6,254 miles of railroads in the state keep 38,300 workmen busy earning \$124 million. Taxes paid by the state's railroads, contribute more to education than any other state industry—enough into the state's primary school fund each year to equal the cost of a year for 117,234 of the state's children.

Farm Production Costs

Farm production costs have nearly tripled since the pre-war years of 1935-39, according to U. S. department of agriculture statistics. These costs totaled 14.9 billion dollars in 1957 compared with 5.2 billion before World War II's outbreak. Farm wages are now three and a half times the 1935-39 average.

Meanwhile, farm prices have slumped and many economists expect a further easing in months ahead. Corn and wheat are already 25 to 40 per cent under their early 1948 peaks.

Farmers can best meet the impact of higher production costs and lower prices by good soil management that steps up crop-producing efficiency and lowers output costs per unit.

Good soil management involves no magic or mystery. It simply means playing fair with the soil by returning organic matter and plant nutrients used up by constant crop production. Organic matter can be restored by growing deep-rooted legumes such as alfalfa or sweet clover in the rotation and plowing them under for green manure.

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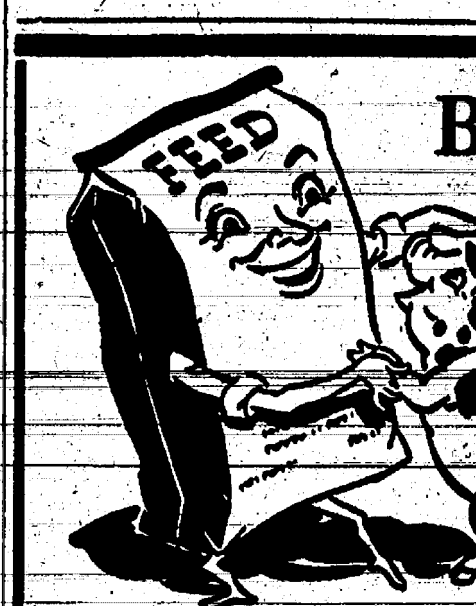
